NIKOLAEVSK, Russia, Dec. 28.

Heavy loss of life and great property destruction have been caused in several fishing villages of this district by mountainous waves from the Pacific Ocean, which hurled tons of ice, some blocks ten feet thick, on the villages during a great snowstorm. Many women and children were buried alive under great avalanches of ice and could not be dug out because their men folk were away on fishing expeditions. Heavy snowstorms have severed communications and Nikolaevsk can be reached only by couriers on skis. A relief expedition is being sent from Khabarovsk.

MELLON AIMS TO
REFUND MILLIONS
ON INCOME TAXES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—

Congress was asked by Secretary Mellon today to give the treasury authority to refund \$174,120,177 illegally collected in taxes for the fiscal year 1926 and "prior" years. The money is to be refunded to about 297,000 taxpayers in amounts ranging from one cent to hundreds of thousands of dollars. The treasury previously had transmitted to congress a supplemental estimate to cover the amount and the budget bureau had announced the figure had been taken into consideration in estimating the treasury surplus for the present fiscal year.

Secretary Mellon, in transmitting the request today to the house ways and means committee, sent a list of names of those who will benefit under this refund. Closely typed, they covered 14,386 sheets of foolscap and a truck was required to haul the bundle.

Some of the nation's celebrities shared in the refunds reported by Mellon. John D. Rockefeller, Sr., received a refund of \$76,475 and William G. McAdoo \$7,111.

Others on the list included Mary Roberts Rinehart \$1,292, and the estate of Florence Kling Harding \$1,276.

SHIFT, HUDDLE,

FORWARD PASS TO

UNDERGO CHANGES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Eastern

football officials agree that some-

thing should be done about the

shift and huddle.

Meeting in annual session until early this morning, the eastern association of intercollegiate football officials devoted much of its time to criticism of the huddle as slowing up play and of the shift to make it difficult for officials to determine legality. As a result, a suggestion will be made to the rules committee that on all shift and huddle plays, after the play-

ers have become set, they shall remain in their rearranged positions for three seconds before the ball is snapped.

The eastern officials went the western conference one second better in their suggestion, the westerners having decreed a two-second halt.

If the rules committee agrees with the officials in another suggestion, referees and umpires will be given wider latitude in imposing penalties for unfair play not otherwise provided for in the rules.

Rule 21, section 5, now provides a five yard penalty and the officials would see it amended to provide a "proper penalty."

Limitations based on the forward pass during the 1926 season, including a five yard penalty for a second incomplete pass during one series of four downs, were not effective, in the opinion of the officials. A suggestion will go forward to the rules makers that the limitations be changed or abolished. The suggestion will not include a proposed remedy for the deficiencies.
