MURDERER OF 13 PERSONS SPIRITED TO ANOTHER JAIL

FARWELL, Texas, Dec. 29.—George J. Hassell, confessed slayer of 13 persons, was spirited away from here last night by officers. He is believed to have been taken to a West Texas jail, but the authorities have refused to divulge his whereabouts.

Suffering from a knife wound near the heart which he inflicted when police discovered the bodies of his wife and her eight children in a dugout on his farm, Hassell was taken from jail last night and placed on a litter in the back end of an automobile. The jail had been unlocked.

The automobile carrying Hassell was followed by another full of heavily armed guards.

Crowds gathered all day Tuesday discussing the crime story related by Hassell, in which he confessed to the killing of his wife and his eight stepchildren following a quarrel over the oldest girl, Maude, aged 14 years. He also confessed to killing a woman and three children in California about 1915.

MOONEY'S LATEST PLEA TOO LONG TO MERIT ATTENTION

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Dec. 29.—Thomas J. Mooney, serving a life term in San Quentin for participation in the 1916 San Francisco preparedness day bombing at Stewart and Market streets, which cost the lives of nine persons and injured others, has again failed to gain a pardon. Governor Friend W. Richardson said yesterday that he will neither deny nor affirm a pardon because he has had insufficient time to thoroughly examine a 344-page document which accompanied Mooney's application two weeks ago. Mooney's sentence to death following a conviction of murder in the first degree, was commuted by Governor Stephens who refused to grant a pardon.
