FARM POINTERS

Stock steers to feed as to make large gains in winter, make smaller gains the following summer on Oregon range grass, says the animal husbandry department of the experiment station. For every extra pound of steer gains in winter he makes at least one-half pound less gain the following summer on grass.

Peach blight is said by the experiment station to be the most serious disease of peach trees in Oregon. It blights buds in the fall and winter and spots the fruit, twigs and leaves in the spring and summer. Early fall spray with Bordeaux 44-44-50—as soon as the fruit is off gives fall and winter protection, unless the disease was given a start by early rains. Where the disease is bad it may be necessary to spray again in the spring beginning when the shucks drop off the fruit and using a non-caustic sulfur spray. Unless sprayed for at the right time, this disease soon ruins an orchard.

Several things in the way of more profitable marketing of dairy by an individual creamery acting alone says the experiment station. The first and most important is advertising which must be done more regularly and extensively if butter is given an important place in the regular diet of the consumers of the country. Extensive publicity given substitute products is having its effect on the butter industry of the country and may be met by bringing the superior products in Oregon can be done by a group which cannot be done by a single high grade butter to the attention of food users.

Only in recent years has gas been commonly used in the control of squirrels in Oregon, reports the state college extension service. With use of calcium cyanide, rodenticide in rodent work, the efficiency of gassing has been greatly increased until it has become a valuable control means. It is particularly effective in districts where difficulty is encountered in getting squirrels to take poison or in clearing up an area after poisoning, at which time there are frequently a few animals that refuse to take poison. Cyanide comes in several forms under various trade names. When it is in dust form it is intended for a dusting machine.

CHICAGO.—Things are getting better. There have been only 20 murders here this year. Last year there were 394.

Ohio Homes Safer From Liquor Raiders

Verdict for \$25,000 Damages in Favor of Home-Owner Puts Caution into Officers.

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 29.—Ohio has gone back to an observance of the old English law which recognizes a man's home as his castle so far as state prohibition enforcement is concerned.

And no additional law was required to bring about the change, only an implied order by State prohibition Commissioner B. F. McDonald that "henceforth and until" no private home should be molested by state enforcement agents in search of liquor.

"Until" is the time that the state supreme court shall construe the law governing authority of prohibition enforcement officers as a result of a raid last spring on the home of State Senator George H. Bender of Cleveland, an ardent dry advocate. A jury awarded Senator Bender \$25,000 damages against the raiding officer and his bondsmen. The case will be appealed.

Immediately after the verdict, Commissioner McDonald told his inspectors that hereafter they would invade homes at their own risk of having to pay heavy damages. He admits that his instructions will have the effect of preventing further home raiding, except, perhaps, in cases where there is absolute proof beforehand that the prohibition law is being violated.

DE MOLAYS TO HAVE DANCE THIS EVENING

DeMolays and a number of invited guests will enjoy one of the festive dances of the holidays on Thursday evening at the Moose hall. SUCTION DOES MOST TO KEEP PLANE IN AIR

DAYTON, O., Dec. 29.—What holds up an airplane? Buoyancy? Momentum? Both guesses are wrong.

Suction on the top surface of the wing provides 75 per cent of the sustaining power that keeps the planes from fluttering down.

The wing's front edge is like a sharp edge of a wedge and the thickness reaches its maximum a few inches back. Then the top surface slopes down to a thin rear edge.

The wedge "splits" the air and sends it streaming back and up in practically a straight line. The swift rush of air creates a partial vacuum just above the surface of the wing and back of the thickest part. It is this partial vacuum that does three-fourths of the trick, aero-dynamic engineers at the government flying fields here assert. Buoyancy, they admit, does the rest.

TEN WORDS COMPRISE NEW SLEEP FORMULA

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 29.—Suggestion as a path to sleep, calm and restful, may often be found in ten words, each to be thought of in its full meaning, says Rev. Dr. Charles R. Brown, dean of Yale Divinity school. He has used the formula himself and through it many times had ended wakefulness.

Each word should be thought of slowly and separately and restlessness disappears and the subject is mentally in harmony with the meaning of these words which, in order, are: quietly, easily, restfully, trustfully, patiently, serenely, peacefully, joyously, courageously, confidently.

ALL OF NORTHWEST IS INTERESTED IN LAND SETTLEMENT

PORTLAND, Dec. 29.—The increasing number of homeseekers coming to the northwest is prompting the states of this area to greater organized effort in land settlement work.

That Oregon has set an example of effective service in this direction is evidenced by frequent invitations extended to the officers of the land settlement department of the state and Portland Chambers of Commerce to confer with the bankers, business men and commercial organization officials of neighboring states in order that Oregon's successful experience may be made helpful to the rest of the northwest.

The land settlement bureau of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce will hold a convention on January 8 to discuss present day problems in land settlement, and to adopt a policy that will "tie in" with the program of the railroads and the other communities of the northwest. To this meeting they have invited to come at their expense as the principal speaker, Irving E. Vining, president of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, whose message is desired to inspire greater effort in the northern state in the work of welcoming, aiding and assuring success to the newcomers on the farms.

From Idaho also comes word that the state chamber of commerce, now in its formative stage there, contemplates land settlement as one of its major activities. Stressing the benefits that can be derived for the northwestern state by closer cooperation and unity of effort, the Idaho organization extends an urgent request for W. G. Ide, under whose direction Oregon's activities are conducted, to confer with them and share the fruitage of his long experience.

In the interests of the development of the northwest, these calls for cooperation have been accepted by Mr. Vining and Mr. Ide.

The volume of inquiries from eastern and middlewestern farmers concerning Oregon lands continues to increase steadily in response to a series of advertisements being carried in farm journals of those sections. Supplementing the great advertising campaign of the railroads, this publicity is bringing a maximum of response with a minimum of expense, according to W. G. Ide, who contemplates continuing the advertising until March.

Letters from prospective newcomers indicate that the prosperity of Oregon farmers is generally recognized in the middlewest where general farming conditions have not been so satisfactory. The crop diversity and milder climate of Oregon combine to present a strong appeal and it is anticipated by railroad officials and commercial organization men that the northwestern must be organized to take care of the people when they come.
