STOCK MARKET IS

BATTLE SCENE AS

OLD YEAR PASSES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—The annual struggle between the "bulls" and the "bears" for control of the price movement in the final stock market session of the year was won today by the bulls. The bears succeeded in bringing about a sharp reaction this morning, but a lowering of call money rates and widespread predictions of good times still to come in the business world inspired sufficient bullish enthusiasm to set in motion a big buying movement which wiped out most of the early losses and sent scores of issues one to four points above yesterday's final quotations.

Despite one of the most drastic reactions in stock exchange history last March the year ended with the general average of prices close to record high levels. The total volume of business was slightly below the record set in the big "bull" movement of 1925. The last compilation of brokers' loans at the federal reserve bank shows a total of \$2,723,465,000 as against \$3,141,125,000 at the beginning of the year.

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RECOGNITION OF
SOVIET REPORTED
AIM OF AMERICA

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—A story that the United States had approached Russian Soviet officials during the past year on the subject of Russian recognition was flatly denied today by the state department.

The department authorized the statement that no approach whatever respecting recognition has been made during the year to any Moscow official. It was a direct denial of a story told in Moscow yesterday by a Soviet government official, who said "tangible and palpable" recognition approaches had been made by the Washington government.

The American attitude regarding recognition remains unchanged, the department said.

"There would seem to be at this time, no reason for negotiations," said the department.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—Unusual interest was aroused here today over Moscow dispatches quoting a high Russian official there as saying that the United States had made approaches to Russia during the past summer regarding the question of recognition of that country.

Whether such a move had been made and later dropped as reported, was a matter which the state department would not discuss, but from other sources indications were given that Russian affairs were being of had recently been given some consideration by the administration, in just what particular manner, however, the officials were not prepared to say.

The Russian official, who was said to generally reflect the views of the foreign office, did not say whether the diplomatic moves were made in Washington or in the Russian capital, nor did he state by whom they were instituted. He did say, however, that last summer the American government "definitely abandoned its intransigent attitude toward us and was ready to discuss privately, if not officially, terms of recognition."

"Then suddenly," he added, "something happened, and this will always be a mystery to us. The conversation terminated abruptly. Whether it was the American cotton crisis, the American elections, quarrels within our communist party, or other factors, we do not know. But the state department again climbed on the high horse and refused to treat with us."

The Russian spokesman said the Soviet was unable to accept all of the proposed American conditions, but was then prepared, as always, to send a delegation to Washington to tackle the issues in dispute.

The American government has repeatedly stated that recognition of the Soviet would not be accorded until the day that that country put its houses in order and faithfully guaranteed to settle obligations of former governments. As late as a year ago, this policy was declared to have undergone no change, when attention was called to a statement by Foreign Minister Tchitcherine touching on recognition overtures to the United States.

SO, PACIFIC TO BUILD MUCH ROLLING STOCK IN CALIFORNIA IN 1927.

A Christmas present in the shape of a two million and a half dollar construction program for locomotives and other rolling stock to be built in California was announced yesterday by George McCormick general superintendent of motive power for Southern Pacific company, at the general office in San Francisco.

This equipment will be constructed at the company's shops at Sacramento and Los Angeles. The large plants there will be forced to capacity production, according to McCormick, and additional mechanics and helpers will be added to the crews there.

Eight powerful mountain-type locomotives designed for fast passenger service will be built at the Sacramento shops. Preliminary work is already under way and actual erection of the engines will start in several months. These locomotives will cost \$85,500 each. They will be 97 feet, 6 inches in length and will weigh 610,500 tons each. Their power will be 20 times that of Southern Pacific No. 1, better known as the C. P. Huntington.

Each of these engines will have capacity to pull 14 modern passenger cars, weighing 70 tons each at 50 miles an hour up a grade of 25 feet a mile. New appliances and refinements in design will assure smooth starting and stopping, thus adding to the comfort of the passengers.

In addition to the locomotives, Southern Pacific will also construct at the Sacramento shops 500 box cars at a cost of \$2370 each, 150 fortyfoot flat cars at a cost of \$1729 each and 100 fiftyfoot flat cars at a cost of \$1930 each. At its Los Angeles shops the company will construct 50 cabooses at a cost of \$2340 each.

All the new rolling equipment will be for use on Pacific Lines of Southern Pacific company. A. D. Williams, superintendent of Motive Power for the northern district with headquarters at Sacramento will have direct charge of the work at that place and J. B. Schoenky, superintendent Motive Power at Los Angeles will have charge of the work there.
