MUCH BUILDING IN CITY DURING YEAR OF 1926

Survey of Construction During Past 12 Months Shows Progress.

TWENTY RESIDENCES

Prospects for Ensuing Year Are Excellent Many New Buildings Now Being Planned.

Although Roseburg's building permits for the year of 1926 did not equal those of last year, yet a survey of the construction work done during the year shows substantial progress. Twenty new residences were constructed at a total cost of \$63,200, while many old dwellings were remodelled or altered. Ten new buildings, devoted to business purposes, were erected, the sum of \$73,500 being expended on these structures.

None of the business buildings were costly, but each filled a need and added much to the city's appearance. In some cases the new buildings eliminated dangerous fire hazards.

The most expensive structure was the new Douglas Funeral Home, built at a cost of \$20,000.

CALEXICO FEELS FURTHER QUAKES; NO DAMAGE DONE

of damage and decree which buildings are to be condemned. There is some variance in the unofficial estimates. The Calexico Chamber of Commerce placed it at \$250,000, while Z. D. Agnew, police commissioner, and building contractor, estimated \$500,000 loss from the quake, not including fire loss. This, with minor damages not reported is expected to bring the total to nearly a million dollars.

Minor quakes which came at irregular intervals yesterday did not directly increase the property loss, although one of them may have been responsible for fires which broke out in Mexicali, Mexico, destroying buildings valued at \$75,000. Civilian guards and police in Calexico and the military in Mexicali have been effective in preventing any looting.

matter and do something constructive to remedy these deplorable conditions.

"Prohibition, decent and hypocrisy have become a fact and are no longer to be considered in the light of theories," Edwards said. "To my mind it is one of the most serious domestic problems now confronting this congress. During the holiday season just passed, when the spirit of Bethlehem should have prevailed in every township and home, our cheerful Christmas spirit was severely shocked by news dispatches from every section of the country, announcing scores of deaths from poison rum. Here are the figures from representative American cities in which legalized murder is looked upon with favor by this so-called paternalistic government of ours:

Says Youth Debauched
New York 70; Philadelphia 300; Boston 145; Chicago 238; St. Louis 56; Columbus 8; San Antonio (since June 1) 3; Omaha, Neb., 10; Harrisburg, Pa. 6; Detroit 121; New Orleans none; Los Angeles 30; Minneapolis 28; Seattle 23; Pittsburgh 130.

"The youth of our nation is being driven and cajoled into a life of crime because of the sinful operation of prohibition. Not so very long ago an official of one of our leading hotels in the national capital told me that he had been forced to eject from a suite of rooms some half dozen young seminary girls who had been indulging in a drinking carousal for two days and two nights in the company of young boys who had to be escorted into taxicabs in order to be conveyed to their homes.

Ready for Smith Case.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Senate democrats in senate today found themselves in substantial agreement that the credentials of Frank L. Smith, senator-designate from Illinois should be referred to a committee for investigation before Smith takes his seat in the senate. The conference was called by Senator Robinson, Arkansas, the party floor leader. Nearly all of the minority senators participated. The general view developed was in accord with the purpose of a pending resolution by Senator Ashurst, democrat, Arizona.

Another Probe Asked
WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Fifty thousand dollars would be given the Borah allen property investigation committee for expenses under a resolution introduced today by Senator King, democrat, Utah.

At the last session the senate authorized the investigation but neglected to provide funds.

Egg prices, stiffened, with quotations a cent higher on the current receipts and extra offerings. Butter opened the year notably steady, but with a fair volume of trading. Butterfat also was steady. The apple market was firmer today with most grades quoted about 2 cents higher, with no apparent effect on demand.
