## POSTAL RECEIPTS SHOW CHRISTMAS ENRICHED GOVT.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—Santa Claus' messenger, Uncle Sam, raked in a neat bit of money for his services this Christmas. The exact amount he has not had time to calculate, but his workers estimate the American public paid approximately \$18,000,000 to the post office for handling gifts and greetings.

Total postal receipts for December are estimated at about \$69,000,000 while the average monthly receipts for the year prior to December were about \$51,000,000. The increase in revenues for December represent roughly the cost of carrying Christmas gifts and greetings.

Never before had such a huge sum been paid to the postal service for handling Christmas mail. Not had such a quantity of gifts ever been handled during the holiday season. Postmaster General New, proud of his postal workers in distributing the vast quantity, at the same time gives credit to the public for its cooperation in mailing early.

## BROWNLEE YOUTH NOT YET FOUND IN HOOD REGION

Newly Discovered Tracks  
Imbue Searchers With  
Fresh Hope That He  
Is Still Alive.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
PORTLAND, Or., Jan. 5.—Hardy and experienced mountaineers braved darkness and snow last night and early today in following tracks of Leslie Brownlee, the 20-year-old Portland boy who has been lost on Mount Hood since last Saturday. Discovery of the tracks three and a half miles above Government Camp late yesterday revived fading hopes that the lost boy might be found, and immediately a group of five men familiar with the mountain and its dangers prepared to set out to follow the new clue. Throughout the night they worked through the region in which the footprints, believed those of Brownlee, had been discovered by searchers.

The trail was found between the forks of the Salmon river, and indicated that Brownlee had swung westward after having parted Saturday from his companion, Alfred Feyersabend, near Triangle moraine.

The tracks found by the searchers were imprints of beaver-tail shoes, like those the missing youth wore. The expert trackers who are on the trail can follow such tracks even if they are covered with newly-fallen snow.

More than 100 volunteers from Portland, Hood River and other points are engaged in the search on the mountain. Food and other supplies for them, donated by Portland people, have been sent by truck loads to Government Camp. The Portland advertising club has taken charge of the work of assembling the food and equipment. A radio appeal sent out by the club for help stated that the cost of conducting the search is about \$500 a day.

## BOAT EXPLOSION KILLS TWO MEN; 35 IN HOSPITALS

BALTIMORE, Jan. 5.—Two men are dead, three are missing and thirty-five injured as a result of an explosion in the pitch-filled hold of the French barge Richelieu that transformed the trim four-master into a seething inferno.

Percy Lewis, 25, negro of Tampa, Fla., and Thomas Daniels, negro, Baltimore, died early today of burns and inhaled smoke and flames. All the ships officers and ten French cadets aboard the vessel escaped injury.

The 25 injured were in hospitals here suffering from serious burns. Thirty-one of them are negroes. Two of the five are white men burned as members of the crew, while the others are dock hands.

## FOUR-HOUR SLEEP LEGEND REGARDING EDISON EXPLODED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
PITTSBURGH, Jan. 5.—Thomas A. Edison does it if he doesn't get eight hours of sleep.

So says Dr. H. M. Johnson of the Mellon Institute of Industrial Research, whose experiments on the subject of sleep have convinced him that toxins generated by muscular fatigue act as stimulants to the nervous system, including the brain.

"Mr. Edison sleeps eight hours a night or more," Dr. Johnson said, "termining a myth the story that Edison sleeps only four hours each night."

"When he doesn't get that much he does in his chair the next day. That legend has been a standing joke among his associates."

Harvey Firestone always gets a good laugh out of it. Dr. Johnson and C. E. Weigand started their sleep tests last spring with 18 University of Pittsburgh students.

Today he learned there was no such state as sound slumber, pointing out that the 18 students tossed about enough to make an average restlessness of one movement every 13 minutes. A graph apparatus attached to their beds recorded the motion of the sleepers."

## WILLAMETTE IS NEARING FLOOD MARK AT ALBANY

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5.—Heavy rains in the Willamette Valley during the past few days have resulted in high water in the river, with threat of flood stage at least at one point—Albany.

The forecast issued by the weather bureau today said the river would continue to rise at Portland for the next two days, but that a flood stage here was not in sight unless there are further heavy rains. The forecast issued today did not promise unusually heavy rains during the next 24 hours.

Albany, with a stage reading 17.7, a rise of 2.2 feet, had the highest water this morning. The forecast for this point was that the river would reach flood stage, 20 feet, by tonight or tomorrow morning. Rainfall at Albany was .77. Eugene's report this morning showed a stage of ten feet, a drop of one foot since yesterday.

The official report of the stage at Salem this morning was 14.8, a rise of 3.8 feet since yesterday. The rainfall at Salem was .65. Flood stage at Salem is 20 feet and the weather bureau this morning said there was no indication of this being reached unless there should be renewal of heavy rainfall.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 5.—Continued downpour has brought total rainfall here to 3.05 inches since January 1. The Willamette River is rising rapidly and reached a 17 foot stage this morning, putting it out of its banks on the east side of the Oregon Electric tracks. Traffic was in no immediate danger.
