FORUM LUNCHEON
TODAY PROVES TO
BE A BIG AFFAIR

It was almost necessary to hold an overflow session at the forum luncheon today sponsored by the Umpqua Chiefs and the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce. The Indian room of the Hotel Umpqua resembled a pow wow session and it was necessary to set a large table in the hotel lobby to accommodate the large attendance. The program was a snappy one and those who attended realized that they had not only gathered to enjoy the food, but to really show their cooperation in building a bigger and better Roseburg. Practically every branch of business in the city was represented and the session augurs well for the future of the entire county.

Chief Umpqua Ness opened today's luncheon by introducing the new president of the Chamber of Commerce, Dr. E. B. Stewart. The new executive was accorded a generous round of applause as he started his talk to his members. In outlining the program of the chamber for 1927 he asked the cooperation of every citizen, stating that if this chamber, county and city is to prosper it can only be by the unreserved support of the entire community. He then introduced the committee chairman and several of them made short talks, assuring the president that they would do their utmost to perform the duties of their committee. Following President Stewart's talk, two short impromptu talks were given by Dr. A. C. Seely and Bert G. Bates. They both predicted a good year and declared that the citizens of Roseburg seem to be alive and banded in a body to bring industries and payrolls to the county. Fred Goff, well known Douglas county farmer, gave an excellent talk on the dairying industry in Douglas county. Mr. Goff declared that the surface has only been scratched and firmly believes that there are great possibilities in the industry.

A number of excellent musical selections were given by the Do-Dad trio, three small youngsters, who are appearing in a vaudeville program at the Antlers theatre tonight and tomorrow night. The American recognition, the statement said, has caused unnecessary ill feeling against the moral prestige of the democratic American institutions, all over the world, because it was "unjust, unjust, and inimical to the people of both countries."

FORMER OREGON
MUSICIAN IS NOW
BAND DIRECTOR

The Douglas County Concert Band recently received three new members with the compliments of the composer. Everett Allen Moses, an Oregon boy who has achieved a high place in the musical profession and is now the director of one of the finest bands in the country. The marches were composed by Mr. Moses who is the conductor of the West Palm Beach (Florida) Municipal Band, and were played by the local band for the first time at their rehearsal last night, the numbers being pronounced by Director Applehoff and members of the band as exceptionally good. These selections will be used by the band in the coming summer concert programs and possibly in a public concert by the band in the near future.

Mr. Moses is the son of Amasa Moses of Corvallis and is a nephew of County Judge Victor Moses of Benton county. He was a member of the O. A. C. cadet band and visited in Roseburg on several occasions, he is a close friend of Fred L. Strang, a member of the local band, who played solo baritone at the O. A. C. band while Mr. Moses was playing solo cornet.

In a letter received a few days ago from Conductor Moses to his old friend, Mr. Strang, Mr. Moses writes as follows concerning the music sent to the local band and his work at West Palm Beach: "I mailed you two full instrumentalizations each for your band of 'Victory of a Nation,' which is dedicated to the signing of the Armistice brought about by the heroic efforts of America's service men and women during the recent World War, also two each of 'Inspiration of Liberty' and 'Elysium' marches. These are with my compliments. I am out of the others. I am returning the check you mailed, as my share in helping your band along its road to success. I believe you will like the marches, as the leading bands of America have been playing them and I've sold out long ago and will have to reprint again."

"You asked what I'm doing. Well, I am conducting nearly four at this world famous resort for the city, and my band is strictly professional, having drawn its players from Sousa, Pryor, Crooks, Veselka, Royal Highlanders Band, and other leading musical organizations of the nation. The players receive from fifty dollars per week up to as high as one hundred dollars per week for soloists. The city sends us on tours every summer and during the past year and we have traversed close around twenty-five thousand miles. I had four men come from Sousa's Band the last week in November to play with me till June when Sousa takes to the road again. William Tong, Sousa's cornet soloist is my soloist this winter, as is Sousa's trombone soloist John Schuler. Also I have a bassoon and solo clarinet from Sousa's Band. Then besides these four I have four other men who have been here with me the past two years who came from Sousa's band to locate here permanently. Most of that calibre, all union musicians, comprise the membership of my 33-piece concert band, which costs the city about eighty thousand dollars a year.

"That's enough about the music game. I am enclosing a magazine writeup which will explain everything. 'Yes, I am married, and have one child, a son who is nearing five years of age. I married Alice Fisher, daughter of A. W. Fisher, who has the flouring mills in Corvallis. We've been married eleven years, and boy how I've worked during that time to get somewhere. I have made many moves, but each one was to better myself, and now I hold what is considered the best band engagement on the Atlantic Coast. Many of the famous leaders and their bands have played here ahead of me, but I am now on my fourth year here, which is longer than the others listed and I hope to continue to put it over, as my band is the best now it ever was, and we are drawing immense crowds."
