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ROSEBURG AND OAKLAND

LAURELWOOD SIDEWALK PETITION SIGNED BY 152 PATRONS OF SCHOOL

The petition of high school patrons asking for sidewalks in Laurelwood was signed by 152 names instead of 52 as appeared in the account of the filing of the petition. The petitioners are endeavoring to have sidewalks built along Madrona avenue and Chapman streets, the two thoroughfares leading to the new high school building, so that the students attending the school may have a safe place to walk. There is considerable

danger at the present time as pedestrians must walk in the street, which at the time students are going to school or leaving the building leads to a dangerous condition, the petitioners believe. The council now has the matter before it for consideration.

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CHORAL SOCIETY TO START WORK ON TWO CANTATAS

One Will Be Offered on Good Friday and the Other on or Near Easter.

The Roseburg Choral Society will start rehearsing Monday, January 17 for two Cantatas which will be presented during the Easter period. The first, "The Crucifixion" by Stainer, is to be offered on Good Friday, according to present plans, and "The Great Light" by Lyon, will be given on or near Easter.

"The Crucifixion" is one of the most solemn and deeply religious cantatas written. Its music is of an altogether different type from the usual cantata. It is written on a minor theme, portraying the story of the crucifixion and all solo parts by male voices. Because of the deeply solemn nature of this musical offering it will not be given in a building devoted to secular uses but will be presented in one of the churches, where the setting will be more appropriate.

It will be immediately followed by "The Great Light," which is a joyous Easter cantata, in marked contrast to "The Crucifixion." These two offerings will be especially seasonable and will doubtless be welcomed by the music lovers of the city.

As the premier number, "The Incarnation" met with such great success, the news that the society is soon to begin practice on two new offerings will doubtless be generally welcomed.

The membership in the society is to be opened for a brief period before the rehearsals start again, and it is desired to bring the number of singers to over 100. It is desired that every singer in the city become a member of the society, which is organized to fill a demand for group singing. Elsie Carleton Strang is serving as director with Frances Lintott as accompanist.

DIPHTHERIA IS REPORTED IN CITY YONCALLA

A small epidemic of diphtheria has started at Yoncalla, according to Dr. Richard Thompson, county health officer, who left this morning for that city to continue work started to check any further spread of the disease. Dr. Thompson found one case yesterday and four cases which have been diagnosed as diphtheria but on which reports from the cultures have not been received. There are numerous other exposures. The county health unit has been working hard on the campaign to provide immunization against diphtheria among the children, and their efforts may result in preventing many cases which might otherwise have developed. Strict quarantine of known cases is to be maintained, Dr. Thompson states, and immunization provided wherever desired.

Engle took the first fall in one minute, nine seconds, and the second in one hour, six minutes.

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COPCO TO BUILD NEW POWER PLANT ON ROGUE RIVER

Largest Power Development Project in Southern Oregon to Be Started at Once.

T. H. Ness, manager of the Umpqua Division of the California-Oregon Power company today received an announcement through P. O. Crawford, Vice-President and General Manager of the California-Oregon Power company, that construction of a new hydro-electric power plant on the Rogue River would go forward at once under the supervision of Byllesby Engineering and Management Corporation, engineers and managers for the company. This new power development, which will cost approximately \$3,000,000, will be located on the North Fork of Rogue River at the site of the company's present Prospect plant. The present plant will not be dismantled, however, but will continue in operation supplementing the power to be developed by the new project, the first unit of which will generate more than three times the output of the old plant.

Be Largest on System

The initial installation will consist of one 22,000 horsepower unit to be installed at once, with provision being made for two additional units of the same size, giving an ultimate development of 66,000 horsepower. This will mean that the new Prospect project when completed will be the largest plant of the entire Copco system, being of 50 per cent greater capacity than the new "Copeo Two" plant, which has a rating of 40,000 horsepower. Although but one unit is to be installed at the present time, the major part of the general construction will be completed for the final development, leaving it only necessary to add the two additional units when needed to take care of the rapidly increasing demand.

Details Prove Interesting

The new plant will operate under a "head" or "fall" of approximately 600 feet. This means that the total head will be nearly four times as high as Niagara Falls and considerably higher than the famous Washington Monument, which is 555 feet in height. The new project will be what is known as a "stream flow" plant; only the natural flow of the stream being utilized during ordinary operation. This flow will be diverted by means of a low concrete dam without the necessity of storage, which will eliminate the need for backing up a large body of water for reservoir purposes. The proposed dam will be constructed at the site of the present Prospect dam, and will probably be not more than 50 feet in height and 350 feet in length. Several large steel radial gates will be installed to act as a by-pass for flood waters, similar to the method adopted on the "Copeo

Two" diversion dam. The water will be diverted into the intake, which will be an integral part of the dam, and will then be conducted to the forebay by means of a concrete-lined open canal 1 1/2 miles in length. The forebay will consist of a large pond about 400 feet square and 10 feet in length, restrained by specially constructed embankments. From the forebay the water will be conducted to the edge of the gorge by means of a large wood-stave pipe line approximately 3000 feet in length.

An interesting feature will be the Surge Tank, which will be constructed of steel and will rise to a height of about 150 feet above the base. This will be located between the Crater Lake Highway and the gorge at a point near the present forebay. One penstock will be provided for each unit.

The powerhouse will be an attractive and substantial structure of steel and concrete of a somewhat similar design as the building now in use at the new "Copeo Two" plant. This new generating station will probably soon become known as one of the many outstanding attractions on the famous Crater Lake Highway.

To Employ Many Men

This new power project will be one of the biggest construction jobs in the history of Southern Oregon, and will mean the expenditure of many thousands of dollars throughout this territory for labor, materials and foodstuffs. From 600 to 800 men will be employed during the height of construction, although a much smaller force will be used in the preliminary stages of the project.

The Construction Work Will Be Done by the Byllesby Engineering and Management Corporation, under the direction of George E. Phyllian as General Superintendent, Ernest G. Waters of the Copco Engineering staff, will act as Assistant Superintendent and Resident Engineer. Actual construction work will start at once, and it is planned to complete the big project before January 1, 1928. It is the policy of the California-Oregon Power company to develop its water power sites as industrial and factory requirements and other demands of energy in the territory served increase.

Murder of Boy Stirs Memories of Loeb-Leopold Case
