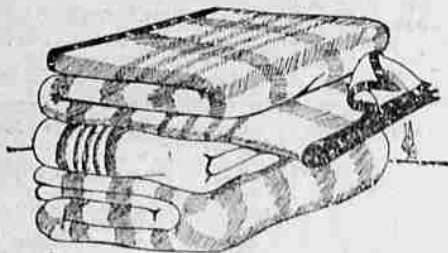

BRITISH LEAVE HANKOW; CITY AGAIN ORDERLY

American Troops Are Also Demobilized; Future Holds Trouble.

FRESH RIOT BREWS

Labor Unions Plan Another Demonstration Against British; Indemnity Is Demanded.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
HANKOW, Jan. 6.—The British residents of Hankow abandoned their concession shortly before midnight last night when women and children were put aboard ship in the Yangtze river and British sailors, marines and volunteers left the concession and boarded English warships. Three hundred armed Chinese troops and 200 Chinese pickets immediately occupied the concession, dispersed a mob of coolies and restored order. The streets immediately became quiet and were cleared of all Chinese except troops and pickets, who refused to allow other groups to gather there. American volunteers, who earlier mobilized and remained in their quarter of the city for emergency, were demobilized and quiet was restored. All British police were withdrawn from the streets and the Chinese were in complete control.

Chinese Make Demands.
Representatives of laborers, farmers, merchant, student and soldiers of Hankow have formulated demands to be presented through the nationalist or Cantonese government, to the British consul, including a demand for indemnity for Chinese alleged to have been killed and wounded in the disturbances of Monday, the withdrawal of gunboats and an apology to the Chinese government.

All foreign women and children at Ichang and Kiangling, points along the river, were removed to safety Tuesday night. There have been no disturbances in the Japanese and French concessions and foreign-controlled police continue to function there.

A report that the Cantonese had torn down the flag over the British consulate and had hoisted the nationalist banner was later corrected with the announcement that the act had taken place at the British municipal council building and not at the consulate.

Situation Gets Worse.
The situation here is growing more critical every hour. Foreigners were amazed at the withdrawal of the British armed forces and the feeling was that all concessions will fall into the hands of the Chinese. The position of foreigners remaining here is decidedly insecure. All business is at a standstill.

All British women and children are being taken to Shanghai.
A great mass meeting, comprised of all the members of labor unions in Hankow, will be held late in the day for a demonstration against the British activities on January 7, when the Chinese allege several of their number were killed and wounded in the rioting occasioned by anti-foreign feeling. The British forces were accused of using bayonets in holding off infuriated mobs at the concession entrance.

The Chinese authorities refused to admit responsibility for the incident and demanded damages.
BIGGER U. S. FORCE OFF TO NICARAGUA
(Associated Press Local Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Six additional vessels have been ordered to Nicaragua, carrying an expeditionary force of 400 marines.
The navy department said the purpose of the dispatch of additional troops and ships was to enable Admiral Latimer to "thoroughly protect American lives and property in the war-torn central American country."

ADA J. DENN WINS

DIVORCE DECREE IN SENSATIONAL SUIT

Alimony for Herself and Support for Two Minor Children Granted by Judge Hamilton.

The Denn divorce case, which has attracted much attention in the circuit court during the past two days, ended today with a decree in favor of the plaintiff, Mrs. Ada J. Denn. The charges and counter charges were of such a sensational nature that it became necessary during the taking of testimony to clear the court rooms, as matters of a most personal nature were brought into the case. Mrs. Denn charged cruel and inhuman treatment, alleging that her husband had abused her, called her vile names and denied the parentage of one of the children, and accused her of immoral conduct. She sought a decree of divorce and alimony. Mr. Denn, on the other hand, denied cruelty, claimed that his wife had an unmanageable temper and that she failed to perform her duties. He also disputed her claims regarding the value of the real and personal property of which she sought a division.

Judge Hamilton granted the decree of divorce and allowed Mrs. Denn alimony in the sum of \$50 per month and also \$50 per month for the support of the two minor children, Anthony and Leo. Her one-third interest in the property, which consists of a farm at Camas Valley and a house in town, is also maintained. Mr. Denn is further required to pay her attorneys' fees in the sum of \$300 and the costs of the case.

Attorneys B. L. Eddy and R. B. Compton appeared for Mrs. Denn.

into the sleet storm, which was raging at Condon and northward. Trace of him was lost at 5 o'clock as he was flying toward Condon. Telephone lines to Condon went out of commission at 9:45 last night.

Lieutenant Kelly who won national renown by a cross country non-stop flight, is one of the most experienced aviators in the army. He has been in command of Pearson Flying field.

Other Planes to Search.
Ray Small, Pacific air mail pilot, and Reserve Lieutenant Adrian C. Van Aelst, were ready at ten o'clock today to hop off from Vancouver barracks in a Ryan monoplane to seek Kelly and Stanley.

Reserve Captains James B. Cunningham and Howard C. French were preparing to follow in a Curtiss biplane.

Captain French has requested Colonel S. B. Arnold, commander of the 96th division, organized reserves, Portland, to order two De Havilland machines sent from Sand Point Field, Seattle, to take part in the search.

Post headquarters at Vancouver barracks reported today that its

latest word of Lieutenant Kelly was a report from Olex, 20 miles north of Condon, Ore., that his plane was seen there at 5:30 p. m. yesterday, flying in a southerly direction. The weather was clear there at the time.

Snowstorm Raging.
A telephone message today from Moro reported a snowstorm between that city and Condon, which lies southeast of Moro. City Marshal George A. Williams of Moro remained up all last night in an effort to get word of the lost aviators, and was prepared to rush relief to them in the event they met with disaster.

The storm apparently was moving north, as telephone communication with Rock Creek 14 miles south of Arlington ceased early today, after the town had reported last night that an airplane had passed going southward.
