ROADS CANNOT AGREE ON JOINT USER PROPOSAL

(Continued from page 1.)

That because failure of the Oregon Trunk and the Southern Pacific Pacific lines to agree on common user privilege of the Natron cutoff the Interstate Commerce Commission may curb any railway development in central Oregon, the Oregon public service commission and Governor Pierce have requested the Interstate commission for a hearing before the entire interstate commission before final determination is made. If such hearing seems to be necessary after the reports of the two companies are studied.

A reply telegram has been received by the governor from Clyde H. Altchison of the Interstate Commerce Commission, who says the request from the Oregon officials will be given careful consideration.

The joint request of the governor and the service commission was sent December 29 when it appeared that the reports of the railroads were to be filed soon. The Oregon commission has received the Oregon Trunk report, but has not yet received the Southern

Forest Area Moot Point.

The Southern Pacific company, the correspondence indicated, tendered the Oregon Trunk Line the right to use a part of the Natron cutoff, but the railroads could not agree upon the degree of usage to be allowed, under such an arrangement, the Trunk Line demanding conditions which the Southern Pacific was unwilling to concede. Controversy between the two lines also developed over a number of other details in the contemplated extension.

The Southern Pacific in its brief asserts it is willing to give the northern lines access to Klamath Falls, and that it has made a fair offer for use of trackage which would bring the Oregon Trunk into Klamath Falls. It refuses, however, to consider any arrangement for joint ownership or joint trackage rights of its subsidiary line extending from Klamath Falls directly into the forest area.

Oregon Trunk Contention.
The northern line's position is that the terms and conditions for use of the Southern Pacific's Cascade line between Paunina and Klamath Falls are prohibitive, in the first place, and in the second place as defeating the purpose of the proposed extension through failure to give the northern lines access to the forest area over the Strahorn road, the Oregon, California and Eastern.

The Oregon Trunk represents that it would be still necessary for it to build from Chiloquin, on the Klamath Falls cutoff, to Sprague Landing, a distance of 30 miles, in order to obtain access to the forest area.

From Sprague Landing southward the Oregon Trunk would parallel the Strahorn road for a few miles and then proceed southward to undeveloped territory again, and then swing westward into Klamath Falls, a distance of 37 miles from Sprague Landing. This latter territory the Southern Pacific claims a right over, proposing to serve it by branches from the Strahorn line.

S. P. Claims First Right.

The Southern Pacific contends that it has offered reasonable terms to the Oregon Trunk for joint use of its tracks from Paunina to Klamath Falls, thus giving the Oregon Trunk access to the business between those points as well as to business originating at Klamath Falls.

As to the region served by the Strahorn road, the brief declares "the Southern Pacific needs in the traffic that can be created in the Klamath Falls basin to support its investment serving that territory. It does not desire to enter the Bend territory; the Oregon Trunk serves that section well

and from testimony offered needs all the traffic.

"When the Southern Pacific undertook its recent investment of \$19,000,000 to complete the Natron cutoff, there was no suggestion from any source that it would not have full benefit of Klamath basin development."

SWEDISH PRINCE IN AMERICA FOR LECTURE JAUNT

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—A prince who would rather hunt lions than be one in visiting New York.

The fourth member of royalty to visit this country in the last year, Prince William of Sweden, is here as a private citizen. His welcome was probably the most informal ever accorded to a member of a reigning European family.

Six feet four inches in height, the prince, who is a sailor, explorer, sportsman and author, also described himself as a "self-made" man. He is the second son of the king of Sweden and younger brother of the crown prince who came here last summer.

His chief interests are big game hunting, aviation, literature and drama. He is the author of several books, short stories, a book of poems and an unproduced play. And he likes to play poker.

As to his possible lionizing by society during his visit here, the prince said:

"I would rather hunt a lion than be one."

The prince, who is to make a lecture tour on a recent hunting trip in Africa, declared lion hunting the most exciting sport and buffalo hunting the most dangerous.

SENATOR GOULD TO GO UNDER PROBE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—The senate elections sub-committee today unanimously decided to investigate bribery charges against Senator Gould, republican, Maine, without formally passing on the motion to dismiss the case for want of jurisdiction.

Taking of testimony will begin tomorrow on the charges, made during the senatorial campaign of Mr. Gould, and involving a railroad contract in Canada some years ago.

TRAPPER'S BODY IS FOUND UNCLAD; SPREE INDICATED

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 6.—Mystery still surrounds the death of Bert Lawton, Sharps creek trapper, whose body was found in the snow in the Bohemia mine district yesterday. W. W. Branstetter, coroner, and Van Svarverud, deputy sheriff, who investigated the case, declare their belief that the man did not meet with foul play.

The body was unclad when found. The man's clothing was found scattered about, and his high top shoes were near the road some 30 feet from where the body was found. No signs of violence were found on the body.

A quantity of mash was found in his cabin, according to officers, and there were indications that the man had been drinking.

A breakfast table set for three with eggs already cooked and coffee poured, is lending another mysterious angle to the case. The food was untouched.

1919 BASEBALL SCANDAL GAME MAY BE REOPENED

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—Baseball followers today were discussing the possibility of a new investigation of the 1919 world series scandal, as a result of George "Buck" Weaver's request for reinstatement in baseball.

Weaver, one of the eight Chicago White Sox players barred from the game in connection with the 1919 disclosures, asked Commissioner Landis for reinstatement when he appeared as a witness in the current baseball investigation, and the commissioner promised to look into it.

If Weaver's case is reviewed it was believed by some that the whole affair might again come under scrutiny. Weaver has maintained that he was innocent of any wrong doing in the 1919 scandal.

130 TO SWIM FOR GUM KING'S MONEY PRIZE
