STATE STUDENTS AT O. A. C. TO PAY TERM FEE OF \$15

Plan Decided on By Board of Regents to Avoid Money Request of Legislature.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 7.—The Oregon state legislature will not be troubled with questions of granting additional funds to Oregon Agricultural college, according to decision reached by the O. A. C. board of regents at a meeting last night. The college is in need of money to meet the additional expense due to the large enrollment this year and on the recommendation of W. J. Kerr, president of the college, the board took action to levy a resident tuition fee on all students in the college to tide over the present need.

Under the plan each resident student would be assessed a fee of not more than \$15 a term. Final action on the motion was postponed until an early meeting of the board. Out-of-state students are regularly assessed a tuition fee of \$50 a term. This tuition plan of raising additional funds is practiced at the University of Washington at the present time.

The steady increase in enrollment at the college with the expected increase cost in operation, maintenance and necessity of additional room facilities was the main topic in President Kerr's report to the regents.

Members of the board of regents present at the meeting were J. W. Weatherford, president of the board; Governor Walter M. Pierce, Sam A. Koser, secretary of state; C. A. Howard, state superintendent; E. E. Wilson, Sam H. Brown, B. F. Irvine, E. B. Aldrich, George A. Palmer, Mrs. W. A. Kinney, Harry Bailey and George M. Cornwall.

Men Who Made the World

FERNANDO CORTEZ

By Dr. Elliott Shoring, the Noted Historian

(TO BE CONT'D)

CORTEZ NOW ASKED FOR AN AUDIENCE WITH MONTEZUMA, THROUGH THE EVER FAITHFUL MARINA. CORTEZ ENDEAVORED TO EXPLAIN THE CHRISTIAN RELIGION. MONTEZUMA LISTENED QUIETLY, BUT WAS UNMOVED. HE REPLIED THAT NO DOUBT THE SPANISH GOD WAS A GOOD BEING, BUT HIS GODS ALSO WERE GOOD TO HIM. MONTEZUMA, HOWEVER, DID NOT RECOGNIZE THE SUPREMACY OF THE SPANISH GODS AND THE FACT THAT THEY WERE SUPERIOR BEINGS.

ON A VISIT TO THE MARKET PLACE, CORTEZ WAS ASTOUNDED AT ITS VAST SIZE, AND AT THE SYSTEM AND ORDER THAT PREVAILED. EACH KIND OF MERCHANDISE WAS SOLD IN A SEPARATE STREET. THE GOODS OFFERED RANGED FROM FOOD PRODUCTS, JEWELS OF GOLD, SILVER, LEAD, BRASS, COPPER, ZINC, ETC. THERE WERE SHOPS FOR THE SALE OF CHICKENS, PARTRIDGES, QUAILS, DUCKS, OTHERS FOR THE SALE OF HERBS, ROOTS AND MEDICINES, WHILE STILL IN OTHER STREETS WERE OFFERED THE EARTHENWARE, FURS AND FOOD PRODUCTS OF ALL DESCRIPTIONS. EVERYTHING WAS SOLD BY MEASURE AND INSPECTORS CONSTANTLY PATROLLED THE SHOPS TO INSURE FAIR DEALING.

THE SPANIARDS WERE GIVEN HEADQUARTERS IN A PALACE SO LARGE THAT IT WAS SUFFICIENT TO CARE FOR THEM ALL. THE BUILDING, THOUGH VERY SPACIOUS, WAS LOW, CONSISTING OF ONLY ONE FLOOR. THE VARIOUS APARTMENTS WERE HUNG WITH GOOD COTTON DRAPERIES. THE FLOORS COVERED WITH MATS OR RUSHES. THERE WERE LOW STOOLS MADE OF SINGLE PIECES OF WOOD ELABORATELY CARVED, AND IN MOST OF THE APARTMENTS THERE WERE BEDS MADE OF PALM LEAVES WOVEN INTO A THICK MAT, WITH COVERLETS, AND SOMETIMES CANOPIES OF COTTON. THESE MATS WERE THE ONLY BEDS USED BY THE INDIANS WHETHER OF HIGH OR LOW DEGREE.

PRICELESS SERVICE WAS RENDERED TO CORTEZ IN HIS CONVERSATIONS WITH MONTEZUMA, BY HIS SLAVE WOMAN, MARINA, WHO HAD BEEN PRESENTED TO CORTEZ AS A SLAVE BY THE CONQUERED PEOPLE OF TOBACCO SOME MONTHS BEFORE. MARINA, MEXICAN BY BIRTH, WAS UNUSUALLY INTELLIGENT, AND QUICKLY LEARNED SPANISH. SHE BECAME DEVOTED TO THE SPANIARDS AND GAVE HERSELF WHOLEHEARTEDLY TO THEIR CAUSE. SHE OF COURSE, OF TREMENDOUS IMPORTANCE TO THE SPANIARDS, AS SHE FORMED THEIR ONLY MEANS OF COMMUNICATING WITH THE INDIANS.
