AMERICANS ARE GETTING OUT OF CITY OF HANKOW

Women and Children Board Steamer on Advice of Consul Lockhart.

ACTION IS SURPRISE

Chinese Minister, Who Had Guaranteed Safety, Says Exodus May Result in Bad Feeling.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

HANKOW, Jan. 6.—Anxiety for the safety of Americans in Hankow arose late tonight when a British steamer was placed opposite the American consulate and Frank P. Lockhart, American consul, circularized the American colony, advising women and children to go aboard and take provisions for three days.

Fifty American women went aboard the ship and made ready to sail for Shanghai.

Eugene Chen, Cantonese minister of foreign affairs, called the American consul general and representative American business men into a conference during the afternoon and they still were in conference late tonight. The Cantonese minister was reported to be inquiring into the reasons underlying the movement for removal of the American women and children from the colony. He declared the Cantonese government had issued a proclamation saying they would be protected.

British Are Blamed

Minister Chen issued a proclamation blaming the British for the incident of January 3 which he declared resulted in the "tragically wounding of a number of Chinese."

So far as is known, outside of government headquarters, but two Chinese were hurt, and their injuries were slight.

Chen's proclamation declared the nationalist government "established a commission of provisional administration in the British concession to assume control of public safety and municipal affairs, undertaking full responsibility for the safety of foreign lives and property."

The proclamation is equivalent in effect to retrocession of the British concession with the Chinese remaining in full control of all bureaus in the district. There were few people in the streets today because of a steady rain.

LONDON, Jan. 7.—A Reuter dispatch from Shanghai says that, according to the latest naval wireless from Hankow, dispatched last night, the British concessions there are still in the hands of the Chinese military.

The American women and children are now being evacuated from the city.

Previous dispatches reported that the British naval forces had resumed control of the British concession in Hankow by arrangement with the southern or Cantonese military authorities.

Americans Desired

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7.—A dispatch received here today direct from Hankow, filed at 8:45 o'clock last night, indicated the exodus of Americans from the riot-ridden Chinese city was continuing in spite of the urgent invitations of Eugene Chen, Cantonese minister of foreign affairs, for them to remain.

The message makes no direct mention of the situation in the British concession, but indicates the Chinese still were in control of that section of the foreign colony.

Chen was quoted as declaring emphatically that the Cantonese government, which is the dominant power in Hankow, would give full protection to American lives and property in all concessions there. Meeting American representatives he said his government desired that the Americans remain in Hankow and continue business as usual.

The dispatch said it was felt in some quarters by the Chinese that the Americans were leaving in sympathy with the British evacuation move and that the Cantonese government felt that the reaction among the natives might be injurious to the Americans.

Conditions were reported quieter, "although a ranky feeling prevails, banks and business firms remaining closed."

Telegraphic facilities out of Hankow are reported to be swamped. Messages reaching here show delays of as much as 18 hours.

The irate parents secured the services of E. E. Lenz, Oakland detective, who traced the young couple to The Dalles and gave the girl into the custody of her parents here Wednesday.

With daughter and mother in tears, father in a rage and non-law in disgrace, the recent bride at last consented to give up her husband, signed guardianship papers in favor of Maupin and left for the home of her parents, where annulment proceedings will be started, it is said.
