CITY COUNCIL TO ADOPT ORDINANCE TO CLEAR UP AIR

New Law Will Be Patterned After Bill Now Pending in Portland—Would Aid Reception.

An ordinance to give authority for eliminating disturbances interfering with radio reception in the city is contemplated by the city council of Roseburg. This ordinance has been under consideration for several months...

The ordinance will ban the high frequency devices during night hours, except in emergency cases, and will probably require a license on all violet ray machines, x-ray machines or other devices which operate on high frequency and with a spark gap.

Companies maintaining electrical machines, elevators, etc., which set up disturbances, will be required to shield them. City authorities will be given power to arrest and fine persons who maintain devices interfering with radio reception.
