Some unusually attractive "applause" cards were distributed to the members at the regular meeting of the Roseburg Radio club in the city hall last night. Besides informing the stations of their reception here, these cards are also designed to boost Roseburg to any one who sees them. Along the upper portion is printed in large type "Roseburg, Oregon—the City of Roses." This phrase was considered appropriate because of the city's name and because few cities in the northwest other than Roseburg can boast of having roses in bloom practically all the year, especially in winter. On the left end is a picture of the Umpqua Indian and below it are given important facts about Roseburg and Douglas county. The remainder of

the card is given over to blanks that are filled in before it is mailed. As they are already stamped, the cards are doubly convenient. That the members approved of them was shown by the rapidity with which the supply disappeared. STATE PHYSICIANS ASK REVISED CODE AND LICENSE FEE

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 8.—The medical code in Oregon is declared by physicians to be considerably out of date, for it was enacted 32 years ago, and legislation will be introduced at this session of the legislature to revise it. Proposed changes were endorsed here last night at a meeting of physicians of Marion and Polk counties.

It is claimed there are two main defects in the existing act. The first is the absence of an up-to-date definition of the modern practice of medicine, and the second is the absence of funds to enforce the law. As a result, it is claimed, the practice of medicine in Oregon is not well regulated.

The definition of medical practice has been revised, in amendments to be offered this session, so that it is in keeping with methods used in modern scientific medicine. It is proposed to provide funds for the enforcement of the law by the annual registration of licensed physicians with a fee of \$5 each. The latter provision has recently been introduced into many state medical laws. The proposed amendments do not affect the status of any persons who are already licensed by the state to practice such forms of healing as dentistry, osteopathy, chiropractic, veterinary medicine, optometry, chiropody and the cosmetic profession.

MORGAN OUTPOINTED IN 10-ROUND BOUT BY PHIL MCGRAW

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Phil McGraw of Detroit defeated Tod Morgan of Seattle, junior lightweight champion, in a ten-round contest at Madison Square Garden last night. McGraw piled up an early lead that Morgan could not overcome.

No title was at stake, both fighters being over the junior lightweight limit. The bout was at catch weights with Morgan weighing 131 and McGraw 134 1/2. Morgan was bleeding freely from the nose at the close, but finished gamely. At the final bell both boxers were attempting to slug, although both seemed tired. The decision was received by the crowd with mingled cheers and jeers.

The referee and one judge voted McGraw the winner, while the other judge thought it was a draw.

FALL REPORTED BETTER

EL PASO, Texas, Jan. 8.—The condition of Albert B. Fall, former interior secretary, ill of pneumonia, remained satisfactory today, his secretary, H. G. Clunn, declared.

"There is no cause for apprehension," Clunn said.

REFUGE DEER GETTING TAME

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Jan. 8.—Deer are becoming numerous in the vicinity of the Oregon Caves, since a game refuge 10 miles square was created there. On a trip to the resort at the caves yesterday, the manager of the resort saw 10 deer on the road. They are becoming extremely tame and will not run until cars approach close to them. Sixteen fallen trees were removed from the road to make it passable, as the road was closed after the season at the caves.

MARKET RATINGS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 8.—The week just ending has witnessed liberal declines in butter and egg prices and a higher trend in country dressed meat and poultry values. Production of dairy commodities continues heavy and receipts in the local market have shown a big increase during the week. On the other hand arrivals of country meat and poultry have fallen off and the meager receipts were snatched up quickly at good prices.

Print butter closed 2 cents a pound lower than a week ago with local creamery stock selling at 50 cents and cartons at 51 cents.

Cube prices were fairly steady at the close outside of a half cent decline in extras, but for the week they ranged from 1 to 2 1/2 cents lower, top grades taking the heaviest loss. Closing prices on the exchange were: Extras 43 1/2 cents; standards 42 1/2 cents; prime firsts 42 cents and firsts 40 cents.

Butterfat prices ranged 3 cents lower during the week with 48 cents being bid in the valley at the close, 49 cents in zone 1 and 51 to 52 cents delivered Portland.

Fresh egg values declined almost daily during the week. Firsts, pullets and current receipts dropped another cent overnight while extras held steady at the close. Losses for the week ranged from 3 to 5 cents, as in butter top grades took the largest drop. Closing prices on the exchange were: Extras 36, firsts and pullets 33, undersized 30 cents and current receipts 32 cents.

Country dressed calves and hogs closed firm at 17 cents with the street bare of all offerings today.
