will break her engagement. She is normal weight and asks for the article on special exercises for the abdominal muscles.

Stop worrying, Miss M! There should be no more danger for you now than there would be if you were younger, if you take proper care of yourself and are under the care of a competent obstetrician.

The exercises will be beneficial, and if you do become pregnant, be careful not to gain more than 20 pounds, as the excess gain in fat on your own body will not be good for you or the babe.

Ulcer of the Stomach

E.—Symptoms—bleeding from your stomach and the awful pain in the pit of the stomach which is relieved until you vomit—
