BODY FOUND IN RIVER THOUGHT THAT OF MINER

Elderly Prospector Believed
to Have Met With Accident—Search Being
Made for Burros.

That the body found Saturday on the banks of the South Umpqua about 4 miles west of Roseburg is that of an elderly prospector who has been seen in various parts of Coos and Douglas Counties until a few weeks ago, is the belief of Coroner Ritter. P. H. Miller, of Myrtle Point, viewed the body at the morgue yesterday and was the first to identify the man as the prospector he had seen going through that place driving two burros. Later other people recalled seeing the man and gave descriptions tallying exactly with that of the body and its clothing.

Coroner Ritter believes that the man had camped some place along the river south of Roseburg and because of an accident fell into the water. The body apparently was washed downstream for considerable distance during the high water and was left caught in some brush on the bank when the water went down. The man has evidently been dead three weeks or a month. If the coroner's theory is correct the prospector's burros must be some place in the vicinity, and it may be possible from their location to find the man's camp and possibly some articles which will lead to his identification. Anyone seeing the burros or having any knowledge concerning the man is asked to communicate with Mr. Ritter.

ROSEBURG LOSES TO MARSHFIELD BY SCORE 38 TO 32

Desperate and Exciting
Rally Made by Local
Team in Last Few
Minutes of Play.

The Roseburg senior high school lost a game of basketball Saturday night to the Marshfield high school by a score of 38 to 32. Hopefully outclassed in the first half the Roseburg team came back in the second half and staged a rally which nearly evened the score. The first half of the game was marked by loose, ragged playing on the part of the Roseburg team, which failed to get organized until after the second half was well under way. Marshfield, however, played consistent, steady ball throughout, and by the end of the first half was leading by a score of 24 to 8.

The visitors started off good in the second half and annexed three more baskets before the Roseburg team finally discovered that a game was in progress. About the middle of the third quarter the Roseburg team cut loose and from that time on the game was entirely one-sided with the Roseburg squad rolling in baskets with the precision of clockwork. The local team began quickly cutting down the lead, while the crowd screamed in frenzy over the prospects of nosing out a victory from what appeared to be a hopeless defeat. With four minutes to play, and three baskets needed to tie the score, Marshfield took possession of the ball, and by purely defensive playing halted the Roseburg rally until time was called.

The Marshfield team exhibited excellent floor work and passing ability throughout, while their shooting was accurate. Norberg was high point man and proved a wonderful basket shot, while his team mate Chapman was particularly clever in floor work.

The Roseburg team made a pitiful showing in the first half, the playing being ragged and replete with fouls and careless handling of the ball. Between halves, however, Coach Turner delivered a sizzling lecture which brought the team back on the floor sobered down and ready to play ball, with the result that they outplayed the Coos Bay aggregation in all departments of the game and brought the score up on fairly even terms.

STRANGE MALADY TAKES 3 MEMBERS OF AMITY FAMILY

Three Others Ill and Four
Doctors Are Puzzled;
Thought Infantile
Paralysis.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 10.—Three members of an Amity family are dead and three others critically ill as a result of a fatal malady that has visited the A. R. Griffith family, living west of Amity, during the past eight days. The third death occurred Sunday.

The dead are: Ray, 16, only son, who died January 1; Frances, 10, who died Saturday after a few days illness and Alta, 9, the youngest child, who died Sunday. Frances attended school as usual Friday. Alice and Barbara, the two remaining children and the father are critically ill. The mother, the only one who has not yet been stricken.

Dr. R. A. Jayne, local physician, was in attendance and called Dr. Dietzel, Yamhill county health officer, and two McMinnville physicians into consultation, who in turn summoned Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, state health officer. The medical men definitely established the fact that spinal meningitis was not the cause of death, but so far have not divulged the origin or nature of the disease.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 10.—Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, state health officer, today expressed his belief that infantile paralysis was the disease which has attacked the A. R. Griffith family, living near Amity.
