ALIENS CONTINUE
IN FLIGHT FROM
INTERIOR CHINAMobs May Be Increased by
Unpaid Army; Pledges
of Safety Do Not
Banish Alarm.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PEKING, Jan. 10.—Official foreign dispatches from Hankow reaching here today said anti-foreign conditions, while somewhat easier locally, were growing steadily worse in other interior cities along the Yangtze. All American women and children were being moved from Hankow, 200 miles up the river from Hankow, and the British were evacuating all missionaries from accessible points in three states—Hupei, Hunan and Szechwan.

Although the Cantonese soldiers had left the British concession at Hankow, they were in an ugly mood because of not having been paid for several months and it was feared they might run amuck. More American women and children were ready to leave Hankow as soon as transportation was available.

All foreigners had left Kiating, 150 miles down the river from Hankow, some of them still being aboard the American gunboat Penguin there. Kiating refugees reaching Hankow were being put aboard ships which were to turn back down the river toward Shanghai.

The Kiating concession was en-

tirely in Chinese hands, all barricades having been destroyed. The Hankow British concession was being ruled by a provisional commission of five members of the nationalist government with a special Chinese police force for keeping order. Both troops and pickets were withdrawn. But foreign representatives refused to trust the Cantonese assurances for their safety. The non-British foreign banks had reopened and the British finance houses were hoping to resume business soon.

The entire city, including the Chinese section, is suffering from a complete economic paralysis. There is much unemployment among the natives and readjustment necessarily will be slow and painful if it comes at all.

CRICKSHANK IS
FIRST OF GOLFERS
AT LOS ANGELES

VAN NUYS, Calif., Jan. 10.—"Wee Bobby" Crickshank, of the Progress Club, New York, today was richer by \$2500, a diamond medal and received the plaudits of golfers as the result of his brilliant victory in the second annual Los Angeles \$10,000 open tournament which he won yesterday with a card of 282 for the 72 holes of play.

While the diminutive Scotchman teckled over the difficult Ed Cabell's Country club course to his triumph, Harry Cooper of Los Angeles, last year's winner, fell behind the first ten prize winners. Cooper found the seventeenth and eighteenth fairways so closely matted with spectators that he lost his usual control and fell far below par. He turned in a card of 296.

Crickshank met with similar difficulties. He said he would have turned in a card two strokes lower had it not been for the interference of motion picture cameramen on the eighth green during the morning's eighteenth hole round. Crickshank's card for the 72 holes was 70-71-74-67.

Charles Guest of Hollywood, one of the youngest professionals in the tournament took a 288 to share second place honors with Ed Dudley of Oklahoma City. They divided the \$1500 and \$1000 second and third place prizes.

Another tie resulted when Al Watrous of Grand Rapids, Mich., and John Farrell of Mamaroneck, each turned in cards of 289. They split the \$750 fourth and \$500 fifth prizes.

MacDonald Smith of Great Neck, N. Y., John Black of Wichita, Kans., and Eddie Loos of Glencoe, Ill., each scored the 72 holes in 293. As a result of the triple tie, the \$450 sixth, \$250 each seventh and eighth prizes were split between them.

Then came Leo Diegel of New York, with a card of 294 to take ninth place. John H. Jones of Kelso, Wash., with one stroke more, won tenth place.
