## McGraw's Latest SWAP GIVES N. Y. GRIMES, HARPER

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—John McGraw, metropolitan observer seen convinced, is fast establishing himself as the David Home of baseball.

Fresh from starting the baseball world with the deal that brought Rogers Hornsby to New York, the gray-haired chieftain has just engineered a complicated transaction involving four clubs and eleven players.

As a result of this wholesale shift, completed yesterday, the Giants obtained Buyeigh Grimes, veteran spitball pitching star of the Brooklyn Robins and Outfielder George Harper of the Phillies. Brooklyn acquires Walter Healine, hard hitting catcher of the Phillies, who got three performers—Jack Scott and Alex Ferguson, veteran twirlers, and Lafayette Thompson, infielder.

The Buffalo International, fourth party to the deal, obtains five men, two of them, outfielder Bill Huber and Pitcher Ray Pierce, go from the Phillies to an exchange for Ferguson. In the spring the Bisons will get three more players on option, two from Brooklyn and one from New York.

In this involved shuffle, the Giants obtained Healine and Harper for Thompson and Scott, then shifted Healine to Brooklyn for Grimes.

Grimes is the last of the veterans to go in Brooklyn's reorganization. The veteran, who has seen 11 major league seasons, has been one of the Robins' biggest winners since 1918, when he was traded by Pittsburgh.

Scott was a hero of the Giants' 1922 world's series triumph over the Yankees and performed well last year. Ferguson, who has seen service with the Yankees and Red Sox, also helped Washington land the 1925 American league pennant.

## 20-TON CAMERA TO FILM SATURN

CHICAGO, Jan. 11.—Saturn becomes a movie star January 23. Six astronomers, operating a specially constructed 20-ton movie camera, will film Saturn and his rings from Yerkes observatory. The man in the moon also will have a role in this drama of the sky.

The handle will start turning about 5:58 a. m. when Saturn lugs himself and his rings into eclipse behind the moon. The eclipse will last 75 minutes and all that takes place during that time will be recorded on celluloid.

The events start a busy year for Saturn. Altogether in the twelve months he will be eclipsed six times. Only twice, however, will the eclipse be visible in the United States.

The film to be taken this month will be exhibited before scientific bodies.

## RIFLE AND PISTOL CLUB TO GET USE OF INDOOR RANGE

The Roseburg Rifle and Pistol club has obtained permission, through Captain Lyle Marsters of the local National Guard company, to use the target range at the armory for 22 calibre rifle practice.

Shoots will be held twice each week on Wednesdays and Fridays and all members are being urged to attend as much valuable practice will be obtained. The club has purchased two small calibre rifles for the use of its members in shooting on the indoor range, which is 75 feet in length. It is desired that there be a big turnout of the members in order to make these shoots a success.

A great deal of interest is being shown in the rifle and pistol club and new members are being added. The officers are George Beecher, president and Dale Guley, secretary. Meetings are held the first and third Tuesdays of each month at Harrison's garage.

The club secured, in addition to small calibre rifles for use on the indoor range, two 30 calibre Springfield rifles for use of members on the outdoor range. The use of these ranges does not in any way obligate the club or its members to the government, which in recognizing the work of the National Rifle association, with which the local club is affiliated, offers medals for marksmen.

The National Rifle association was organized in 1871. It is entirely a civilian organization and all officers are elected by the members. Because the government recognizes the value of having men all over the country trained in marksmanship the club members are given the privilege of buying Springfield army rifles and ammunition and obsolete arms direct from the war department at a great saving over the usual prices. Matches are conducted throughout the year for all kinds of rifles, pistols and revolvers with suitable prizes being offered, while members may qualify for the regular army decorations.

Her age was about 55 years. No notice of funeral arrangements was received here but it is believed that burial would take place near the home at Terrebonne.
