MONTREAL PROBES CATASTROPHE THAT COST LIVES OF 77

MONTREAL, Jan. 11—Stunned by the horror of Sunday's catastrophe in which 77 children were crushed to death or asphyxiated while trying to escape from the burning Laurier Palace movie theatre, Montreal is seeking to learn how such a tragedy could have occurred.

Not more than four or five of the victims should have been admitted to the film show, in the opinion of Coroner McMahon. Provincial law forbids the attendance of a child under sixteen at a theatre unless accompanied by an adult. The coroner yesterday adjourned his inquest until Thursday after hearing two witnesses to await the findings of the fire commissioners inquiry, which opens today.

Pending the resumption of the inquest, Ameen Lawand, owner of the Laurier Palace, and three of his subordinates are at liberty under bail.

All the dead have been identified, and the majority of the thirty injured have recovered sufficiently to be removed to their homes. One boy, Louis Philippe Tremblay, 13, who is said to have been seen entering the theatre, is still missing.

ture actress." The suit does not name a co-respondent.

"Yes, it's true," Chaplin said to have boasted when his wife accused him of being unfaithful. "I am in love with her and don't care who knows it. I am going to see her when I want to and when you like it or not, I don't love you and I am only living with you because I had to marry you."

During Mrs. Chaplin's absence in May, 1925, she says, an automobile belonging to a "certain woman" was seen standing in front of the actor's home for several hours on four consecutive days.

The Break-Up Scene.
Mrs. Chaplin says she left her husband's home on November 30, last, after a scene created by the actor when he ordered a party of her guests out of the house. She had brought a number of friends to her home at 12:30 o'clock in the morning, following a dinner party downtown, and was surprised to find the comedian at home. He suddenly appeared at the head of the stairs and called her to him. "Get that wild bunch of people out of here. Get them out and get them out quick. What do you think this is?" he thundered.

Lloyd Wright, Chaplin's attorney, yesterday announced that the actor was enroute to New York "on important business." He would not disclose the purpose of the trip. Immediately after filing the divorce complaint, Mr. Chaplin's lawyers obtained a restraining order preventing the actor from taking any of his properties out of the state or in any way disposing of them pending the outcome of the suit. An order also was issued directing Chaplin to show cause why a receiver should not be appointed to handle the community property until the case is settled.

MARKET RATINGS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 11—Fresh eggs are lower today on the local exchange with quotations off one and two cents. Extras dropped to the 34 cent level, firsts declined a cent to 32 cents and current receipts broke to 30 cents a dozen. The market is weak with receipts liberal. Medium sized eggs or pullets are now worth more than firsts as there is less shipping demand for mixed grades.

Top grade cube butter is 1 to 1 1/2 cent higher, due to the firm tone shown outside. Chicago, San Francisco, and other coast markets are fractionally higher this week. On the local board extras were posted 1 1/2 cents higher at 45 cents and standards a cent higher at 43 cents. Other grades remained steady and unchanged.

Buyers and scrambling for county dressed meats along the street and receipts are disappointing. Top calves and hogs are readily grabbed up at 17 1/2 cents with less desirable kinds going around 16 1/2 cents.

Poultry receipts are limited along the street and prices are fully maintained. Heavy hens sell promptly at 23 cents with light hens at 22 cents.

Vic Donahey Begins His Third Term in Ohio

Popular Democratic Executive of Republican State Not After Presidency.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Jan. 11—Vic Donahey, only Ohio governor to be elected for three successive terms, begins his fifth year as chief executive in the same situation as during his two preceding terms.

He will be the single representative of the Democratic party holding a major state elective office. He also will have a state legislature which is preponderantly Republican.

Donahey's political success so far as his own personal campaigns are concerned has been marked. He has overcome Republican majorities repeatedly. But he has never carried his party ticket along with him.

Disagreed Over Legislation.
Open disagreement between the chief executive and legislative leaders and refusal of the state senate to confirm the Donahey appointments, during the past two sessions of the general assembly resulted in the establishment of what is thought to be an "all-time" veto record. During the legislative session of four years ago Donahey disapproved 76 bills. Last session he vetoed 71.

Donahey's friends think there is much that is Rooseveltian in his makeup. He is passionately against the "vested interests," finds "the rights of the people" and "honesty in government" among his most ready phrases when discussing affairs of state, and has an unusual ability to sense the trend of public thought. Then too, he is the father of ten children.

Started As Printer.
Born in July, 1874, he became a printer soon after leaving the public schools. His first public office was auditor of Tuscarawas, his home county. His first taste of state politics came, when he was sent as a delegate to the state constitutional convention in 1912. He was elected state auditor the same year, serving two terms, and in 1920 made his first bid for the governorship. He failed to surmount the Harding landslide of that year, but was successful in 1922, '24 and '26.

His vote getting ability had brought him mention for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1928. But he is emphatic in his disavowal of any such aspirations and insists that he cannot be drawn into the race.
