RAILWAYS AGREE ON IDAHO ROUTE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Arrangements made between the Northern Pacific and the Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company for the joint use of a new branch line which the Northern Pacific has begun building in Clearwater county, Idaho, were approved today by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The new line will tap extensive Idaho timber deposits and the two companies will allow joint use to each other of existing railroad facilities in the territory as well as of the new branch.

Good Books Find Favor in Small Towns

Library Official Notes Good Taste of Readers; Much of Nation Needs Service.

CHICAGO, Jan. 12.—(A. P.)—Main street looks away from plattitudinous pot boilers and bromide chronicles for its reading, say officials of the American Library association.

In an average morning's mail, Julia Wright Merrill, executive secretary of the committee on library extension of the organization, said the Wisconsin Free Library received the following requests:

From Clover Leaf Farm at Stone Lake, Wis., something on the life and work of Wilfred Grenfell. Wolf Creek wanted something by John Burroughs. West Bend asked for Monroe's Principles of Teaching. Colfax for Adams' History of Civilization during the Middle Ages, and Bruce for Wells' Outline of History.

Forty-four per cent of the total population of the United States, or 50,369,586 persons, the library association has found, are without access to public libraries. Miss Merrill's work is to lay the foundation to serve those people, either by mail from existing libraries, or by the establishment of branches of main libraries.

Lone Socialist Without Power in Congress.

Victor Berger's Sole Efforts Confined to Showing What His Party Might Do.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—(A. P.)—No longer a novelty because of his numerical and partisan exclusiveness, Victor L. Berger, socialist's lone representative in congress, takes his isolation good naturedly.

"All that is left me is the role of a provocative agent who must endeavor to stimulate public interest in constructive social legislation," he said as he reflected on the certain prospect that he will also be without socialist reinforcements in the seventeenth congress.

To Berger's fifth Wisconsin district, which comprises both "silk stockings" and proletarian wards in Milwaukee, belongs the distinction of having sent the first socialist to congress in 1910. It reelected him twice, in 1918 and 1924, but he was denied admission because of his war attitude. He again won in the elections to the sixty-eighth, sixty-ninth and seventieth congresses.

"I realize that, being a one-man-party in the house, I cannot pass any legislation," he said. "All that's left me is to interpret socialism and show people what we socialists would do if the responsibility of governing rested on us."

He hopes to push to a hearing his bill directing the president to convene an international conference to revise the Treaty of Versailles, and investigate the origins of the World war.

He also wants an early hearing on an amendment of the provision in the immigration law by which husbands are allowed to enter the United States under the quota allowance while their wives and children are compelled to remain behind until the head of the family has become a naturalized citizen.

AMERICA PROVES POOR MARKET FOR RUSSIAN JEWELS

MOSCOW, Jan. 12.—Nearly a billion dollars worth of precious stones, piled up by the czars in more than a thousand years of the nation's life, remains in the steel

vaults of the Kremlin. The soviet authorities say they will never be sold except as a last extremity.

This statement is made in explaining that the imperial treasures which the Bolsheviks now are offering for sale in Berlin, although they represent a king's ransom in value, by no means include all Russia's crown jewels. They embrace only those worn by the emperors and empress during the last 200 years. The jewels were sent to Berlin because of the virtual failure of the sale of the gems to Americans, and the absence of any sign that American jewelry firms will buy more. The Soviet government needs money for industrial purposes.

Up to the present Americans have bought only \$300,000 worth of the czarist jewels, including the nuptial crown of Catherine the Great, the diamond-studded sword of the emperor Paul I, the diamond necklace of the late empress Alexandra, and a score of smaller articles.

Good Food Neglected

It was contended for many years that no country could produce so excellent a meal as Italy, because of the species of hard wheat grown there, which is essential to its making. This wheat has a horny grain and contains a large amount of gluten.

However, the hard, flinty wheats of Algeria, of Tangarok, Russia, of Argentina and of the United States, especially the Durum, are rich in the element needed as the best variety of the Italian farms. Durum wheat, therefore, is the pride of the Dakotas—the farmers have almost a monopoly of it.

An expert observer, speaking 20 years ago, said: "It is to be regretted that macaroni, spaghetti and vermicelli do not enter more largely into the dietary of the working classes of America, not less because of their cheapness and the ease with which they may be prepared than because of their nourishing qualities."

Historic French Tomb

Le Mans, one of the old towns of northern France, was unfamiliar to Americans until its strategic position made it a military base for the Americans during the World war. Normally the lines of travel in Europe do not touch Le Mans, so it is rarely seen by visitors. Among the things of interest there is the tomb of Berengaria, the woman whom Richard the Lion-Hearted loved, and because of whom he broke with the house of France, repudiating the sister of the king. Why she comes to lie there, while he is at Fontenoy, I do not know. But there she lies, three weeks' march northward from her father's land, the queen and the mate of the greatest man of her time.—Hilalre Belloc, in the Independent.

Old English Almshouses

Trinity almshouses, in the Mile-End road, constitute in their entirety one of the most picturesque bits of old London still extant. The 20 little houses and their surroundings have been left to all intents and purposes as they were when first erected 230 years ago by the Corporation of the Trinity House for "deserving masters and commanders of ships, mates and pilots and their wives or widows." Even the models of ships, characteristic of the period, that decorate the roofs, though renovated from time to time, remain intact, and so does the chapel. On the green is a statue of Capt. Robert Sanders, a generous benefactor to the institution, who died in 1721.—London Daily Mail.

MORONI OLSEN PLAYERS COMING HERE JANUARY 26
