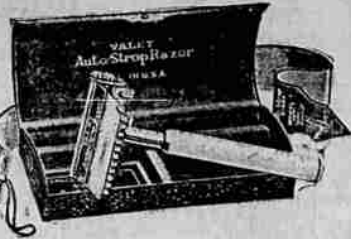

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Jan. 12.—New York "ought to be ashamed of itself" for allowing some of Broadway's current theatrical offerings to run more than one night, in the opinion of Anne Nichols, playwright and producer.

"Many of the plays now being shown," she said, "are presenting stuff as 'life' and 'drama' that it published in book form would send its author to jail."

Miss Nichols is author and producer of "Abie's Irish Rose," a comedy, which tonight has its 200th performance in New York, an American theatrical record. The play is estimated to have brought in \$20,000,000 in gross receipts as a result of being shown throughout the country and to have netted Miss Nichols a profit of \$5,000,000.

She leaves to mourn her loss, her husband and seven children, Mrs. Ethel Cochran, Redding, Cal.; Mrs. Alice Eckman, Sacramento, California; Elmer Howard, Portland, Oregon; Mrs. Rose Sand, Bellingham, Washington; Mrs. Dora Applegate, Marcola, Oregon; Earl Howard, Yoncalla, and Mrs. Edith Applegate of Sutherlin. Services will be held at Stearns Chapel in Yoncalla, Thursday, Jan. 13th, Rev. Fullerton, officiating. Interment in Yoncalla cemetery in charge of H. C. Stearns.

RIETMAN—Ellen Bunch was born Jan. 7th, 1848, at Keetsville, Sheridan Co., Mo., and died at Oakland, Oregon, Jan. 9, 1927 at 79 years. She was married Oct. 24, 1866, to John Spolinger at Dr. 14, 1866. To this union was born one daughter, Mamie Peizel, of this city. Mr. Spolinger having died in 1889, she was married in 1892 to Henry Rietman of Dr. 14, 1892. Mrs. Rietman was one of Oregon's pioneers, having come by immigration train to Oakland from Missouri in 1875. At the early age of 14 years she united with the church and lived a consistent Christian life until the time of her death. Mrs. Rietman is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Frank Peizel, two sisters, Mrs. David McCollum and Mrs. James Bunch, all of this city. Services were held in the Community church at 10 a. m. Tuesday, Rev. C. Stanley officiating. Interment in I. O. O. F. cemetery in charge of H. C. Stearns.
