"He's out of the way at least. Good riddance to a bad egg. I'll bet he didn't leave a nickel to any of us. He was the meanest man in town."

"Uncle Ed. gave me lots of nickels and I think he's a nice man." "If going to Heaven is such a wonderful thing why do mamma cry when papas die?"

All this was many—too many—years ago. And still I am stumped—or rather was—until you readers responded to the letter I published regarding what a mother should tell her boy about death, whether it be the death of a cat, canary or grandpa.

Personally I like the imaginative touch. Cold facts about death are too much like the corpse itself—the spirit has gone. Some of the references from the Bible given me by readers were excellent. Some others given would only stir up trouble in the mind of the young child. "Dust thou art and unto dust thou shalt return" is not cheerful news to a small child. "Wages of Sin is Death" makes it difficult for a child to comprehend how that loving mamma who was so sweet and pretty could be dead and gone because she was a bad woman.

SEATTLE, Jan. 12.—A new era in Seattle radio broadcasting was marked with the formal opening on New Year's Eve of the new 1000-watt Western Electric station, "Fisher's Blend Station, Inc.," broadcasting on a 305.2 meter wave length under the call letters KOMO. Every day since the first program telegrams and letters by the hundred have poured in, complimenting the new station on the quality of both reception and the programs presented.
