STAFF TO SPONSOR SECOND-HAND BOOK EXCHANGE AT R. H. S.

A new venture in R. H. S. will be the second-hand book exchange to be conducted under the auspices of the Orange "R" staff in Room 295 during the first week of next semester. Here students may buy and sell their used text-books at a small fee of 10 cents per volume for turnover, to accommodate them with texts for next semester's work at a much smaller cost.

The exchange will be in charge of Mr. Craig and student assistants, and will be open before and after school, and during roll room and activity periods during the first week of the new term.

It is expected that students will take advantage of this opportunity to buy and sell second-hand books at prices that do not strain the students' pocketbooks. Other schools have tried this plan and have found it highly satisfactory.

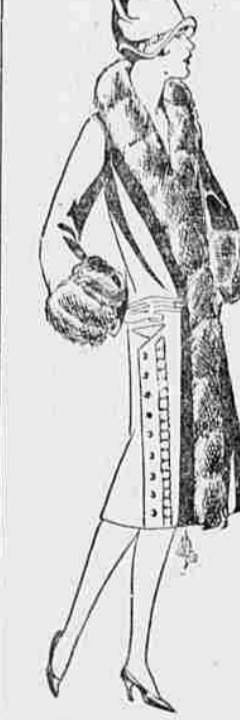
