PAUL WEISS GIVEN HIS FREEDOM BY PIERCE'S ORDER

Paul Weiss, lower Umpqua river farmer, who has been confined to the county jail for the past year on a liquor charge, has been released from custody, Governor Pierce having remitted the balance of his fine. During the final hours of his administration Governor Pierce acted upon the plea of Weiss' friends for executive leniency and ordered his release.

Weiss was given a sentence of 9 months in jail and \$2,000 fine, when he appeared in the justice court at Reedsport on a liquor charge. He served out the jail term, and part of the fine. During the past few months he has been working at the county home upon orders from the county court. An appeal was recently made to Governor Pierce, who remitted the unpaid balance on the fine and ordered the release of the prisoner, who has returned to his home.

questions:
"Are you with Russia in Mexico, or with America in Mexico?"
"Are you for the president of Mexico or for the president of the United States?"

Russia Or America?
Eaton reviewed the history of the Washington government's relations with Central America, said they had not brought war in the past, could not "mean war now," and added that "no sane American wants war with Mexico—least of all our president."

"But if the Mexican government and people surrender themselves to the control of European revolutionists whose avowed purpose is to enslave the whole new world, Latin and Anglo-Saxon alike, in strife and ruin, the United States cannot and will not stand idly by," he continued.

"There is a new issue of which Mexico is but the symbol. Shall the two civilizations, American and Latin, continue to work out their destinies side by side in this world in peace and amity, or shall we permit ourselves to become a volcano of unrest, hate and strife in accord with Russian ideals and methods?"

U. S. Rifles For Rebels.
NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—The New York World tells of a Nicaraguan gun running expedition which it says apparently was conceived and executed in the United States and made possible with American money.

Two hundred thousand dollars worth of arms and munitions and the steam trawler Foam were purchased in New York and Philadelphia last summer, says the World, by Dr. T. S. Vaca, representative in the United States of Dr. Juan B. Sacasa, opponent of Adolfo Diaz, recognized by the United States as president of Nicaragua.

The munitions, according to the newspaper, were divided into two shipments, and discussed in plane boxes and in crates but bore the marks of agricultural machinery, were sent to El Paso and San Diego. The San Diego shipment is reported to have been captured in Lower California by forces under General Estrada, but the El Paso shipment reached Puerto, Mexico, by rail and there was taken on board the Foam and eventually reached the Liberal forces in Nicaragua.

AID FOR PORT OF UMPQUA PREDICTED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Final adoption of the conference report on the rivers and harbors legislative bill, called up Thursday in the house and believed to be assured of passage in both branches of congress, carries modification of the Umpqua harbor project to eliminate requirements for local co-operation and thus to allow additional federal expenditure without qualifications. Additional surveys for the harbor and river also are provided.

INTERIOR CHINA DANGEROUS

AMOY, Jan. 14.—Word reaching here today said authorities at Foochow were ignoring all consular representations regarding treatment and protection of foreign lives and property at interior stations. Consuls were advising foreigners residing in the interior of northern Fukien provinces to prepare to go to Foochow on short notice.

SCHOOL OF MARY AND LITTLE LAMB TO BE REOPENED

SUDBURY, Mass., Jan. 14.—Through the efforts of Henry Ford the school where Mary and her little lamb made the children laugh and play is to be reopened after 70 years' ignominious existence as a barn.

Next Monday children's voices and the drone of an instructor again will reverberate within the walls of the building to which a pet lamb followed Mary Sawyer, the inspiration of the poem of Sarah Josepha Hale.

Mr. Ford, who has built up a colonial setting here around the historic Wayside Inn, bought the building last spring and caused it to be transported from Stealing where for many years it had been a landmark.

The framework was intact, and a few slabs of stone supposed to have been a part of its original foundations were carried with it and work of restoration started.

Now it is ready for occupancy and a class of sixteen pupils ranging in academic accomplishment from the first to the sixth grade has been enrolled. The children are principally of Mr. Ford's Wayside Inn employees. The manufacturer obtained the approval of the Sudbury school committee and himself arranged to employ a teacher and care for the transportation of the pupils from the Wayside Inn to the school.

In the Wayside Inn there is a collection of books, clippings and letters about Mary and her lamb.

ENTIRE REGION EAST OF ROCKIES IN WINTER GRIP

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—Snowstorms that filled the central states deep, swirled on toward the Atlantic seaboard today while another of winter's barrages crept down the eastern slopes of the Rockies.

The most severe cold was in the area between the two storms, but low temperatures spread with snow from Canada to the gulf and the weather bureau would promise no great rise before Sunday, if then.

More snow was in prospect today for mid-western and southwestern states, where a record fall for the winter in many places already had seriously interfered with travel and communication.

Central Illinois was buried deep with close to 30 inches of snow on the ground in some localities, and in Chicago an army of 3,000 laborers all night to keep traffic lanes open. Three men were killed while attempting to keep traffic moving and two others died of exposure.

The southwest shivered in the unseasonable weather, and prepared for zero temperatures in the wake of storming that left snow from an inch to six inches deep. Virtually all of Kansas, northern Oklahoma and Missouri were blanketed with considerable depth of snow.
