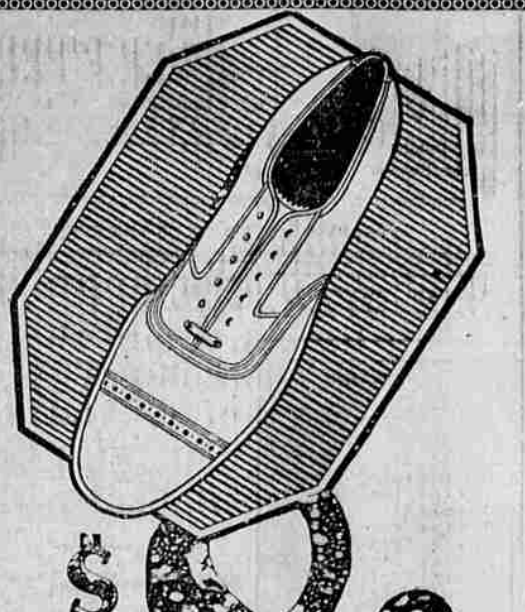

LEGISLATURE ASKS AID IN LISTING LAWS FOR REPEAL

The Chamber of Commerce has received a communication from the state legislature at Salem stating that a committee has been appointed to work out plans for the repeal of numerous unnecessary or unimportant laws, which now clutter up the statute books. The various chambers of commerce are being asked to get in touch with the residents of the respective counties and receive and tabulate suggestions for a list of laws. It is desired that a list be made of laws which people feel are obsolete or unnecessary and that these be referred to the legislative committee, which will in turn suggest to the legislature the laws to be repealed.

DUNDEE STAGES GREAT COMEBACK AGAINST ROBERTS

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—Joe Dundee, of Baltimore, today renewed his challenge for the welterweight title in the aftermath of a smashing triumph over Eddie Roberts, of Tacoma, Wash.
Emerging from the eclipse of a one-round knockout defeat at the hands of Roberts six weeks ago, Dundee last night pounded out a ten-round decision over his ene-

while conqueror before a record Madison Square Garden throng of more than 18,000. Eight of the ten rounds were credited to the eastern fighter, but in the two which went to the account of the far western entrant, Roberts packed enough terrific hitting to convince that New York critics that his last victory over Dundee was no fluke.

With a pile-driving "one-two" to the chin, Roberts felled Dundee in the fourth round for a count of eight and then battered the Baltimore fighter all over the ring for the remainder of the round. But Dundee's pluck and stamina carried him through the storm, which over lapped the fifth round. In these two sessions Roberts fought himself out trying to duplicate his knockout triumph. During the remainder of the battle he was mauling and outwitted by the Baltimorean, who cut his rival about the nose and mouth and had him reeling near the end of the contest. The bell apparently saved the Tacoma fighter from a knockout in the eighth.

Ringside critics expressed the belief that Roberts had been weakened by making his welterweight limit of 147 pounds. The far west puncher made a favorable impression with his heavy hitting, however, and will carry back home about \$15,000 as his end of the \$62,554 gate.

PROPOSAL TO UNITE ROAD DISTRICTS IS REJECTED BY COURT

The effort to consolidate Riddle, Myrtle Creek, Days Creek, Canyonville and Tiller road districts into one big super district failed today when a strong opposition force appeared before the county court and secured a promise from the court that no changes will be made from the present boundaries. It had been proposed to unite these districts so that the joint road taxes might be used for the completion of the Grater Lake cut-off road, but there immediately developed a strong opposition on the part of residents of the Myrtle Creek and Riddle vicinity, where money is needed for the maintenance of other roads.

A lengthy counter-petition and remonstrance was filed with the county court and this morning, at the time appointed for the hearing a large delegation of residents of the Myrtle Creek district appeared before the court with a remonstrance. The proponents of the consolidation failed to make an appearance.

In view of the fact that there appears to be so much opposition to the matter of uniting the districts the court voted to make no changes in boundaries.

Five Hood River
CRAG RATS START BROWNLEE SEARCH

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 15.—Five Crag-Rats of Hood River set out this morning from that city to comb the east side of Mount Hood for trace of Leslie Brownlee, 20-year-old Portland youth, who disappeared on the mountain January 1. This party had keys to all the ranger stations on the east side of the peak and was equipped to make a thorough search. It was planned to extend the hunt north of the White River canyon.

Another party of Crag-Rats from Hood River plans to set out from Cloud Cap Inn Sunday, to make a search in that vicinity.

These efforts on the north and east sides of the mountain were undertaken on the slender chance that Brownlee, who was last seen on the south slope, might have wandered around to the east or north sides in the blizzard that swept the mountain for days after he vanished.

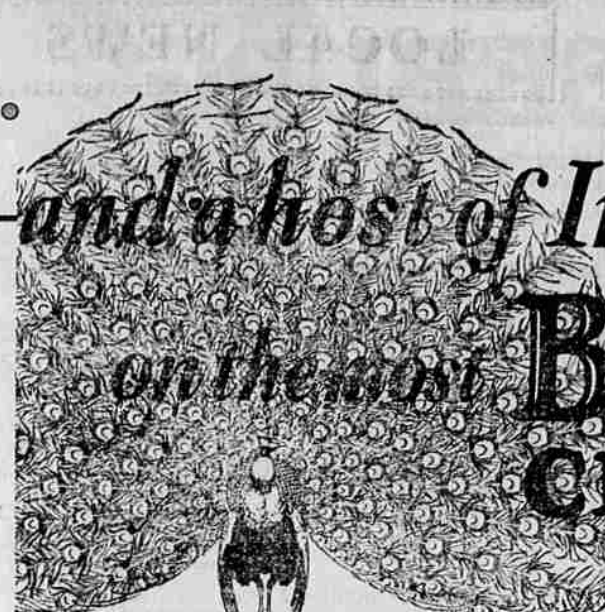
The Hood River party starting today included A. L. Anderson, Bill Hukari, John Annala, Sulo Annala and Arne Annala.

QUALITY AT LOW COST

The local market with prices changes limited to a half cent decline on cube extras. Top cubes now posted at 44¢ cents. No change in print or butterfat prices is contemplated over the week-end. Production continues heavy but is gradually being worked out.

The fresh egg market is barely steady. Pullets closed a cent lower at 29 cents but all other grades were unchanged at the end of week. Receipts are heavy with 2,368 cases reported in Friday. Carload shipments east, however, are taking care of a big part of the surplus.

Feeling in the country hog market was a trifle easier at the close of the week although there was nothing to speak of carried over. Choice light pork held around the 17 cent top with thin and heavy hogs going at 16 to 18¢ cents. Country dressed calves held firm at 17¢ cents.

Demand in the poultry market eased off the last few days and values displayed a lower trend. Heavy hens were down to 26 and 27 cents with light hens at 21 cents. Springs were slow at 22 to 23 cents. The few turkeys arriving moved off generally at 40 to 45 cents for fancy dressed stuff. Roast fancies and geese are still scarce.

Onions steady local \$2.00-2.20. Potatoes steady, \$1.40-1.75. Nuts steady. Walnuts 27-38; filberts 19-20; almonds 22-25; Brazil nuts 14-16; Oregon chestnuts 17-20; peanuts 11-14. Cacao bark nominally steady.

4 "YELLOW TICKET" DEFENDANTS FINED

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 15.—Circuit Judge Stevenson late yesterday found four of the defendants in the "yellow ticket" case guilty. Charles A. German was fined \$250; Charles E. Henshaw \$100; Walter Brodemeier \$50; and Raymond W. Caldwell \$10. Charges against Edward E. Stackhouse and John L. Stafford had been dismissed previously for lack of evidence against them.

The state sought to show in the trial that the defendants had entered into a conspiracy to deceive voters by issuing a fictitious ticket in the primary campaign last spring.
