The house today passed a house joint resolution for repeal of a law permitting voters who have not resided in the county for six months to be sworn in at the polls.

Finance Bills Pour In.
A series of bills dealing with state finances and taxation was dumped into the house grist mill today. Most of them were signed by R. S. Hamilton of Bend, chairman of the taxation and revenue committee.

The tax measures seek to bring in revenue from sources that other states have found highly productive. One would impose a tax of five mills per annum on intangibles. Another would levy a rate of 16 mills on corporate excises.

The measures embody the thought and work of such business men as State Treasurer Kay, Secretary of State Koser, Speaker Carlin, State Tax Commissioner Fisher and others.

January 1 rather than March 1 of each year would be set as the date for assessing property under the terms of one of the bills. Another measure would give the state tax supervisory commission control over the assessment and tax laws of the state, county assessors and county board of equalization. With the authority to fix valuation of any property in the state.

The amount of credit of the state and its subdivisions that might be loaned in any one year would be limited to an amount not to exceed an increase provision in the state constitution, as applied to millage taxes. It would limit the increase to three per cent over that of the previous year in the case of millage taxes.

NASH HOTEL AT MEDFORD IS SOLD

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 18.—The Nash Hotel, a pioneer landmark of Jackson county, owned by E. T. Nash, of Berkeley, Calif., was sold yesterday to E. T. Allen, of Portland, for approximately \$75,000.

Atop the Nash, modeled into a weather vane, is the pan, pick and shovel of Mr. Nash, who left the sea for the hills, and wrested a fortune from a southern Oregon mine. He built the hotel, and for many years it was the social and political center of southern Oregon.

The new owner plans a number of improvements in the spring. The building is three stories, with store space.

FOOTBALL COACH AT U. OF O. TEACHES CLASS IN BROWNING

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 18 (Special).—It is seldom that a football coach can shift readily from the gridiron to the classroom and be perfectly at ease in either place, but Captain John J. McEwan, Oregon's grid mentor, is now instructing a class in Browning and obtaining excellent results.

McEwan's methods are informal but effective. He seldom gives long assignments, thus managing to have a few moments left over for general discussion and philosophy. He carries football coaching methods to the classroom, lapsing now and then into slang to put a point across. Half a dozen letter men are in his class, and these men must bear the brunt of his questioning.

"If anyone thinks this is a pipe course," said McEwan, "they're badly mistaken. I will flunk a football man just as soon as anyone else, or sooner. I do believe, however, that failures reflect upon the ability of the instructor to put his points across."

Although no official check has been made it is generally believed that McEwan's class is freer from "cuts" than any course on the campus having a similar enrollment.

The drama is interesting and gripping in the extreme.

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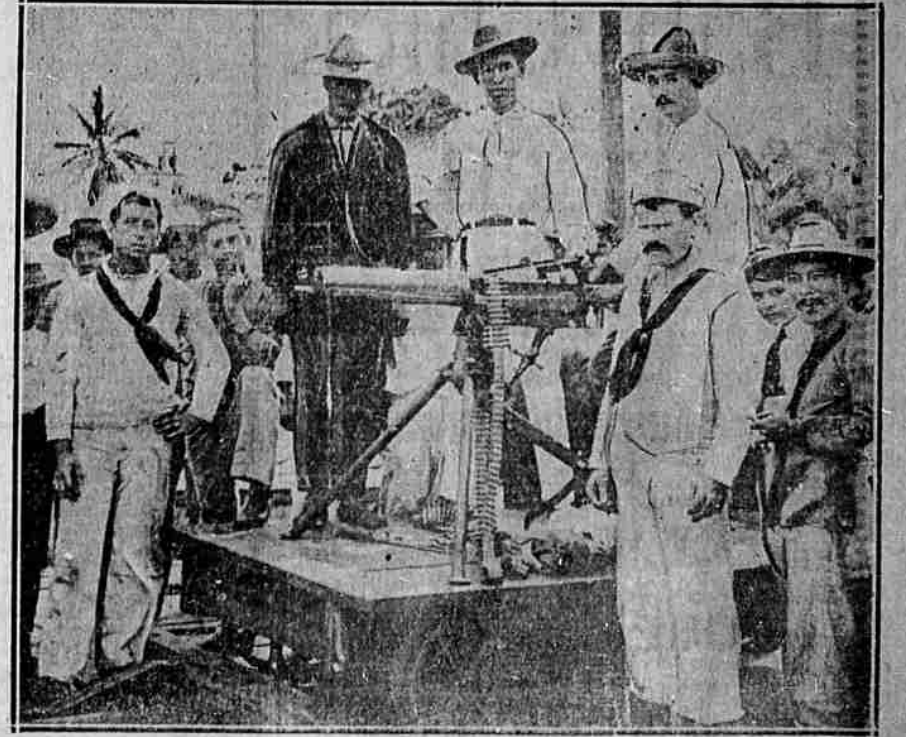
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These Are Forces Uncle Sam Aids in Nicaragua

This concern converted the boat from a steamer to a patrol boat and provided it with cabins, pilot house and other equipment and sold it to the commission. He said the price for reconditioning the boat was \$3,990, far less than it could have been duplicated for in any other shipbuilding yard.

President Corbett of the senate said after receipt of the Joseph letter asking removal of Senator Norblad from the fish investigating committee, that he was uncertain whether he had authority to remove one of his appointees.

"As far as I have been able to

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find, there is no precedent for it or power delegated to a presiding officer of the legislature to remove one of his appointees. Of course, it would be possible to appoint a committee to investigate the investigators. I shall look further into the matter."

comedian's fortune. Mrs. Chaplin and her attorneys appeared in superior court and, counsel failing to represent the comedian, drew orders for \$4,000 a month temporary alimony for the actor's wife, made retroactive to cover the last two months; \$4,000 for attorneys' fees; \$2,150 to pay for recovery expenses.

Safes to be Opened
Receivers scored a point when they obtained a court order for the opening of three safes in the Chaplin Studios in Hollywood to gain custody of their contents.

Previous attempts by the receivers to examine the contents failed because no one was present who could provide the combination.

Service of notice on Chaplin by publication for sixty days for his appearance in court here within 90 days was ordered. Chaplin is in New York and his attorneys have refused to accept service.

Meantime internal revenue collectors further tied up Chaplin's wealth by filing income tax liens against the actor totalling \$1,073,721 on his tax returns for five years. The government's claim takes precedence over all rights of Mrs. Chaplin.

The next move was a counter attack from the Chaplin camp and was launched in the state supreme court at San Francisco, where the comedian's attorneys sought a writ restraining the receivers, appointed to take over the Chaplin properties from proceeding further. The petition was denied "without prejudice," opening the way for it to be filed in a lower court.

Neither Chaplin's attorneys nor those of his wife would comment on the significance of the San Francisco ruling.

Comedian Seriously Ill
NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—Friends of Charlie Chaplin, suffering from a nervous breakdown, were more concerned about him today.

Dr. Gustav J. E. Tieck, the attending nerve specialist, reported his condition as "not too good." Dr. Tieck said Chaplin had no solid food for two days, his diet consisting of thin soups and broth, and he was so weak he could hardly stand.

The comedian, who remains at the home of his attorney, Nathan Durkan, suffered a spell of depression last night similar to the one that sent him to bed Sunday.

Publicly attendant upon his wife's divorce suit is responsible for Chaplin's condition, says Dr. Tieck.

Arthur Kelly of United Artists, Chaplin's general manager in the east, said:

"In court or out of court Chaplin must be cleared of the charges brought against him by Mrs. Chaplin."
