COOLIDGE PAT ON U. S. POLICY IN THE SOUTH

Idge and Secretary Kellogg. The Wisconsin Socialist leader declared that instead of employing the "Bolshevik bugaboo" to support the administration policy, Mr. Kellogg "would have been more candid" had he said the government intends to protect the interests of "American capitalists" in Mexico and Nicaragua even at a sacrifice of American lives. "That statement," he said, "would have at least been true and also original, while the statement is to the communist propaganda is neither."

People Oppose War. Asserting that "fully 95 per cent of the American people are opposed to war with Mexico," Kellogg said this country is headed toward war with other nations through "present imperialistic tendencies," resulting from the struggle to dispose of surplus products.

"Imperialism is inevitable under our present economic system, in which each nation must seek an outlet for the surplus products its producers have created," he concluded.

"I doubt whether Mr. Coolidge or Mr. Kellogg have ever seen a real, live Bolshevik. There are hardly any in the United States. The communist or workers' party was largely kept alive for a time by A. Mitchell Palmer (former attorney general) and the department of justice under whose cover agents went so far as to write some of its platforms, and who devised red scares for the express purpose of keeping the red spook haunting the people and keeping their own jobs."

Democrat Approves. President Coolidge's Nicaraguan policy was defended in the house today by Representative Hudspeath, Democrat, Texas, who reminded the house under a shower of questions from his own side of the aid that marines were first sent into Nicaragua "by that great Democrat, Grover Cleveland."

President Coolidge and Secretary Kellogg were charged in the house today by Representative Lester, Democrat, Missouri, with "using the Bolshevik bugaboo to cover their imperialistic program of conquest."

Mexico Combats Revolt. MEXICO CITY, Jan. 18.—Insisting that the uprisings in Mexico are part of a "Catholic rebellion," the war department says it has been informed that Francisco Orozco y Jimenez, Catholic archbishop of Guadalajara, under the emblem "Long Live Christ the King," is personally leading a revolutionary army in the state of Jalisco.

Headquarters of the Catholic church in Mexico City, which has repeatedly denied that the church is instigating uprisings, has no comment of the report that the archbishop is leading rebellious forces.

The situation in Jalisco appears to be serious, for the war department has ordered federal reinforcements to proceed to that state. At least accounts the federal forces had killed more than 100 rebels in the vicinity of Tepic, after a similar engagement in which the authorities announced, the rebels had suffered one hundred casualties.

While Jalisco and Durango seem to be the two states where the revolt is most widespread, other sections, like Puebla and Tlaxcala, are witnessing combat between revolutionists and government

forces.

The Most Reverend Orozco y Jimenez, who headed the Mexican delegation to the ecclesiastical congress at Chicago last year, was arrested in Zacatecas, Mexico, in 1917, and with the Right Reverend Miguel de la Mora, bishop of Zacatecas, was accused of being implicated in a plot to further the plans of Villa. He was exiled from Mexico amid storms of protest from Catholic circles in various countries, and eventually was allowed to return.

DISPUTE OVER WALKS IS AIED AT THE COUNCIL

into conditions relative to the necessity of sidewalk construction, but that further time was needed for investigation. The committee was given until next meeting to prepare its report.

Design Adopted

In order that sidewalk construction in Laurewood may be regulated, it walks should be required, the council adopted an ordinance regulating the style of construction, which will differ from the sidewalks in other parts of town. The streets in Laurewood are 60 feet wide and are paved 24 feet in width. This leaves 18 feet of street space on each side of the pavement. The regular sidewalk ordinance provides that where streets are improved as in Laurewood that there shall be a 6-foot parking between the sidewalk and curb. This regulation would take 12 feet off the lawns in the addition in the event sidewalks should be found advisable.

In order to prevent this condition from materializing the council passed an ordinance which sets the width for sidewalks in Laurewood at 6 feet and specifies that they shall be set out next to the curb, which will take only 6 feet from the yards. The ordinance does not require walks to be built, but specifies the design to be used in the event the council finds it expedient to order construction.

In addition to the sidewalk matters the council had considerable other business of importance to consider.

To Meet Fire Dept.

The fire and water committee recommended an increase of \$25 per month in the pay of the fire chief. Before action was taken on this matter, however, Al Bashford, assistant chief, recommended that the council and fire department hold a joint meeting to give consideration to important matters in connection with the fire department work. He stated that the firemen have numerous problems in which the cooperation of the council is needed and with which the councilmen are not familiar, and that a joint meeting might result in a great deal of good. The council approved the idea and will hold a joint session the first Monday of next month.

The city attorney reported that the council has the right to prohibit jitney stands on the main streets.

A refund of \$72.25, due Wm. Vinson for an overcharge on sewer assessment, was ordered paid.

City Attorney Wimberly reported on his trip to Salem, where he met with representatives of other cities organized in the league of Oregon cities. A number of legislative matters were discussed at that meeting, Mr. Wimberly stated, and the cities will undoubtedly benefit from the activities of the league.

An ordinance was read segregating the assessment of the Morgan property in Laurewood.

An ordinance providing for the North Roseburg sewer drainage was placed upon final reading and was passed.

ASSERTS ALCOHOL EXCELLENT DRUG

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—Heart

disease and cancer have given way temporarily to prohibition in discussions here at the meeting of the American College of Surgeons.

Addressing the annual banquet of the organization last night, Dr. George David Stewart, its president-elect, declared alcohol was a most excellent drug which he wished the justices of the supreme court could be made to believe.

"Ruska went dry in 1915," he said, "and then went crazy in 1917." He added that congress, in passing the eighteenth amendment, should have passed another law to prevent the people from eating certain kinds of food.

Dr. Charles H. Mayo, world

famous surgeon, who went to the meeting prepared to speak on economics in medicine, cast his theme aside to add his word on the dry law. He said he favored prohibition, but was no bigot. He remarked that he would leave the economic situation to be thrashed out by President Coolidge and Will Rogers.

The Rev. C. B. Moultrie, president of the Catholic Hospital association, told the surgeons that he had "unconsciously" broken the prohibition law, but only on a physician's prescription.

BAN JOHNSON AND LANDIS TO CLASH AT MONDAY MEET

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

CHICAGO, Jan. 18.—The baseball winter scandal series, which is approaching its climax in Monday's meeting of the Cobb-Speaker situation, took a new twist today with declarations by President Ban Johnson of the American League that the 1922 world series is under the scrutiny of his office.

Mr. Johnson, in adding to his criticism of Baseball Commissioner Landis for making public the Speaker-Cobb case, spoke of the investigation of charges of fixed games in 1917 and then asked why the baseball head "doesn't show the same enthusiasm for the investigation of some of our recent world series."

Johnson said his office was using all the resources in its power "to unearth the facts about that peculiar series played in 1922," which the Giants won from the Yankees in five games.

"I am still trying to get evidence against several players in that series. Their action and my reports on them make me suspicious."

Baseball observers expect plenty of fireworks at Monday's meeting, the culmination of a seven year feud between Johnson and Landis. The American League head, who forced the retirement of Dr. Cobb and Tris Speaker, and Commissioner Landis, who wants to know more about the reasons for this action, were accused that the investigation be held in public.

But just what Johnson and his club owners will decide to disclose to the commissioner and the public will be decided upon next Sunday when he and his managers discuss their plan of procedure.
