

DISPUTE WITH MEXICO LIKELY TO END QUIETLY

Coolidge and Kellogg Are Willing to Arbitrate, Senate Informed.

CALLES OF LIKE MIND

Resolution Introduced for Peaceful Adjustment, Consistent With U. S. Honor.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Prospects for arbitration of the dispute with Mexico over that country's new oil and land laws have brightened with the announcement of Secretary Kellogg, after a conference with President Coolidge, that he approved of the method in approaching a settlement.

President Calles of Mexico has indicated unofficially that he might look upon arbitration as a way out of the controversy, and Mr. Kellogg's announced views are expected to bring to the forefront in future discussions this means of composing the situation.

The sudden switch of the spot light from the civil war in Nicaragua to Mexico came last night when the secretary of state, after a half hour talk with the president, declared in a formal statement that he approved of a resolution introduced by Senator Robinson, the Democratic floor leader, calling for submission of the Mexican dispute to arbitration or to some impartial tribunal.

He said he welcomed such an expression of opinion by the senate and added that for some time he had been giving careful consideration to the question of the "definite application" of the arbitration principle to the "existing controversy with Mexico."

No Opposition Met.

The Arkansas senator's resolution has been referred to the foreign relations committee, which tomorrow plans to take up resolutions seeking withdrawal of American naval forces from Nicaragua and to decide whether it would make public a "corrected" copy of Secretary Kellogg's testimony on

Nicaragua, which was delivered before it in executive session.

The arbitration resolution, introduced after the Mexican-Nicaragua debate had ended up with renewed vigor in both houses and after another White House pronouncement on the subject, was said by its authors to have the endorsement of Chairman Borah of the foreign relations committee, who favored arbitration in a speech last week, and Senator Swanson of Virginia, ranking Democrat on the committee.

It declares that while it is the duty of the United States government to protect the lives and property of its nationals in foreign countries, and that this duty should not be neglected, it is nevertheless "sound policy, consistent with the honor and best interest of the United States and promotive of international peace and good will, to submit to arbitration, or to some impartial tribunal empowered to apply the principles of international law, the diplomatic controversies" with Mexico.

Mexican Situation.

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 19.—Attempts by "fanatical" elements to carry out a nationwide revolution have thus far failed, President Calles declares in a reply to agrarian communities asking for arms with which to assist the federalists in stamping out the so-called Catholic rebellion.

Since the agrarian party ordered its members to cooperate with the federal forces the presidential bureau has been inundated with petitions from the agrarian communities throughout the country asking for arms.

President Calles refuses the petitions with the declaration that the army is at present strong enough to quell the uprisings. Arms were distributed among the agrarians of Jalisco and Guanajuato, he says, because of the exceptional "fanatical" activities there.

Revolt Still Alive.

Fighting was still going on today in the state of Jalisco, notwithstanding the serious defeat inflicted on rebels in Tepic, but the authorities insisted that the "Catholic rebellion," as they termed it, was almost crushed.

Documents were said to have been abandoned by the revolutionists at Tepic, disclosing that Union Popular, a religious organization with branches in most of the towns of Jalisco, was directing the uprisings.

The rebellious elements who were defeated at Tepic, it was reported in special dispatches from Guadalajara to have been reorganized at Alotlan, fortifying that town. General Ferrera, with 500 federal soldiers, attacked the rebels entrenched on hills on the outskirts but the combat was suspended at nightfall, the government forces being unable to advance upon the town, ten rebels were killed in the preliminary engagement and an officer and a soldier were wounded.

Mexico Willing.

ery over the Mexican oil and land laws to arbitration.

The immediate reaction to publication of the Secretary of State's views was a subsidence of the extraordinary tension of the last week and expressions of hope that the preliminary negotiations for arbitration would be conducted in a conciliatory spirit.

There was speculation as to which side would make the official proposal. President Calles having already declared unofficially that he might consider arbitration to avoid greater evil for Mexico.

3,595 CONVICTS TURNED LOOSE BY "MA" FERGUSON

AUSTIN, Texas, Jan. 19.—Miriam A. Ferguson's abandonment of the gubernatorial toga to resume the role of housewife and a grandmother today found a nation without a woman governor, while the number of persons in Texas penal institutions had been materially reduced by her unprecedented issuance of clemency proclamations.

Continuing to sign pardons and paroles until a short time before she relinquished her office to the youthful Dan Moody yesterday, Mrs. Ferguson brought out clemency acts to an estimate total of 3,595. This would place such proclamations issued by Mrs. Ferguson and her husband, James E. Ferguson, prior to his impeachment in 1917, well above the 5,000 mark.

Of the approximately 1,350 full pardons and 825 conditional pardons granted, about a third went to men convicted of murder, criminal assault, assault with intent to kill, or manslaughter.

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EASTERN OREGON AND PORTLAND IN THE SNOW ZONE

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 19.—The second wintry spell of the season swept into Portland today on the wings of a snowstorm. Snow started falling here about 5 a. m., and was continuing this morning. Almost an inch had fallen by 9 a. m. The temperature dropped below freezing.

In the outskirts blizzard conditions prevailed, with a brisk wind chasing the snow into small drifts. The weather bureau predicted continued snow tonight and tomorrow, and expected the cold weather to last several days.

PENDLETON, Ore., Jan. 19.—A fine snow is continuing to fall in Pendleton today. About two inches fell during the night with a drop in temperature noted.

LA GRANDE, Ore., Jan. 19.—Three more inches of snow have fallen on top of yesterday's half foot and wheat men, whose grain land had been bare for a fortnight, expressed pleasure at the protective covering.

All state highways are reported open to traffic, although crews of workmen are busy keeping the roads clear.

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 19.—A heavy rain started falling this morning over the Rogue river valley. Snow is reported in the mountains, with a heavy fall at Crater Lake.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 19.—Swirling clouds of wet snow began falling here early this morning, with overcast skies giving no indication of a let-up. Streets are slushy, with temperature well above freezing.

APPEAL FILED IN BRAMWELL'S CASE

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 19.—Sidney J. Graham, of Portland, was here today to file a notice of appeal from the decision of Judge G. F. Shipworth of Eugene, rendered here a few weeks ago, requiring Frank Bramwell, state auditor, to turn the main office of the state banking department from Portland to Salem. The suit was instituted against Bramwell by George Purnham, editor of the Capitol Journal here. In the meantime, pending appeal, it is understood that an effort will be made to secure an amendment to the state banking law from the legislature authorizing Judge Shipworth's opinion by granting to Bramwell full latitude in establishing his main office where he pleases.

It is claimed a resolution has been adopted by the state bankers association in favor of the amendment.

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FORUM LUNCHEON WELL ATTENDED

He predicted it would mean over \$500,000 per year for this section. Mr. McClintock and Secretary Cully explained the workings of the Roseburg Industries Financing Service which will be formed in this county with a capital stock of \$20,000. Subscription agreements were passed out today and everyone seemed enthused over the plan. It has been successfully operated in other cities of the northwest and will mean more industries for Douglas county if adopted here.
