SCOT GAME BUT OUTCLASSED BY TITLE HOLDER

La Barba, Flyweight King, Punches Clark at Will for 12 Rounds.

LOSER WINS CROWD

Floored 5 Times and Once Dragged to His Corner, Clark Kept Coming to Last Bell.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—Elky Clark must go back to Scotland and be content where he rules the flyweight division without the satisfaction of having ruffled the curly hair of Fidel LaBarba, of Los Angeles, today the undisputed king of the world's 112-pounders. The stoop-shouldered invader from the land of the heather, who sought to bring back to Great Britain the world championship Jimmy Wilde relinquished to Jancho Villa in 1923, was battered from going to go of 12 merciless rounds by the dapper Californian in Madison Square last night. The bout, strikingly similar to the stand of Britain's "mighty atom" against Villa in defense of England's last world title, was one of the most one-sided in recent ring history. Five times the ripping punches of the clean-cut Californian tumbled Clark weak and dizzy to the canvas. Throughout the match LaBarba hammered his challenger about the ring while 16,000 fans awaited the finishing blow.

Scotchman Game.
But unlike his predecessor, Wilde, who fell before Villa's crushing punches in seven rounds at the aspect of the fight. The outcome clearly established LaBarba's right to the world title, disputed since the death of Villa, the champion, in 1925.

The vividness and color of the 21-year-old Los Angeles youth formed a marked contrast to the bent figure of the little Scotchman—29 years old and the father of four children. As Clark shambled forward in a crouching weaving style that LaBarba at times found difficult to penetrate, he met that storm of blows in each round almost before he left his corner. The Scotchman's timid lead leads to the head and body were mostly feelers. His right hand rarely found its mark. In the 12 rounds Clark failed to land a single damaging blow.

In contrast the champion literally smothered the invader with punches, ripping solid left hand punches to the head and body at will. Occasionally LaBarba crossed a crunching right to Clark's head that sagged the Scotchman's knees. **Result Seen Early.**
The fight was scarcely under way when a ripping left hook "loored" Clark in the center of the ring. Three times in the third round the challenger tumbled to the floor. Clark was stretched on his back on the canvas when the bell ended the third frame, and Referee Patsy Haley was forced to carry the dazed Scotchman to his corner, his feet dragging in the resin. Again in the eighth round when Clark appeared to be weathering the storm a left hook to the head dumped him to the floor. The judges' decision in favor of LaBarba was a formality.

Dave Montrose of Sioux City, Iowa, who formerly fought as Newaby Brown, thrust himself to the fore as LaBarba's chief rival by decisively outpunching Frankie Genaro, of New York, former American champion, in a rousing ten round semi-final.

LIBERTY THEATRE INSTALLING NEW BIG PIPE ORGAN

Installation work is well under way on the new pipe organ recently purchased by the Liberty theatre. The organ was manufactured according to specifications especially for the theatre in which it is now being placed, and is designed to give the most perfect effects. The organ is a 7-stop instrument, having 476 speaking tones, 20 chimas, a full set of orchestral traps, including drums, tympani, cymbals, etc., and a full scale of the vox humana. The entire organ has over 500 effects, which may be controlled individually or collectively. It gives all effects equal to a 14-piece orchestra, including first and second violins, flute, cello, bass violin, horn, tuba, saxophone, clarinet, and the organ foundation, together with traps. The pipes range in size from 18 feet to a fraction of an inch in length and from seven inches in diameter to as small as a fine straw. Some are of metal and some of wood to give the desired effects.

The instrument is electrically controlled, air being supplied through a centrifugal pump operated by a 3-horsepower motor. The electrical connections to the console permit easy operation on the part of the organist who can obtain the most delicate shades of expression in handling the organ. The instrument is being placed in a specially designed chamber, and will be fully installed and ready for the first concert about January 30, according to present plans. The organ is manufactured by the Tellers-Kent company of Erie, Pa., and distributed through the General Organ corporation of San Francisco. J. W. Kline, Southern California representative of the distributing company is in charge of the installation.

ROSEBURG TALENT TO BE HEARD OVER MEDFORD RADIO

Plans for broadcasting a program of Roseburg talent in the near future from station KMED, Medford, were announced by T. H. Noss, of the California Oregon Power company at the Roseburg Radio Club's meeting last night. The company has contracted with the Medford radio station to broadcast 26 hours during the year, one hour every other Tuesday evening, and the home office at Medford has asked the branches in other cities to assist in the programs by presenting local talent. The Roseburg office will sponsor part of one hour broadcasts during the year, the first of which will take place in a few weeks. Arrangements are now being made for the presentation. Roseburg should receive considerable publicity and favorable comment from the plan.

As a result of a discussion of the present puzzling condition of radio regulations the club sent telegrams to the five Oregon Congressmen urging them to act for immediate legislation to control the radio broadcasting situation. The step was considered necessary to carry out the club's policy of striving to make radio reception in Roseburg and Douglas county as good as possible.

The supply of printed applause cards placed on sale at the last meeting were completely sold out so it was decided to have another quantity printed for distribution to the members. In addition to information of interest to the radio stations, the cards also have important facts about the city on them so that everyone who sees them will learn about Roseburg and Douglas county. The Roseburg Radio Club has expressed its desire to host the city in every possible way and will follow the plan in all its literature.

Some of the members present last night declared that poor reception was quite common in the city during the past week and wished to learn of some way to improve it. The trouble shooting committee was of the opinion, however, that the trouble was mostly static resulting from the present cold wave. Fans who have been dissatisfied with the quality of reception were advised to wait for warmer weather before making any changes in their sets.

TREASURY DEPT. DENIES APPEAL OF MRS. CHAPLIN
(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Mrs. Lita Grey Chaplin was officially informed today that the treasury department could not help her in her efforts to collect alimony from the funds of Charlie Chaplin, which are tied up by tax suits instituted by the government.

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—Described as penniless, weak, wobbly and without money enough to hire a taxi, Charlie Chaplin today was hoping that his difficulties with the government over his income tax returns would be settled within a few days.

His attorneys were arranging to post a bond to meet the government's claim for \$1,135,000 in back income taxes and so release from liens more than \$500,000 of Chaplin's New York assets. It was said unofficially at the internal revenue collector's office, that so far as this district is concerned the matter would be adjusted by Monday.

Chaplin, said Nathan Burkan, his attorney, would be absolutely penniless and unable to hire a taxi if it were not for his friends. This same temporary poverty, he said, had caused considerable loss to his two picture companies, the activities of which have been curtailed by lack of operating funds.

"Chaplin has no desire or design to treat the government unfairly," said Mr. Burkan. "He has always paid his taxes and the companies have always paid theirs, but the government thinks back taxes are due and we are perfectly willing to insure it against loss by posting ourselves."

Burkan explained that Chaplin's withdrawal of \$500,000 from an account here Thursday was not to forestall the government's liens, but to meet studio expenses here.

SPREE COSTS MAN TWO YEARS OF HIS LIBERTY

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22.—Jacques Du Pont, sewing machine salesman, convicted yesterday of involuntary manslaughter growing out of the death of William C. Laro, on November 8, was sentenced today to two years in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$50. The jury recommended leniency.

Laro died from the effects of a blow struck by Du Pont, according to the testimony. Du Pont testified that he was intoxicated and that he had no recollection of having assaulted Laro.
