## MANY FARMERS ARE EXPECTED TO COME TO OREGON

PORTLAND, Jan. 24.—Movement of farmers to Oregon from the Middle West gathers momentum with the progress of the New Year. Not only is the record growing for prospective settlers among single families, but also for groups of families, old neighbors seeking a new home together in the west. Within the past week the land settlement department of the state and Portland chambers of commerce has had letters from Oklahoma City, Chicago and Detroit with definite assurance that groups including as many as fifteen families were making arrangements to purchase Oregon farms.

Dairying on a small scale, with poultry as another money maker, is the activity looked forward to by five families in Oklahoma City. These experienced farmers are equipped with good health, lots of courage, some ready cash and good thoroughbred stock which they will bring with them. In addition, they will be joined by another of their former neighbors now sojourning in California. Information concerning farm opportunities in all parts of the state has been furnished to these people, and it is probable the district along the lower Columbia river will win them, owing to their previous knowledge of its dairying and poultry opportunities.

From Chicago come the news that fifteen families are seeking farm locations to which they may come soon. Life in the city has proved very unsatisfactory to these people of farm training and they desire to come to the reasonably priced lands, mild winters and chance for success that they are convinced Oregon offers.

The industrial situation in Detroit and other factory centers is helping to strengthen the "back to the farm" movement toward Oregon in the opinion of many in correspondence with W. G. Ide, who is directing the land settlement work. The Michigan factory worker who has once been a farmer turns alike with disappointment from the factory and the eighty-acre tract where the winters are long and cold. Large numbers of these industrial workers are looking with interest to the farm lands of Oregon. The year 1927 promises to find many of them established on twenty-acre tracts where diversified farming as well as specialty production will afford their families a satisfactory living in the mild climate they desire.

Inquiries to the department are coming in good volume through the railroads, in response to advertisements placed by the department in farm journals and as a result of the growing interest and attention being directed toward the Northwest.

## IN THE REALM OF SPORTS

EL PASO, Texas, Jan. 24.—Tommy Armour of the Congressional Club, Washington, D. C., played premier golf Sunday for a 128 low in El Paso's first annual \$2,500 golf tournament with a score for the 72 holes of 288. Armour's final stroke, at the close of the last round was golf of championship caliber. Trapped in the ditch by a great cottonwood at the 15th, Armour brought a great cheer from the gallery when he holed out with a pitch shot.

Joe Kirkwood and Johnny Gold tied for second place by turning in a card of 292, splitting the combined second and third place.

**PRINCETON DEFENDED**  
CHICAGO, Jan. 24.—A widening circle of denial and regret of Wm. D. Hubbard's charges that Princeton played dirty football against Harvard rose from the two universities today. For the magazine Liberty, Hubbard who played guard for Harvard, wrote an article in which he named Harvard players who he said had been injured deliberately by Princeton.

Dr. Charles W. Kennedy, chairman of the Princeton University board of athletic control, declared Hubbard's charges "unworthy of answer from Princeton." Instead he offered the testimony of F. W. Murphy, of Brown University; W. R. Oleson, of Lehigh, and W. C. Crowell, of Swarthmore, all of whom have served as officials in Harvard-Princeton battles from 1919 to 1926 during which period Hubbard charged that eyes were gouged, limbs broken, and other injuries inflicted.

The officials were unanimous in their statements that the games were cleanly played; that injuries were not maliciously inflicted; and the conduct of players most sportsmanlike, as befitting play between "gentlemen coached by gentlemen."

From contemporaries of Hubbard in Harvard football came reports that such feeling between

### LOMSKI BEATS FLOWERS

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 24.—The clowning, slapping and missing of Tiger Flowers, former middleweight ring champion lost him his argument with Leo Lomski, of Aberdeen, Wash., here today. Lomski missed almost as many blows as the Deacon-Tiger, but he scored with the referee by landing almost two to one.

Although Lomski's left eye was practically closed when the final going rang, the negro fighter showed the results of heavier punishment. He was bleeding freely at the nose and mouth. Ringsiders gave the Aberdeen scrapper seven rounds, awarded Flowers one, and called the fifth and sixth even. There were no knockdowns, although Lomski stumbled to his knees in the third while delivering a right swing to Flower's jaw. Both started to bleed in this round. Flowers at the mouth and Lomski at the nose.

### Collins at Old Station

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 24.—A new infield built around Eddie Collins, his star second baseman of championship days, carries the pennant hopes of 64-year-old Connie Mack in his 27th season as manager of the Philadelphia Athletics.

Returning to the same post he occupied in Mack's famous \$100,000 infield combination sixteen years ago, Collins, deposed leader of the White Sox, will have new Philadelphia co-workers on both right and left. Connie has indicated. Replacing Galloway at shortstop will be Joe Boley, acquired from the Baltimore Internationals, while at first base will be Dudley Brannom, hard hitting star from the Kansas City of the American association. Jimmy Dykes again is slated for third base.

With the combination as a starter, Mack will have probably the best equipped reserve infield in organized baseball, with Poole for first base; Bishop, second; Galloway, short, and Hale, third.

The changes have been made primarily to bolster one of the weakest hitting clubs of the 1926 American league campaign. In Collins and Brannom he has obtained two players who hit well over 300 last year. Boley also climbed into the select group of the International.

### Zach Wheat in Lineup

One more heavy artilleryman for the lineup was obtained in the signing of the veteran former Brooklyn outfielder, Zach Wheat, who for years finished among the national league batting leaders. Zach appeared slated to patrol left field, with Al Simmons in center and Walter French in right. West and Wilson from Waco, Texas, and Metzler of Wichita Falls will seek to displace the veterans, while Mack also may find room for Bill La Mar.

The pitching staff, holding over from last year, includes Howard Ehmke, Sam Gray, Ed Rommel and Jack Quinn, right handers, and Grove Willis, Walberg and Pete, southpaws. Darrah and Hunter from Dallas, Shores from Wichita Falls, and Yerkes, a Philadelphia product, also are possibilities.

Mickey Cochrane, St. Perkins and Jimmy Fox again will handle the catching assignment.

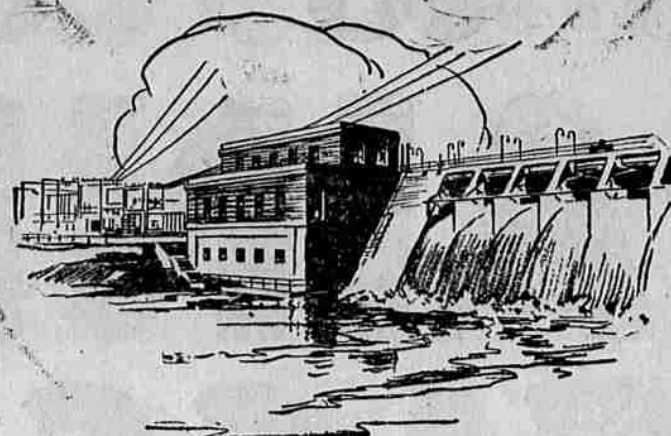
