MARINE GUARD OF MAILS DECREASED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—Five hundred marines were withdrawn today from the mail guard. Today's withdrawal leaves 1500 marines on duty as mail guards. General Lejeune said that estimates soon to be submitted to congress should provide for maintenance of 1,000 marine mail guards until July 1. The February 15 withdrawal will reduce the actual to that figure.

PORTLAND GIVEN RELIEF FROM COLD

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 25.—Gradual relief from the cold spell of the past week was experienced here today. The weather bureau continued to forecast rain. The temperature was around the freezing point early today, with gradual rise throughout the morning.

Bus service on the upper Columbia River highway was suspended yesterday afternoon, but snow plows were at work today and service was expected to be resumed late today. Bus service in other directions was uninterrupted.

COOLIDGE DROPS WOODS AS NOMINEE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—The nomination of Cyrus E. Woods of Pennsylvania as a member of the Interstate Commerce Commission, selected yesterday by the senate will not be re-submitted, it was said today at the White House.

DEMOCRATS PRESS TAX SLASH PLAN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—The democratic proposal for a \$355,000,000 tax reduction, effective next year is to be offered as an amendment to the \$175,000,000 deficiency bill now pending in the senate. The Porter resolution proposing that the United States act independently of other nations in its dealings with China was approved today by the house foreign affairs committee.

NO GRAZING FEE BOOST—JARDINE

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 25.—There will be no increase in grazing fees this year. This definite announcement was made today by W. M. Jardine, secretary of agriculture. It came during his address before the National Livestock convention here and was received with applause by the livestock men attending the convention.

BROCCOLI CROP NOT DAMAGED BY RECENT FROSTS

Little damage was done to the broccoli crop by the two days of freezing weather last week, according to reports from the various parts of the county. Growers were greatly worried during the cold spell and feared that there would be heavy losses, but careful examinations in fields in all sections have failed to reveal any appreciable amount of injury to the plants. In a few cases where early heads were maturing there was some loss, but the bulk of the crop was untouched.

SUIT TO ENJOIN ROAD BOND ISSUE LOST ON APPEAL

SALFEM, Ore., Jan. 25.—The Salmon River-Grand Ronde highway improvement district, an illegally issued and self highway improvement bonds in the sum of \$125,000 for the purpose of building permanent roads within the district, according to an opinion of the supreme court today in the case of E. I. Warren, appellant, versus Salmon River-Grand Ronde highway improvement district et al. The suit was brought to enjoin the defendants from issuing the bonds because of alleged unconstitutionality of chapter 399 laws of 1919 under which the district was organized. It was asserted by the appellant that the bonded indebtedness which the district proposed to create, exceeded 6 per cent valuation of all property in the country and therefore in conflict with section 10, article 11 of the Oregon constitution.

The appeal was from Yamhill county; W. M. Ramsey, judge.

Umpqua Valley Bank vs. H. L. Wilson, appellant; appeal from \$3,750.05 with interest upon some promissory notes. Opinion by Justice Bean. Judge C. M. Thomas affirmed.

VESSEL IN FLAMES NEAR SAN PEDRO

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Jan. 25.—The naval radio compass station at Point Fermin shortly before 1 p. m. today informed the marine exchange that a vessel of about 500 tons apparently was on fire off Point Vincente, bound into San Pedro. A naval tug was ordered to the assistance of the vessel, the name of which was unknown, and fire boats here also were ordered to stand by.
