VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 26.—Negotiations between T. D. Patullo, provincial minister of lands, and James H. Lawson, attorney for Crown Willamette paper interests of San Francisco, were completed here today for the beginning of a five year \$15,000,000 development program on Campbell River Falls, on the east coast of Vancouver Island.

CHAPLIN LAWYERS HALT ATTEMPT TO COLLECT ALIMONY

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 26.—Beat on again in their effort to collect \$14,400 temporary alimony and attorney's fees the legal forces of Lila Grey Chaplin today were forced to take another tack in their assault upon the millions of Charlie Spencer Chaplin, screen comedian.

Lawyers retained by the motion picture star to combat Mrs. Chaplin's suit for divorce and a share of his fortunes yesterday obtained an appellate court order enjoining the payment of the alimony award pending hearing of the rejoining receivers of Chaplin's proceivship case in a high court.

It was a surprise move on the part of Chaplin's attorneys and it left Mrs. Chaplin's superior court alimony order temporarily worthless. In obtaining the restraining writ the screen star's attorneys set

forth that the superior court, which had granted the alimony order had been without jurisdiction because legal notice of the action had not been served on Chaplin. The appellate court set next Tuesday morning for the hearing of argument on a motion to make the prohibitive writ permanent and prevent the payment of additional alimony installments of \$4,000 a month awarded the actor's wife by the lower court.

combat a motion filed yesterday by Crandell asking suppression of evidence obtained in raids on Dobbs' home and office on the ground that no search warrant had been obtained and the search was therefore illegal.

Dobbs' children, his son, Ralph, and his daughter, Bonita, told authorities today that they had seen and talked with their father in their home and in a nearby drug store about the same time two Coalfield brothers testified they had seen a man they identified as Dobbs leaning over the Juanita bridge near Kirkland and acting suspiciously the night Letitia Whitehall disappeared.

The story of the Coalfield boys, James L. and William Gerard, was regarded by the prosecution as the strongest link in the chain of evidence against Dobbs. They said

they had seen the form of a girl, either unconscious or drunk, in the automobile of the man they had seen on the bridge and that the man seemed startled and hurriedly drove away when he saw them approach.

ACCUSED PAIR LOSES IN EXTRADITION HEARING

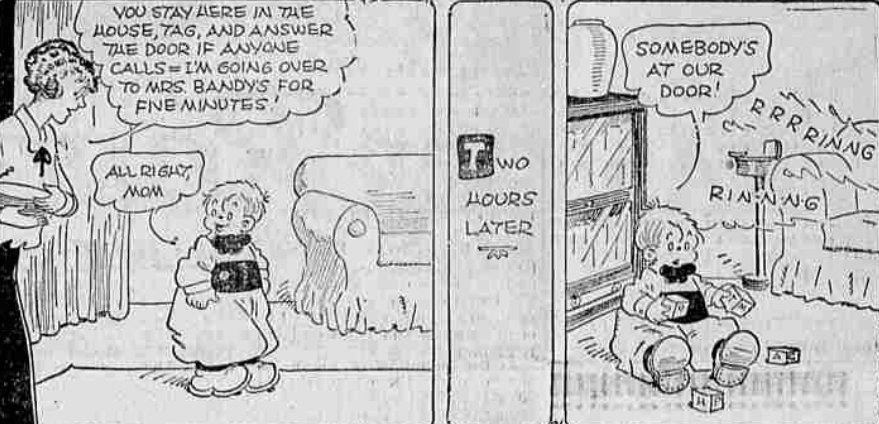
