tural lands is the aim of a bill which has been introduced in the legislature. The proposed legislation, known as House Bill No. 34, has called forth the endorsement of the leading chambers of commerce in every section of the state, who see in it an effective means of perpetuating the work of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce in bringing selected settlers to the lands of the state.

Provision is made in the bill for a commission of five members, three of whom shall consist of the location within Oregon of new settlers and new capital, the method of disbursing of these funds being subject to the approval of the commission.

Through the affiliated efforts of the Oregon State Chamber and the Portland Chamber of Commerce during the last two years, 2300 new settlers have been placed on Oregon farms. They have invested more than ten million dollars of new capital in the state at a cost of less than \$40 per family to bring them here. There are now three thousand prospective settlers who have signed the questionnaires used by the Land Settlement Department, stating definitely that they are coming to Oregon.

Supporters of the bill explain that the funds which it provides will be used in securing settlers and giving them service, salaries and other overhead expense being otherwise secured.

O. V. PIERCE LOSES DAMAGE SUIT IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Jan. 26.—A jury in Circuit Judge Stevenson's court yesterday awarded Walter S. Collins a judgment totaling \$10,216 against O. V. Pierce, damages for personal injuries. No defense was offered. The plaintiff alleged that he was injured while a passenger in the defendant's automobile February 7, 1926, while riding between Roseburg and Albany, Ore. According to the complaint, due to the negligence of the defendant, the car left the Pacific highway, went over the embankment and collided with a tree.

NEARLY 400 FIND TRACTOR SCHOOL A REAL BENEFIT

Approximately 400 farmers and tractor owners assembled at the C. A. Lockwood Motor company sales and display rooms in this city today to take in the tractor school that was sponsored by the Ford Motor Company. Several hundred chairs were grouped in the main building, and in the center stood a Fordson ready for the expert's physical analysis of how a tractor is built. 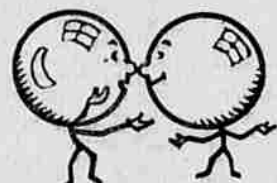
