ALLOCATION OF COIN FOR STATE SCHOOL MADE

This amount was set aside for bounties.

Reconsideration also was given the state board of health and the bureau of nursing. The board of health which a few nights ago was cut from a requested \$75,445 to \$40,000 was last night raised to \$65,000. The bureau of nursing, which the board voted recently to discontinue, was given \$13,530, all it asked. The bureau of child hygiene got the full amount of its estimate, or \$15,000.

Governor's Request Up
After a debate the ways and means committee last night was unable to decide just what ought to be contained in Governor Patterson's budget bill, whether the measure should be introduced forthwith, or whether it ought to go in a committee bill or only with the names of part of the committee on the back of it.

The upshot was, over the protest of Senator Bell, that the committee tied up until tonight when a governor will be invited in to discuss it with the committee. The bill is the administration measure that would make the governor the budget making official of the state.

When the bill came up for discussion Senator Bell informed the committee that with the consent of the governor a clause had been added authorizing the governor to appoint a budget director who would be confirmed or rejected by the senate.

Senator Strayer objected because of the freedom the bill allows for miscellaneous claims.

"I think," said Strayer, "that it ought to be limited to the legitimate state activities. I don't think it ought to open the door to everybody and to every municipality who wants to put a claim before the state. As the bill is now we will have a budget of a thousand pages."

Irrigation and Billiard
The house yesterday afternoon adopted a house joint resolution number 3 which would repeal that section of the state constitution permitting the state to guarantee interest on irrigation district bonds for a period of five years. The measure, if adopted by the senate, must be submitted to the people.

A license fee of \$10 a year would be paid to county treasurers of the state for each billiard table operated in a county, with the provision that the total tax paid by the operator would not exceed \$50, in accordance with house bill 266 introduced yesterday afternoon by the repeal of laws committee. The bill takes the place of house bill number 167 which has been withdrawn.

It was announced that Representative Charles Laffollet, Washington county, intends to withdraw house bill number 240 which provides for a poll tax. The proposed law is said to be unconstitutional.

Tax Limit Vote Asked
The house by a vote of 37 to 20 this morning voted to submit to the people a proposal for repealing section 11, article 11 of the constitution which is the six per cent tax increase limitation.

To meet the possibility that the height and clearance of the Columbia River bridge at Longview be increased to permit free access of shipping to Portland harbor, the joint Multnomah delegation today introduced a bill in the senate that would authorize the Port of Portland to assist in the construction of the bridge. Port officials believe they have the authority but the bill would make it clear legally. The measure also authorizes the issuance of bonds for the purpose.

Game Law Changes
Slaying of deer and shooting of birds on the water with bow and arrow will be legal in Oregon if a bill introduced today in the legislature by Representative Cramer of Josephine county is enacted.

This provision is included among changes in the game code approved by Game Warden E. F. Averill. Sale of deer hides legally taken, and catching of ten-inch trout the year round in the main part of streams flowing to tide-water are other changes proposed.

Income Tax Inquiry
The house this morning adopted house joint memorial number 3 calling for the appointment of a commission to meet with similar bodies from the states of California and Washington to study the feasibility of a uniform income tax for the three states.

AMERICA TAKES NO SIDE IN THE CHINESE FUSS

ing in China. The nationalist spirit, in my judgment, is uniting those people and I look to see them ultimately accomplish their complete redemption as a great power and take their rightful place among the family of nations. I thoroughly sympathize with what they are doing.

Display Incites
"It is inevitable, of course, that some wrongs will be committed and some injuries done to innocent people in the bringing about of the final results. But I see every indication upon the part of the Chinese at the present time to protect the lives and property of foreigners to the utmost of their ability."

"The only thing which, in my judgment, may change that program will be just such things as the sending of fleets and armies to China with a view of crushing this spirit through force."

"I would not embarrass or seem to impede China in her great struggle. I think, if I may say so, the action of Great Britain in sending a larger fleet and larger forces to China may have a very disastrous result."

Has Faith in Chinese
"China is entitled to be rid of the old antiquated, unjust and unilateral treaties. She is entitled to enjoy tariff autonomy. She is entitled in my judgment to be rid of extra territorial rights. I venture to express the belief that she will achieve these things. If the nations do not assist, do not voluntarily aid in bringing it about, we shall likely see the same thing accomplished through the decree of the Chinese people."

"The United States should not hesitate to announce her own policy if it be necessary to do so. Our interest and the interest of justice demand a free and disenthralled China and our policy should look to that achievement."

Britain States Demands
LONDON, Jan. 27.—The proposals which Charge d'Affaires O'Malley has been authorized to make to the Chinese foreign minister at Hankow are understood to embrace terms for the complete eventual surrender of the British concessions throughout China, including extra-territoriality, and plans for new treaties supplanting the present "unequal" ones.

Meanwhile, the British government is keeping the United States, Japan and other interested powers fully informed on the negotiations between Chen and Mr. O'Malley, which are expected to have a most important bearing on the whole crisis arising out of the anti-foreign excesses in the Yangtze valley.

In making their proposals to Chen, the British have been most careful to state that identical terms will be made to other Chinese authorities—that is, the Peking government—thus preventing the impression that Great Britain recognizes the Canton government as the responsible authority for all of China.

U. S. Position Stated
WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—The United States has notified all Chinese factions and the powers signatory to the Washington conference treaties that if proper delegates can be agreed upon in the war-torn country it stands ready to transact, either in concert with other nations or alone, if necessary, a new tariff and extra territorial treaties with China.

However, until new treaties are negotiated with "somebody representing China," and ratified by the senate, existing pacts "cannot be abrogated."

These are the cardinal points in Secretary Kellogg's long waited Chinese policy declaration, made public last night, in the form of a "statement," and making no mention of the British memorandum on the subject, to which it had first been planned to be an answer. The pronouncement was made public simultaneously in Peking, Hankow and Shanghai.

Neutrality Favored
It pointed out that American naval forces will be held in Chinese waters to protect American life and property in event the Chinese authorities are unable to afford such protection," asserted the United States has watched with sympathetic interest the nationalist awakening of China, and expressed a desire to observe strict neutrality as between Chinese factions and to deal with that country in "a most liberal spirit" as to unequal treaties.

All that was required of China, the statement said, was protection, and "equal opportunity with the citizens of other powers to trade in China and to pursue their legitimate occupations without special privileges, monopolies or special interest or influence."

No U. S. Concessions
While the statement on its face did not develop any wide variance of viewpoint with that outlined by the British, it did point out that the United States held no concessions in China. On this point, President Coolidge bore witness in American and British policy in dealing with China.

The statement also asserted the United States, "has never manifested any imperialistic attitude" toward China and said the only question before it in considering a new treaty was "with whom it shall negotiate."

"If China can agree upon the appointment of delegates representing the authorities or the people of the country," it said, "we are prepared to negotiate such a treaty."

Customs Treaty Sought
Regarding the existing Chinese customs treaty, it was pointed out that the United States is now and has been since the Washington conference ready to negotiate agreements making effective the Washington surtaxes and treaties "entirely releasing traffic control and restoring complete tariff autonomy to China."

Mr. Kellogg said American delegates to the Peking customs conference, inaugurated in 1925 by a Chinese revolution, had been authorized and were expected to sign such a treaty.

Shanghai Coveted Goal
LONDON, Jan. 27.—For the next six weeks British officialdom will focus its attention on Shanghai, for on developments there depends whether the British defense force of about 20,000 men now being mobilized, will be brought into actual service.

A race is on for the pivotal city between the British land and sea forces and the Chinese nationalists of the southern, or Cantonese army. Should the Cantonese get near enough to the great international settlement to cause a situation in any way threatening the life and property of foreigners, then, and then only, the British foreign office says, his majesty's forces, in company with available Japanese, French and American troops, will be spread along a 21-mile line so as to completely cut off Shanghai from the interior.

Protection Sole Aim
Emphasis is given by the foreign office to its statement that the question of control of Chekiang province up to the limits of Shanghai's international settlement is one solely between the governor

of Chekiang, Marshal Sun Chuan Fang, and the attacking Cantonese army of General Chiang Katsen, in which the British will not interfere. Nothing will be done if the Cantonese succeed in capturing and occupying the native city of Shanghai, but should the foreign quarter be jeopardized, prompt action will be taken.

"There is no state of war in China and won't be if we can prevent," said Lieutenant General Philip Chetwood, commander in chief at Aldershot, as he bade farewell to a contingent leaving for China. He told the soldiers they "were going to protect property we hold," and admonished them to "keep your temper smilingly."

MEXICAN REBELS INFLECT LOSS ON FEDERAL FORCES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 27.—Urbano Lavin, former governor of the state of Guerrero, and eleven others have been killed in an encounter with federal forces at Xochipala, state of Morelos, in which the rebel leaders, former General Luis Quiroz, Augustin Mendoza and Marcelino Castrejon were wounded. The rebels belonged to a group commanded by Victor Barcenas, which finally was forced to disperse after a number of clashes with federal soldiers the last few days.

Pachuca dispatches say that one man was killed and six were captured when federal forces surrounded a house at Tepic del Rio, state of Hidalgo, where a group of conspirators were organizing an uprising. The conspirators offered resistance and a brisk clash ensued, Jose Flores being killed. The war department is investigating reports
