SECOND SEMESTER IN CITY SCHOOLS STARTING MONDAY

Examinations Being Completed and Graduations and Promotions Are Announced.

Today marks the end of the first semester in the city schools, the new term starting next Monday. During the past week the pupils have been engaged in final examinations, which were concluded today, and promotions are next in order.

CARELESSNESS IS CAUSE OF MOST FIRES IN FORESTS

That smokers were responsible for 35 per cent of all the man-caused forest fires started on the national forests of Oregon and Washington during 1926, is shown by the annual fire report just compiled by the U. S. Forest Service, Portland, Oregon. Out of 800 man-caused forest fires, 281 were due to careless smokers, according to the report.

Campers are a close second with 236 forest fires, or 28 per cent due to neglected campfires. Third in the list is the incendiary, charged with 88 fires. Of this total, however, 55 were in or near the Umpqua National Forest in Douglas county.

Other offenders in the list of man-caused forest fires are: Railroads, 83; brush burning, 31; and lumbering, 22; the remaining 59 fires were due to miscellaneous human agencies.

In addition to the 800 man-caused forest fires, there were 690 lightning fires, making a total for the national forest regions of Oregon and Washington of 1490 forest fires. These fires caused an estimated damage of \$638,351, burned over 241,432 acres of land and cost \$500,070 to suppress.

Of the smokers' fires, 204 were on the national forests of Oregon and 77 were on the national forests of Washington. National forest campers caused 168 fires in Oregon and 68 in Washington.

"We still have too many man-caused fires in this district," said A. O. Waha, Assistant District Forester in charge of Operation, in commenting on the report. "We appreciate the interest and cooperation of many of the forest using public in keeping down the forest fire hazard, but so long as we have such a high percentage of smokers' and campers' fires, it will be necessary to close portions of the national forests during periods of high fire danger, as was done last summer. Closing the national forests interferes with summer camping and recreation plans of many people, but there will be no camping places if the careless smoker and the thoughtless camper are allowed to burn all the forests. It's every citizen's job not only to practice but preach care with fire in the forest."

Asked to suggest a rule which would prevent man-caused forest fires, Mr. Waha said: "Be sure you put out the last spark."
