MOVIE SELL-OUT BY WRITERS HIT BY ENGLISH POET CHICAGO, Jan. 28—The lure of the films, tempting with fame and fortune, is causing many writers to "sell their divine birthright," Cecil Roberts, English poet and novelist, told members of the English speaking union here. "I have yet to meet an author, no matter how famous, who is not pined to have one of his stories filmed," Mr. Roberts said. "Yet this is one of the most dangerous tendencies among novelists today. When their story is sold for filming it might be compared to a corpse for it is immediately dissected and loses all resemblance to its former self. When, then, a writer has sold and subscribed his name to a product which is no longer his, he gradually loses his essential integrity.
