THE GIST OF THE BIBLE BOOK BY BOOK

ARTICLE NO. 46

FIRST CORINTHIANS—FAULTS CORRECTED

In the eighteenth chapter of The Acts we read of the eighteen months ministry of Paul in the City of Corinth on his second missionary journey. During this time he founded the church to which he wrote this letter from Ephesus about three years later, probably in the Spring of the year 57.

While we call it "The First Epistle to the Corinthians," it was preceded by an earlier epistle, now lost, to which Paul refers in 5:9. In reply to this earlier epistle Paul's advice was asked on a number of questions of vital importance to the Christians of Corinth.

To answer these questions as well as to correct certain faults of the church of which Paul had heard he wrote this letter.

The first four chapters correct the party spirit which had divided the Corinthian Christians into rival factions bearing the names of Paul, Apollos, Peter and Christ. Paul's cure for this fault then and now was that all human teachers should be submerged and lost in Christ "as ministers of Christ and stewards of the mysteries of God."

Chapters five and six correct the immorality existing unrebuked in the church and also the fault of church members going to law before heathen tribunals to settle their differences.

Chapter seven answers questions they had asked about the married relation, its advantages and disadvantages, its use and abuse in the immoral surroundings of the Corinthians of that day.

Chapters eight to ten proclaim in a masterly manner the interrelation of the fundamental social principles of liberty and love for the guidance of the Christian's conduct in "things questionable." "Personal liberty" is not to be allowed to place a stumbling-block in the way of the weaker brother. The law of love is supreme, even to liberty. "If meat make my brother to offend, I will eat no flesh while the world standeth, lest I make my brother to offend." Paul's rule for the determination of a Christian's duty in "things questionable" is still unexcelled, viz., "Whatever ye do, do all to the glory of God."

Chapters eleven to fourteen correct their abuse of the Lord's Supper and their misuse of spiritual gifts and the rivalry between those possessing different gifts. The controlling principle is love, on which Paul writes a classic in the thirteenth chapter which is unexcelled in all literature. "Love never faileth." Truly, it is "the greatest thing in the world."

Chapter fifteen is the great resurrection chapter with its grand exhortation of victory for the Christian over sin, death and the grave. "O Death, where is thy sting? O Grave, where is thy victory?" Thanks be to God which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

This is the climax of the doctrine of the epistle, which Paul immediately hitches up to practice: "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

The former manager of the Detroit Tigers said he was "going back for one more big year" after having been vindicated by Commissioner of Baseball Landis of charges brought by "Dutch" Leonard, but that he had not decided where he would play.

In what he termed his first "official" statement since reading Landis' decision exonerating him, Cobb said he did not want it said that his last game had been played while he was under a cloud of suspicion and that he felt he was "honored" to get back to baseball.

"I fully intended to retire permanently," the Georgia peach continued, "but since this thing has come up I have decided I will have to go back and have one more big year."

the United States.

Volstead Law Supreme

He pointed out that the supreme court has upheld the Volstead provision of one half of one per cent, and that if there should be a substitute for the Volstead law, with a provision for higher alcohol content, it necessarily would be unconstitutional.

"Under the constitution as it now stands, there is no possibility of enacting valid regulatory legislation which will permit the traffic in liquor containing a percentage of alcohol high enough to be intoxicating."

"I believe that if an attempt were made to repeal the Volstead act, and to substitute therefor an unconstitutional statute, or no statute at all, the supreme court would be constitutionally bound to hold that the attempt repeal was void and of no effect and that the Volstead act would still remain the law of the land until there was substituted for it some other statute equally unconstitutional, with the eighteenth amendment and which could be held to provide the essentials of effective enforcement."
