GRANTS PASS IS JUBILANT OVER COAST OUTLET

Improvement of Harbor at Crescent City to Unite Two Rich Regions.

CÉLEBRATION STAGED

Northern California Joins With Southern Oregon in Preparation for Mutual Benefit.

The celebration held at Grants Pass last night to celebrate the signing of the Crescent City harbor bill was one of great significance, according to the members of the large Roseburg delegation, which returned early this morning. The Crescent City harbor improvement is one of the most important steps in the development of the extreme Southern Oregon and Northern California districts, and the signing of the bill, which gives a government appropriation for the harbor, has been the cause of much rejoicing.

At the meeting last night there was a large representation from all over Southern Oregon and Northern California, and the spirit developed at the gathering indicated that there is to be a cooperation between these sections that will accomplish a great deal.

Naturally Portland is interested in the development of the Northern part of Oregon, although, the metropolis has done much for Southern Oregon.

Communities United
San Francisco and Los Angeles controlling the development activities of California, have centered largely on the southern and central parts of that state, leaving the southern part of Oregon and northern part of California to work out their own improvements. So far each community has been working independently, but it is believed that as a result of the meeting held last night at Grants Pass there will be closer harmony between the cities in the future and greater cooperation in major projects.

Crescent City, Klamath Falls, Medford, Ashland and Roseburg were all well represented, and the speakers stressed this fact as being significant in that it indicated a feeling of mutual interest between these cities.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Jan. 29.—President Irving Vining of the State Chamber of Commerce last night predicted an era of progress for the mid-Pacific coast empire, at the jubilee celebrating the appropriation of funds for the completion of Crescent City, Calif., harbor. The greatest outburst of enthusiasm ever evidenced in this part of the valley was seen at the rally, which was attended by fully 500 guests from Crescent City, Medford, Ashland, Klamath Falls and Roseburg. Nearly all of the smaller towns of the region also had their representatives. More than 700 persons were present.

Governor I. L. Patterson was represented by Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, who forecast rail developments between the Rogue Valley and the coast, following the announcement of harbor construction.

J. J. Murphy, California state senator from Weed, announced that California will complete the paving of the Pacific highway to the Oregon line, to connect with the Oregon pavement, with funds derived from a gas tax soon to be approved.

Other speakers included John L. Childs, Crescent City; C. E. Gaves, Medford, and Isaac Best, Grants Pass, members of the delegation which secured the appropriation at Washington.

More than 100 persons came from Crescent City to attend the meeting. Medford had about 75, Roseburg had over 20 present.

LEO LOMSKI PAYS \$50 LIQUOR FINE IN EUGENE COURT

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 29.—Leo Lomski, well known boxer and pugilist, was arrested here this morning on liquor possession charges. Lomski paid a fine of \$50 and McNeal \$75 when they entered pleas of guilty before Judge Harold J. Wells in justice court.

Lomski and McNeal, with another man and two women, were traveling north from Los Angeles in two cars. The party stopped here over night and left early this morning for the north. The arrest was made just outside the city limits, and after the fines were paid, the party continued on its way.

The pugilist thanked the officers for their courteous treatment, seeming not in the least chagrined. He gave one of the officers, Frank Caroon, two pictures, signed with his name and best wishes.

Lomski said that he was in a hurry to get to Aberdeen, where a big "home coming" welcome awaited him in celebration of his 10-round victory over Tiger Flowers on January 22.

UMPUQUA FOREST HAS BUSY YEAR REPORT SHOWS

Total of 141 Fires Handled During the Season of 1926.

ROADS ARE BUILT

One of Most Important Jobs Connects Diamond Lake With Natron Cut-Off.

With 141 fires put out at a total cost of \$27,000, with grazing permits issued for 13,174 sheep and 851 cattle, and with nine miles of new road built, four and one-half miles reconditioned and 86 miles of road maintained for a total expenditure on roads of \$40,000, and with 866 miles of trails maintained, 32 miles bettered and 133 miles of new trail constructed for a total cost for trails of \$20,465 the Umpqua national forest reports a busy year in 1926. Eight and one-half miles of new telephone line was built and 500 miles maintained at an outlay of \$216. Also construction and improvement work on lookout houses, bridges, campgrounds and stations.

The Anderson and Middleton sale at Rujada, the only large sale on the forest, was inactive during the year except for railroad construction work. Timber sale business was confined to a few small sales of Port Orford cedar in Coos county. A stumpage price of from \$10 to \$12.50 per thousand feet was received in these small sales with operators anxious to take all that was offered.

Recreationists to the number of 34,114 made use of the Umpqua forest's roads, trails and camp grounds to enjoy the hunting, fishing and other recreational features offered. These visitors were distributed by ranger districts as follows: Bohemia district 212, North Umpqua district 526, Quartz Mt. district 236, South Umpqua district 1640 and Diamond lake district 31,500. About 30,000 people visited Diamond lake last summer; 15,000 came in their own cars and many used of the free camp provided by the forest service.

The 1926 fire season was a hazardous one from the weather standpoint and it was made more serious by the number of fires that were set by incendiaries. Of the total of 141 fires, 77 were set by lightning, practically all the result of one storm, July 10 and 11; five were the result of camp fires, three were attributed to smokers, one to lumbering and all the rest of the fires, 55 in number were classed as incendiary.

However, only 2992 acres were burned over and the total damage is estimated not to exceed \$7000. Five hundred miles of telephone lines form a net work over the forest, this makes it possible to get reports on fires and start men to them in a short time after they are first discovered. Every effort is made to get to every fire while it is small.

The efficiency of the firemen and lookouts employed is shown by the reports which record that 71 fires were confined to one-fourth acre (Continued on page 3.)

SMITH-M'ADOO DEBATE Aired IN U. S. SENATE

Former Cabinet Member's Scoring of Wet States Rouses Resentment.

FOES SPEAK PLAINLY

Governor Smith Declared Law Abiding; National Campaign Launched From New York.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—A Smith-McAdoo wet and dry debate divided the Democratic side of the senate today.

The argument was opened by Senator Bruce, Democrat, Maryland and New York in his Toledo speech last night by charging that they were in rebellion against the United States for not passing a state prohibition enforcement law.

"That sort of stuff is nothing but mere clap-trap and shows that some people are dead and do not even know they are dead," said Bruce.

The defense of McAdoo was taken up by Senator King of Utah, a Democrat. He said that although he did not subscribe to all of McAdoo's views, he regarded him as one of the best secretaries of the treasury the country ever had.

Copeland Defends Smith.
Rising to second Senator Bruce, Senator Copeland of New York, Democrat, declared that New York also resented McAdoo's accusation. The empire state is opposed to a separate state prohibition enforcement law, he said, because it places its citizenship in double jeopardy, but he added that the state believed in enforcing all laws.

"Do I understand that Al Smith favored the Volstead Act?" he inquired Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho.

"Governor Smith believes in enforcing the Volstead Act as long as it is upon the statute books," replied Copeland.

The New York senator added that his state favored amendment of the dry statutes, but was not demanding the return of the open saloon.

Violators Encouraged.
This brought Senator Caraway, Democrat, Arkansas, into the discussion with the charge that senate debate was "encouraging violations of the Volstead Act and has led many people to jail."

"If anybody listens to the speeches here, they are constantly invited to violate the law," the Arkansas senator continued. "Why bill, but the discussions have not preceded far enough to indicate the exact nature of the agreement."

HAUGEN READY TO BATTLE FOR FARM RELIEF MEASURE
WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Chairman Haugen of the house agricultural committee will appear before the rule committee Monday to arrange for early debate on farm relief. He intends to ask for ten hours discussion to be divided between advocates of the McNary-Haugen bill and those who have decided to support the Curtis-Crisp bill. Meanwhile a move is under way by the McNary-Haugen supporters to compromise with southern Democrats who oppose the equalization fee principles of that bill, but the discussions have not preceded far enough to indicate the exact nature of the agreement.

Wife Strikes at Browning's Publicity, a Sudden, Painful Wallop

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—"I will never wear my diamond engagement ring again—until I am sure nobody will take it away from me," said Peaches Browning at Carmel, N. Y., when she made her entrance on the courtroom stage.

This much-headlined youngster appeared at the opening of Edward W. Browning's suit for separation wearing the diamond studded wedding band but not the blazing solitaire which she had received last spring in the palmy days of romance.

Was it sweet sad sentiment or the outraged pride of a sensitive woman that made her remove it?

Not much! It was a characteristic fear that someone might lift it from her. Who that someone was, she only hinted. Jewels came hard in Peaches' early life, and what she gets she keeps. The diamond is hidden away in her safety deposit vault.

But the rest of Peaches' trophies, less liable to theft, were represented in evidence. French blue gown, mauve feathered hat and sable coat, plus a few tears discreetly shed, made up her costume.

The sables were significant. Sables for sale, Daddy Browning might have offered, and Peaches was the bidder. She paid in return her own buxom person, a head of curly yellow hair, two baby blue eyes and a chin scarred by the mysterious acid burns. But with the sables she got Daddy Browning—a bonus she did not want.

"I am through with marriage, but not through with me," she said after adjournment of court.

"A woman can't be happy without love. She wants somebody's devotion. I want a home. I want peace."

But the home that harbors Peaches will be manless except for occasional visits from devoted swains.

While Daddy Browning watched her furiously with brown, bird-like eyes from across the table, Peaches dabbed at her blue eyes and told women reporters how she felt about it all.

"They call me a gold digger," she said brokenly, "but I'm not after money. I only want to get away to the end of the earth and be happy again. If marriage is like this, I'm off it."

"Perhaps next time it will be better luck, if it is not a May and December affair," suggested someone.

Peaches' blue eyes blazed. "Why not May and December?" she said. "I don't see anything wrong with that."

"What was wrong then?" asked a bystander.

"It was Daddy," she cried. "There is positively no chance at reconciliation, both sides agree. Peaches is angry. Daddy Browning is not, but he is deeply hurt because Peaches is trying to spoil his show. Her lawyers played a surprise card when they asked for a private hearing of the case."

Peaches has had enough publicity and wants to call quits. Daddy brought into court his big black suitcase full of evidence, with his initials in huge letters. WOMAN BADLY HURT IN AUTO SMASH LAST NIGHT

Mrs. L. V. Gates of Parrott Street Sustains Broken Hip When Cars Collide.

ACCIDENT, JURY SAYS IN FATAL PRIZEFIGHT
PITTSBURGH, Jan. 29.—Coroner's jury today returned a verdict of accidental death in the case of Leo Maher, who died from a fractured skull suffered in boxing match with Angelo Iovino Monday.

Mrs. L. V. Gates, aged 77, of North Parrott street, was seriously injured last night in an auto wreck which occurred about 9:30 o'clock at the intersection of Oak and Parrott streets. Mrs. Gates, who was a passenger in a car driven by Charles V. Stanton, a local newspaper man, sustained a broken hip, and numerous cuts and bruises.

Mr. Stanton was taking home some people from a church meeting and at the time of the wreck his car was occupied by Mrs. Gates and her daughter, Miss Rhea Gates. The car was proceeding west on Oak street, followed closely by a car driven by Wayne Riggs, a local high school student and occupied by a party of young folks who were out for a ride following the basketball game.

An Ford car, driven by Mr. Stanton, was turning into Parrott street, off Oak, the Dodge touring, driven by Mr. Riggs attempted to pass on the left and the two cars crashed and rolled over into Parrott street. Both machines were turned over on their sides, but with the exception of Mrs. Gates the occupants escaped injury.

The woman was taken immediately to her home, which was only a few doors away, and Dr. Wade an called. Treatment was given for relief, and an x-ray was made today revealing a fracture of the bone just above the hip. She was also suffering from bruises, cuts and shock.

The accident was thoroughly investigated by Traffic Officer Thurber and other officers, a complaint charging Mr. Riggs with reckless driving being sworn out this morning by the traffic officer.

TRUCK COLLIDES WITH BUS; 1 DEAD, ELEVEN INJURED

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Jan. 29.—One person was killed and eleven others hurt, two seriously, early today when a Boston to New York bus collided with a truck on the Boston post road in West Haven. There were between 20 and 25 passengers in the bus.

BEST PROTECTED CHINESE GIRL OF FRISCO IS SLAIN

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29.—Ham Leong, the butterfly of Little Canton, is dead by the hand of some slinking murderer. She was found in her silky, perfumed boudoir today with a pair of thin barber's shears thrust deep into her chest. All of her rich jewels were gone.

The killing of Ham Leong was no ordinary murder. She was the best protected woman in Chinatown because she was the favorite of a tong.

A big Cantonese gunman padded behind her wherever she went on the streets and guarded the door of her boudoir. But some wraith-like Nemesis slipped by him last night, armed with a pair of barber's shears.

Called to Carlton.

Chinese Consul at Portland Pays No. 3 \$30,000 to Settle Her Suit
PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 29.—Chinatown was gossiping a report that the divorce suit which Leong Ho brought recently against Moy Back Hin, wealthy Chinese consul, had been settled. This report stated that Moy Back Hin had paid approximately \$30,000 to Leong Ho, who claims to be the mother of Pearl Moy, the consul's youngest child. Moy Back Hin has contended that he never married Leong Ho and that Ah How is his wife and the mother of Pearl Moy.

The Portland Telegram today quotes Miss Donaldine Cameron, superintendent of the Chinese Presbyterian mission home of San Francisco, as saying that the settlement had been effected, but says that attorneys in the case deny the report. Miss Cameron came to Portland several days ago in the interest of Leong Ho and Pearl Moy.

The Telegram says a banquet was held in Chinatown last night to celebrate the peaceful conclusion of the divorce suit which has been threatening to shake the foundations of Portland's town.

But Dan J. Malarkey, one of the attorneys representing Moy Back Hin, said the case has not been settled. David Robinson, attorney for Leong Ho also denied that the settlement had been made.

Eviction Alleged
Filing of the suit recently brought a sensation to Portland, where Moy Back Hin has valuable real estate interests. Leong Ho claimed that the Chinese consul had driven her from his home, and contended that she was his wife, and the mother of three of his children. Pearl Moy and two others now dead. Moy Back Hin answered that he had never married Leong Ho, and that she had lived in his household only as a servant. He set forth that he had married in China to Eng She, who died, and later had married his present wife, Ah How.

The divorce case was before the circuit court January 4, when attorneys for Leong Ho argued a motion that they be granted \$25,000 attorneys' fee, \$10,000 suit money and \$500 temporary alimony for Leong Ho. Further arguments were set for January 18, but the case did not come up that day.
