LEGISLATURE TO TACKLE TAXATION LAWS NEXT WEEK

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Jan. 29.—The members of both houses of the legislature and Governor Patterson will return to the state house Monday with a determination to decide upon a tax and finance program before the end of next week.

Early in the week interest will center on the special message of the governor which he will deliver Tuesday or Wednesday on the subject of tax legislation.

With the session half gone the members of the committees on assessment and taxation have been working to arrive at some solution of the financial tangle, but so far without result, notwithstanding a greater variety of proposals and doctrines than ever before has been shovelled upon a legislative assembly.

Two Plans Considered. There is talk in legislative circles that a solution of the taxation and financial problem may be sought in a corporate excess tax and an income tax on partnerships and individuals.

During the last two days the leaders of both houses have been considering these two measures, and so has the coalition committee appointed at a meeting of men representing all involved interests last Wednesday. The members of the coalition committee are State Tax Commissioner Earl Fisher, representing the state; A. R. Shumway, representing the grange and the farmers union, and John Laine, representing the public utilities. The general meeting at which the committee was appointed

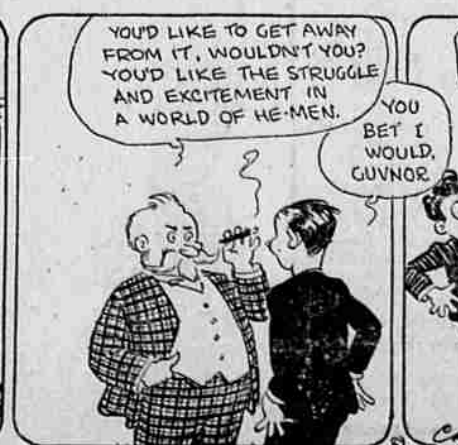
