M'TIGUE WHIPS
BERLENBACH IN 4
SLASHING ROUNDSReferee Halts One-Sided
Bout After "Oom Paul"
Is Sent to Canvas
Third Time.(Associated Press Local Wire.)
NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—Mike McTigue hammered with rejuvenated fists on the portals that lead to Tex Rickard's heavyweight elimination tournament.

In a thrilling four-round victory, as colorful as the flaming red trunks he wore, the former king of the light-heavyweight brigade last night belted into submission Paul Berlenbach, the man who once stripped him of the title. McTigue was credited with a technical knockout when the referee waved him away from the bleeding and helpless "Astoria Assassin" after two minutes and 34 seconds of fighting in the session.

Throwing caution to the four corners of Madison Square, McTigue, heretofore a cautious fighter, although a superlative boxer, ripped into Berlenbach from the top of the opening gong. Long overhand rights and tearing uppercuts smashed against Berlenbach's chin as the 35-year-old veteran craftily blocked every attempt of his opponent to score with his terrific left hook.

Berlenbach, 26 years old, one of the most feared fighters in any division, plainly showed the effect of his six months' layoff from the ring as McTigue smothered him at close range and whipped that slashing right hand to the head at every opening. Berlenbach, willing steadily under that fire, could neither time his punches nor summon back the footwork he showed as champion.

The crowd of 18,000 viewing for the first time the real fighting man in McTigue, shouted encouragement as he hammered "Oom Paul" in the first and second rounds, roared in approval when Berlenbach went down for the first time in the third round, and turned the garden into bedlam with their cheering as the Dublin slasher whipped him mercilessly from that point until the end.

Berlenbach, down three times in the final session, was out on his feet, his face streaming blood, when Referee McPartland choked off McTigue's fire.

"I guess that put me in Rickard's tournament," the victor said as he climbed from the ring. The result eliminated Berlenbach from consideration among the heavy-weight hand while showing McTigue into the limelight in that class, also placed him in the front rank of contenders, with Tommy Loughran, of Philadelphia for Jack Delaney's light heavyweight title.

The only black mark remaining on McTigue's record, with the stain of his loss to Berlenbach in 1925 removed last night, is a four-round knockout scored by Jack

Delaney. Berlenbach, who has lost only four fights in his professional career, has been knocked out but twice. He also felt Delaney's finishing punch in four rounds.

Although weighing but 169 pounds, McTigue announced that he would seek honors in the heavy-weight class if he were successful last night. The result may give him an opportunity to wipe out the Delaney stain while battling at the same time for the chance to meet Gene Tunney next September.

Jimmy Sacco Wins.
SPOKANE, Jan. 29.—Jimmy Sacco, Boston, won a six-round decision over George McCormack in the main event of the Elks club card here last night. They fought at 145 pounds. Sacco had McCormack at his mercy throughout.KELLOGG HOPEFUL
OF GETTING NEW
CHINESE TREATYRefuses to Deal With One
Faction, But Thinks in
Time He Can Treat
With Both.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Secretary Kellogg considers prospects for new treaty conferences with qualified Chinese representatives, "reasonably hopeful" although he has not yet received any direct indication that the two major political factions in China are approaching an agreement to appoint a joint delegation for that purpose.

It was not disclosed at the state department on what confidential information the secretary based his hope of an adjustment. The progress of the Chinese civil war may have much to do with determining the question.

The secretary declined to comment on the statement issued last night by Dr. Alfred Sze, the Chinese minister in Washington, asking for immediate steps to negotiate existing unequal treaties. Dr. Sze still is the discredited minister of the Peking government, but if he has any authority to speak for the Cantonese regime the state department is not aware of it.

Mr. Kellogg also refused to say anything about the Porter resolution asking for independent American action in China.

Britain Yields Slightly.
SHANGHAI, Jan. 29.—Enough was learned from authoritative sources today to indicate that the British proposals for surrendering her extra territorial privileges in China constitute the most significant development so far in the struggle of the far-eastern republic to regain full control of her territories.

Although the meeting at Peking between the British minister, Miles Lamson, and Foreign Minister Wellington Koo, of the northern government, and the conference at Hankow between British Charge d'Affaires O'Malley and Eugene Chen, Cantonese foreign minister, still are shrouded in secrecy, it has become known that England has made alike to the northern and southern Chinese governments a proposal virtually offering full tariff autonomy and complete sovereignty over all British concessions.

The British proposal is understood to contain only minor conditions designed to insure efficient administration of the areas which would be turned back to Chinese control and guarantees for personal and property rights of foreign residents involved.

In the meantime plans for a parade of the volunteer corps through the main streets of the International settlement were altered at the eleventh hour and only a simple re-

view was held at the Shanghai race club, to which the Chinese public was not admitted. The change is understood to have been made chiefly because of objections by Americans to what they considered an unnecessary show of strength provocative to the Chinese.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Three American cruisers today were ordered to Honolulu for possible use in China.

Secretary Wilbur said the vessels had been ordered to Honolulu "to await orders."

There are no marines aboard the ships, and it was indicated at the navy department that no plans had been made for immediate movement of the emergency force concentrated at San Diego.

OREGON LEGISLATURE ASKS
MOTION PICTURE CENSOR
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 29.—A state motion picture censorship commission of three members, one to be a woman, would be created under a bill introduced in the Oregon legislature by Representative Mark A. Paulson, of Marion county. Salaries of \$3000 a year for each member of the commission is provided. Fees of \$1 per thousand feet of original films and 50 cents for each copy would be charged to pay expenses of the commission's work.

OKLAHOMA OIL WELL IS ZINC PRODUCER

MIAMI, Okla., Jan. 29.—Oklahoma, long noted for its oil wells, now has something new in the way of mineral production—a "zinc well."

When the water flowing through the pipes of a mine near here began depositing a clinging substance which clogged the conduits, the plant engineers investigated. Analysis of the water revealed that it contained 0.704 per cent zinc, they said.

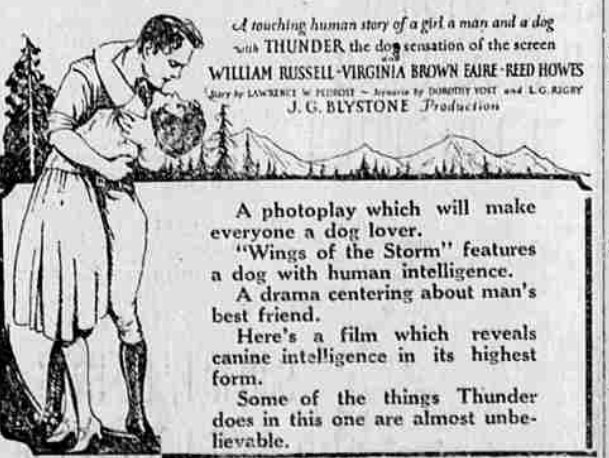
