For hours the boy held the two younger children above the water until they were reached by rescuers in a row boat.

MISSIONARY FROM CHINA TO SPEAK HERE FEBRUARY 8

Dr. William Locke, recently from Hunan China, where mobs on January 31 broke into and looted three British firms and imprisoned two men, one a treasurer and the other a medical doctor, will speak on the present situation in China at the Presbyterian church of Roseburg, Tuesday evening, February 8.

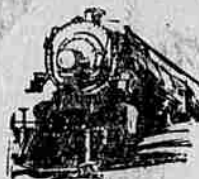
Club to Meet—
