Wife Had Spasms
Browning described the "spells" which Mrs. Browning told about in her testimony. "She scared me half to death," he said. "She would froth at the mouth and bite her tongue and had a kind of rattle in her throat. "When I was one year old, I might have crawled on the floor, but never since," Browning said laughingly, when asked if he had ever jumped about like a monkey on the floor.

Browning declared he never was drunk in his life. He laughed and said "No," when Attorney Mack asked him if he had threatened to shoot Mrs. Browning and her mother.

Duds Plenty, Babes None
"I bought fifty or sixty dresses and coats—anything she wanted, she could have," the elderly realtor declared, naming expensive furs which he said he had given his young wife.

Finally, said the witness, after he had importuned long for children, "Mrs. Browning agreed that we should have children if I would buy her many things." "No children, however," he said, "I didn't mind Mrs. Heenan coming back and forth to our place," he said, "but I did ask her once to leave me and my wife alone, just one day."

When the girl and her mother left his office, he said, he talked to Mrs. Heenan about it on the telephone, asking why they had left. "Because you did not buy us that apartment on Park Avenue," he said she told him.

Erotic Notes Read
Notes passed in to Browning at his office when his young bride called there at the busy times of his work day, were introduced into evidence in the effort to show Mrs. Browning's attitude at that time in their marital relations. Met "Peaches" At Dance.
COURT HOUSE, West Plains, N. Y., Feb. 1.—Edward West Browning took the stand today to deny his wife's charges that he was a cruel husband. Flashed, but apparently not very nervous, the witness took his seat and gave his age as 52. Since he was 16 years old, he said, he had been in the real estate business.

His meeting with the then Frances Heenan at the McAlpin hotel, at a sorority dance, was then described. "Miss Heenan walked up to a group of people I was with and after she had been introduced to me, she asked me to dance," Browning said. "After the dance she gave me her telephone number. She was 23, she said, at first, and gradually reduced the age as I got better acquainted."

Coin For "Education."
Browning said he had given the girl \$300 and her mother \$300 which was to be put toward her education, but excuses were made that she could not gain admission to the schools, and preferred to go on the stage anyway.

Browning said that he had legally adopted Dorothy "Sunshine" Browning, and had had her since she was a wee little mite. The witness described the incidents of the acid burning, the first knowledge of which he said was a telephone message from Mrs. Heenan.

"When I arrived at the Heenan home, I asked Mrs. Heenan what she had done for her daughter, knowing that she was a trained nurse, and she said 'nothing', Browning said.

Gander and Stork.
Elizabeth D. Farney, was the first witness called. She is a resident of Evanston, Ill., but in July, 1925, she testified that she and her husband met Mr. Browning at the Kew Gardens Inn.

In August, 1926 she met Browning and his wife, and spent much of her time in their company.

"I wouldn't care if I never danced with anybody but you, Peaches," the witness said Browning once remarked.

The African hounding gander was early driven into the testimony. Mrs. Farney said Mrs. Browning seemed to get a lot of enjoyment out of the animal, judging from her remarks.

"Mr. Farney said he would furnish the nursery in case the stock visited the Brownings," Mrs. Farney said. "This was when the papers were full of stories saying a visit was expected. Mrs. Browning, however, said she didn't expect any visit and wasn't interested in such things."

Browning was not cruel, never told a "naughty story" in a woman's presence, and was an affectionate husband, so far as she could see, the witness said.

On cross examination, Mrs. Farney told Henry Epstein that she and her husband had wired Browning asking if he needed them to "deny what was not true."

Frank J. Farney, the next witness, said he met Mrs. Browning, not through an introduction, but by "butting in" to a group. "Browning loved flowers and gave them to everybody until I, who could hardly afford them, kind of felt like a piker," he said.

Farney testified that Mrs. Browning was pleased with her doll gifts and read aloud to them on one occasion "with great delight" a newspaper installment of the "honey-moon diary."

He said he enjoyed Mr. Browning's tricks with the bendable spoons and the rubber eggs.

"We all got a kick out of it," he added.

One O. K. For Browning.
Miss Emma R. Steiner, an orchestral conductor of New York, took the stand.

"For 28 years," she said, "I've known Mr. Browning and his mother."

Wearing a black masculine hat and a black suit with a bit of lace at the neck, Miss Steiner on the stand presented a disfigured picture from the last century.

"He was as attentive to his wife as he had been to his mother," she testified. "He treated his wife fine."

Epstein taking the witness, tried to get her to admit a home might appear happy without being so.

"As an orchestral conductor, handling many people," she said, "I am a very good judge of human nature."
