Mr. Bates declared that Roseburg residents are interested in the plan to complete the road up the north branch of the Umpqua. They are endeavoring to interest the forest service and the state highway commission in the proposed road, which would connect Roseburg with Diamond Lake. Such a highway, he indicated, would open up a stretch of beautiful scenery and fine hunting and fishing grounds. The road, it is believed, would also establish a grade for a railroad into eastern Oregon eventually. Mr. Bates has been engaged for several years in writing titles for motion pictures in Hollywood. He was associated with the Buster Keaton company, which filmed the comedy picture near Cottage Grove last summer, and most of the titles are his. Every big picture company has what is known as a "rag" man on duty during the filming in order to work in humorous incidents and build up the action. Mr. Bates said.—Morning Oregonian.
