REVOLT GAINS STRENGTH ALL OVER PORTUGAL

Insurrection Started at
Oporto Has Spread to
Lisbon, Is Report.

FORMER CITY AFIRE

Civilian Population Flees
as Government Troops
Begin Shelling to
Oust Rebels.

(By the Associated Press)
The revolution in Portugal
is spreading. This fact stood
clearly today through a maze
of fragmentary and delayed
dispatches bearing evidence of
the censor's blue pencil.

It became known through an
Associated Press dispatch from
Lisbon, timed 2:30 p. m., saying
that a movement in support of
the Oporto revolt had broken out
in the capital.

Oporto, second city in the coun-
try in point of population, was
the starting place of the insurrec-
tion which began last Thursday
with the avowed object of over-
throwing President Carmona's dicta-
torial form of government.

Ship and re-establishing a parlia-
ment. The Oporto rebels headed
by General Sousa Diaz, are still
holding out in the face of intense
artillery fire and the hurried ap-
proach of government reinforcements.

Fires started in the city
by exploding shells are spreading
and the civilian populace has fled.
Early today announcement was
made that the rebels had uncondi-
tionally surrendered, but this was
followed within a few hours by an
admission from the minister of
war that the conditions of sur-
render had not been met and that
the bombardment was being re-
newed.

Lisbon Joins Revolt
LISBON, Portugal, Feb. 7, 2:30
p. m.—A movement has broken
out in Lisbon with the collabora-
tion of public forces and people
supporting the Oporto revolt.

The Lisbon police are joining
the revolutionary mob.
LONDON, Feb. 7.—Despite of-
ficial announcement in Lisbon
of surrender of the forces at Oporto
which revolted against the regime
of President Carmona last Thurs-
day, dispatches received today
indicated that fighting had been re-
sumed.

The official communique telling
of the surrender said it took place
last night and that a column of
loyal troops was pursuing several
fleeing rebel leaders.

A Reuters message later said the
bombardment of the city had been
resumed with intensity at 10:30
a. m., and that there were a num-
ber of killed. Subsequent dis-
patches through Havas, semi-offi-
cial French news agency in Paris,
quoted the Portuguese war minis-
ter as saying that the rebels had
refused to accept conditions imposed
and that the bombardment had
been reopened. Firing began only
after issuance of a proclamation
requesting the civil population of
Oporto to leave the city.

These dispatches added that re-
inforcements were being rushed to
Oporto, where it was reported the
bombardment had caused a num-
ber of fires which were spreading.
It was also asserted that restles-
ness was increasing in Lisbon.

LATE EMPEROR OF
JAPAN IS BURIED

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
TOKYO, Feb. 7.—Yoshihito,
123rd emperor of Japan, tonight
was accorded the most pretentious
funeral in the history of the
Orient, approximately 1,000,000
bowed, damp-eyed subjects view-
ing the gorgeous cortege which
marked the passing of a personage
regarded as a lineal descendant of
the mythical sun goddess.

Although the late ruler actually
was the real emperor for only a
brief time, owing to an illness
which afflicted him from the time
of his youth, the Japanese revered
him as a deity, his death causing
a real nation-wide mourning which
foreigners never understand. Con-
sequently, tonight's procession to-
wards the tomb excited unusual
emotion among a usually stoical
people.

No women participated in the
procession, princesses and women
of the nobility witnessing the cere-
mony at Shinjuku Gardens and at
Awakawa, the burial ground.

NEAR-BLIZZARD
SWEEPS NORTHERN
CALIFORNIA ZONE

YREKA, Calif., Feb. 7.—Sisk-
you county was swept yesterday
by a storm that approached a bliz-
zard in intensity. Weed and Mr.
Shasta reported a snow fall of one
foot. Snow piled over 15 feet

ALEXANDER HILL, INDIAN KILLER, IS ADJUDGED INSANE

TOLEDO, Ore., Feb. 7.—Alex-
ander Hill, slayer of Minnie Wash-
ington, 17-year-old Indian girl, was
found insane by Dr. R. E. Lee
Steiner and Dr. William House,
alienists, at a hearing here yester-
day.

In the course of the examination
it was learned from Hill that he
has five brothers, one of whom,
John, is now in the state hospital
at Salem. He was committed from
Hamlet, Ore.

Alexander Hill answers closely
the description of the Portland
strangler suspect. The Toledo
slayer, however, was working in a
logging camp of the Pacific Spruce
company at the time of the Port-
land murders. Hill, who said his
father and mother were dead, said
he did not know the whereabouts
of his other brothers.

Hill talked freely of his killing
of the girl, whom he strangled to
death January 31 at Siletz. He
said he forced her to leave her
home with him just after she had
returned from a religious meeting
about 1 o'clock in the morning. He
indicated he had strangled her in-
to unconsciousness in a road and
then dragged her to the deserted
shack where her body was found.

She recovered in the shack, he
said, and tried to escape through
a window, but he dragged her back
and choked her to death.

Asked why he had killed the
girl, he said, "I had to. A voice
told me to." At the time of the
killing he said he killed her be-
cause he was Jesus Christ and she
had refused to "follow him."

GAS FROM HEATER
NEARLY ENDS LIFE
PENDLETON GIRL

PENDLETON, Feb. 7.—Miss
Mary Ammons of this city nar-
rowly escaped death by asphyxia-
tion when she was overcome by
fumes from a gas heater while tak-
ing a bath. The heater had been
turned off, but fumes were es-
caping. Her mother broke down
the door and found the girl hang-
ing over the side of the tub. She
was revived in half an hour after
being carried to the open air.

IRON HORSE SETS
LOW FUEL RECORD

Setting a faster pace in the "more
miles to the gallon race," the Iron
Horse established new records in
1926, according to J. N. Clark,
chief of Southern Pacific com-
pany's fuel bureau.

"Fuel conservation," Clark said,
"in which tremendous progress
has been made during the past de-
cade, further advanced in 1926.
For each thousand tons, including
weight of locomotive and tender,
moved over the company's Pacific
lines, 128 pounds of coal were
burned, compared with a coal con-
sumption of 132 pounds to perform
the same work in 1925.

"Although most of our locomotives
are oil-burning, we translate the
heat unit performance of oil into
coal heat units, which are stan-
dard in American railroad ac-
counting."
