QUARANTINE OF CONTAGIOUS CASES TO BE ENFORCED

County Health Officers and District Attorney to Work for Disease Control.

In view of the situation in Douglas county concerning contagious diseases, it is very important that there be complete cooperation given by the residents of the county in preventing further spread, District Attorney Guy Cordon stated today. In the event cooperation is not given voluntarily, it will be necessary to force observance of the laws relating such cases to those who fail to abide by the regulations.

"There has been considerable complaint," Mr. Cordon says, "about persons affected with contagious and communicable diseases, particularly smallpox, failing to observe quarantine."

"The law requires any person who has the care of anyone afflicted with a contagious disease to report the same to a health officer and provides a severe penalty for failure to do so."

"In this county we have cases of smallpox and in some of these the person afflicted, either knowingly or ignorantly failed to report and spread the disease by association with other persons."

"Smallpox is a disease which may be controlled by properly enforced quarantine and segregation of affected persons. The law, therefore, provides a system for the protection of the public and makes failure to observe the law a misdemeanor. In order to provide safety for the general public this law must be enforced."

"Dr. Thompson, the county health officer, reports to me that he has had considerable trouble with certain families. Persons have maliciously avoided quarantine, and as a result have exposed other persons, who have contracted the disease."

"It's a bad thing to have too much money," Mrs. Dodge's father, A. T. Knowlson, was quoted as commenting when the suit was filed.

"In all cases of contagious disease, where a person has reached the stage where he knows that he is afflicted and who does not report the case, and then exposes other persons, the person failing to make the report can be sent to the penitentiary, and the person exposed has a right to civil damages."

"Persons affected by contagious disease are required to take necessary precautions to prevent exposure to others while anyone knowing of cases of contagion in the neighborhood, where quarantine has not been established, should report promptly to the health authorities. All the knowledge of medicine becomes worthless when a quarantine is not maintained, and if cooperation in preventing the spread of contagion is not given freely and voluntarily, then it will become incumbent upon the officers to exact the penalties of the law upon those who fail to take proper precautions."

The health officer reports that there are a great many contagious cases in the county at the present time. There are 25 cases of smallpox, 15 cases of measles, 8 cases of chickenpox, 13 cases of whooping cough, 4 cases of scarlet fever and 1 case of mumps.

WOMEN ARE GIVING SUPPORT TO EDDY'S EDUCATIONAL BILL

SALEM, Feb. 8. (By Special Correspondence to the News-Review)—Legislative committee workers from the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs are in Salem urging action on several bills, some of which were first presented by the federation and the Parent Teacher Association in 1913. The delegation includes Mrs. G. J. Frankel, president of the federation, Mrs. Leander Martin, chairman legislative committee, Mrs. Earl Bunting, Mrs. Rhoda B. Hayes of the committee on home products.

Educational changes as proposed in the Eddy bill (S. B. 2) are advocated by the delegation. State library maintenance with the full amount recommended in the budget is earnestly advocated, because of the broadly effective character of the work being performed, according to Mrs. Frankel.

Especially stressed is put upon the work of the Oregon Humane Society in its industrial welfare work supporting house bill 476 providing penalties for bringing diseased animals into the state. Crowded conditions have forced the Humane Society into inadequate quarters outside the court house at Portland, and the delegation is seeking re-allocation of at least one room for headquarters in the county building. The appropriation for the biennium is \$12,000, and is contended that it is essential that to

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Feb. 8.—The Russian steamer Batashov is reported to have capsized in the Black Sea with the loss of the crew and forty passengers. SENATOR HALL HAS INTRODUCED OVER 20 BILLS

SALEM, Feb. 8. (By Special Correspondence to the News-Review)—In the mass of legislation brought before the two houses, the number of bills in the senate is far less than in the house, but Senator Charles Hall, of Marshfield has been prolific in the upper branch. He sponsored twenty-two measures, either individually or in association with other legislators.

The first list includes highway improvement district petitions and elections regulating auto mufflers; regulating surveyors' marks; repealing 50 per cent license fee increase (with Senator Banks and clerk); collection of state income tax; collection of state income tax through federal official agencies; old age pensions; status in half of fame in national capital bill in aid of Lucy Garoutte Hoyt; protection of telephone lines from power lines; relating to fishing for salmon in New river and lake in Coos county; a similar measure relating to fishing in Lower Tenmile creek and lake; worth of county roads; fees of court reporting; taxing of coats of suit; relating to Curry county salaries; repeal 6 per cent limitation on taxes; bonds for Roosevelt highway (with Norblad).

In association with house members, Senator Hall has introduced measures providing for the following: Creating funds for law libraries in cities and towns between 15,000 and 100,000 population; acquiring toll bridges by counties; Hall-King income tax bill; additional gasoline tax.

In addition to his other duties, Senator Hall is chairman of the roads and highways committee and has memberships on a number of others.

There is expression of opinion that the session will be extended beyond the forty-day limit. Thus far no oratory and slight debate has been indulged, but the time between now and February 18th is predicted will be notable for discussion and some hot contests.

The securities held in the fund are to retire policies at death or at term expiration. Whatever profit is made by them (at present it is 4.6 per cent) reflects in lower premiums to policy holders by virtue of dividend declarations.

The greatest benefits would result to policy holders in the event certificates were not repaid. John Thomas Taylor, of the American Legion estimates that 1,000,000 service men will not repay their loans, permitting them to remain as compound interest bearing charges against their certificates, the face value of the loan plus eighteen years compound interest to be deducted at maturity of the certificates.

CASUALTIES AND ILLNESS EVIDENCE JAP DEVOTION

TOKYO, Feb. 8.—Official police reports tonight revealed that 721 persons were injured in the crush of 1,000,000 faithful subjects who packed the streets of Tokyo last night and today during the funeral of the late Emperor Yoshihito.

Most of the injuries were minor in character although several were serious and there were two deaths.

It was estimated that about 3,000,000 persons assembled in the capital during the funeral but no more than 1,000,000 were able to crowd to a point within sight of the funeral cortege or even to get near enough to glimpse the procession.

The number of those who contracted pneumonia and influenza from long hours of waiting in the cold streets is inestimable.

FURTHER TIME GIVEN LAURELWOOD SIDEWALK REPORT

The city council held a lengthy session last night, there being a number of matters demanding consideration. At the opening of the meeting there was a large delegation present from Laurelwood addition asking that action on the ordering of sidewalks in that part of the city be postponed until the residents have time to complete a proposition they will probably have to offer. The council granted the request and will not act upon the sidewalk matter until next meeting.

A proposal that Jackson street be straightened at the intersection with Mosher street was introduced by residents of that vicinity. It is proposed that the sidewalk on the southeast and northwest corners be cut back giving a more direct angle in making the run up the hill. This petition was referred to the street committee for investigation.

An offer was submitted by a publicity company to place waste-paper boxes along the city streets provided the company may have the right to place advertisements upon the boxes. The city agrees to keep them properly placed and to empty them at proper intervals. The council agreed that these boxes would be a help in keeping the streets clean and agreed to the proposition.

City Attorney Wimberly reported that he had attended a meeting of city officials at Salem in an effort to effect a change in the law providing for the division of the road tax money, but that the county court organization had proved the stronger in the hearing before the legislature and that no change would be made. He stated, however, that an effort will be made to get the proposition on the ballot at the next election. The law provides that only 50 per cent of money raised by road tax within a district must be spent within the district, the old law which kept 70 per cent within the district having been repealed by the legislature two years ago.

Ordinances levying assessments for the improvement of Claire street and the construction of the South Stephens street sewer were put on first and second readings.

The ordinance providing for the North Umqua drainage district was placed upon third reading and was passed.

An ordinance segregating the sewer easement in Laurelwood was passed.

An ordinance providing that it sidewalks are constructed in Laurelwood that they shall be built next to the curb instead of with a two-foot parking strip, was passed.
