New Wage Agreement for 350,000 Coal Miners Task of John L. Lewis at Parley to Be Held This Month

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 8.—(A. P.)

For the seventh time since he became president of the United Mine Workers of America, John L. Lewis will sit down this month across the table from bituminous coal mine owners to talk wages.

Upon his bulky shoulders rests the task of negotiating an agreement between 350,000 miners and the men for whom they dig coal. Failure to get together will mean a strike.

Lewis will lead his scale committee to Miami, Fla., on Feb. 14 to discuss with the mine owners of the central competitive field a wage agreement to supplant the three-year pact which expires March 31.

If disarmament results and the men are called out, Lewis will find himself in no new situation as leader of the strikers, for he has led them before when parleys failed.

Now in his forty-seventh year, the miners' leader has walked a straight path in his office, fighting off all efforts of employers to force down wages, and defending his organization with the same steadfastness from the inroads of extremists.

The miners' chief was digging coal at Panama, Ill., in 1908 when he began his union labor activities. He was made legislative agent for

the union, and in 1917 became vice president of the organization. Two years later he succeeded to the

presidency Frank Hays, who retired in ill health. Lewis has just been named to his fourth two-year term in office.
