memorandum at length with Marshall Badoglio, chief of staff of Italy's entire armed forces, naval, military and aerial.

The general opinion continues to prevail that Italy will agree to join in a discussion of further limitations, with some reservations among the Italian instance upon confirmation of the principle, sanctioned at the Washington conference, of an equal ratio of strength between the Italian and French navies.

Most of the newspapers publish Mr. Coolidge's memorandum textually, but this far there has been no editorial comment.

W. L. WIARD DIES THURSDAY

Mr. Morris' lifeless body being found crowded down under the steering wheel.

He had evidently been killed as the car rolled over as his head was quite badly crushed. The body was removed from the car but kept at the scene until the arrival of Coroner Ritter, who brought it to Roseburg.

Mrs. Benson was found at Oakland to be suffering chiefly from the effects of her long submersion in the cold water. She was terribly chilled and it was several hours before warmth could be completely restored to her body. She suffered numerous bruises and cuts, but is expected to recover.

Mr. Morris, whose address is 2022 R. R. Avenue, Seattle, was engaged with J. A. Tanner in the Texas Oil company. He and Mrs. Benson, who is Mrs. Hauser's mother, were on the way to California for a visit and to attend to business matters. He was a prominent Mason.

Mr. Hauser has been notified of the accident and is expected to arrive at Oakland tonight.

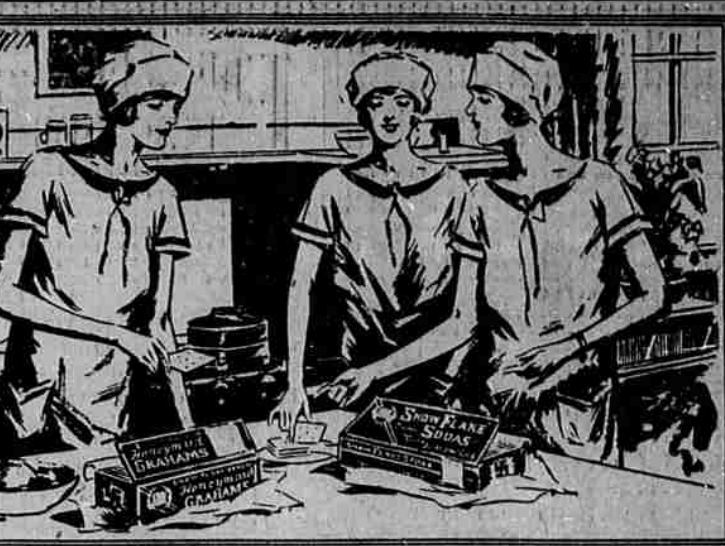
At the point where the accident happened the highway is paralleled closely by the Chualar, while the railroad track is only a few feet beyond the stream, which is about fifteen feet wide and six or eight feet deep. The highway makes a sharp turn and as Mr. Morris was driving south his car swung to the left and then apparently skidded as he applied his brakes and went over the grade at an angle. The soft dirt showing where the car left the road and then rolled over several times before it finally stopped upside down in the water and almost entirely submerged.

As the bank is very steep it was difficult to see the wreck from the highway, unless a person might be looking for it. Doubtless a number of machines passed by without seeing the car in the water or hearing the cries of Mrs. Benson as she clung to the bushes growing along the bank of the stream.

Because of her age the cold and shock make her condition quite serious.

A huge crowd gathered quickly and officers had considerable difficulty in controlling traffic. Travel was halted for quite a while when it was necessary to place the wrecker across the road to hold the car up, while the body of Mr. Morris was removed.

After making a thorough investigation of the accident, Coroner Ritter decided that no inquest would be necessary and the body was brought to this city to be prepared for taking back to Seattle for burial.

ists here and some of them are women."

Secrecy Alleged

Joseph accused Norblad of lobbying for the packers on the Coquille river. He said that when he asked that Senators Beals be placed on the investigating committee, Norblad objected. Relative to the question as to whose name was scratched from the list to give way to Beals, Joseph said Norblad first said it was Bell and now says he doesn't remember which it was Bell or Marks.

Norblad has represented those interests that have dirty actions to hide," said Joseph. "and he doesn't want to investigate because he wants them to remain hidden. He has violated the confidence placed in him by those who wanted a full and honest investigation."

O. A. C. Denied Money

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Feb. 11.—After the joint ways and means committee last night rejected requests of Oregon Agricultural college for appropriations for buildings totalling \$519,000, Representative Mark D. McCallister, of Salem, as member of the committee and an alumnus of O. A. C., charged that the committee had been packed by state university supporters. The committee a few nights ago allowed all the building requests made by the university.

A clash occurred after the adjournment of the committee when all but five of the members had left the room.

McCallister, after saying that the committee had been packed by university supporters, declared that a few days prior to the opening of the legislature, he had been approached with a proposal that he give up his place on the ways and means committee and take some other committee appointment. In dead in this McCallister saw an attempt to remove from the committee his influence for O. A. C.

Partiality Charged

Representative Claude Buchanan, of Corvallis, the other O. A. C. graduate on the committee, in moving favorable action on the college bills, declared that for the three normal schools and the university the committee had "pulled off the lid, knocked out the bottom and given them a shower of gold, but that when it came to the agricultural college, the committee wanted to clamp down the lid."

Representative Walter S. Fisher of Roseburg, one of five university alumni on the committee declared he had voted against the O. A. C. appropriations purely on merit and not out of rivalry.

"The O. A. C. program," he said, "was not bona fide, but was put in here merely because the university had a program."

Representative Earl C. Bronaugh, Jr., of Portland, another university man, said the university program was the result of a report by a capital outlay committee after the arrival of President Hall. Bronaugh announced that the university's bill for an infirmary to cost \$130,000, would be withdrawn. Representative Gordon said that this move was at his suggestion in an effort to heal the breach.

Unfair Deal Alleged

"At the first of the session," said Staples, "President Kerr of O. A. C. came to me and said that inasmuch as the other institutions were not going to ask the legislature for new buildings that neither would the agricultural college. I understand that both Dr. Kerr and Dr. Hall of the university to say they would ask for no new buildings. Later when the university put in its requests and Dr. Hall was here he shunned me. I do not claim that Dr. Hall connived in the formation of the ways and means committee, but he couldn't have done better if he had. I venture that all the men in this state who have been graduated from O. A. C. and the thousands of farmers who have taken their short courses will all take issues with this committee. Two of my boys have attended the University of Oregon, but no institution in this state has done more for this state than O. A. C. we had a chance to even up matters tonight and have not done it."

ing, where he died a few moments later.

Mr. Chambers was made director of transportation of the United States Food Administration during the war, and later was director of traffic of the United States Railroad Administration under William G. McAdoo and Walker D. Hines, directors general.

In 1920 he resumed work with the railroad in the position he held to the time of his death.

His physician, Dr. J. H. West, and the nurse, Miss Florence Yates, were unable to give any explanation of his act other than to pronounce it a case of temporary dementia.
