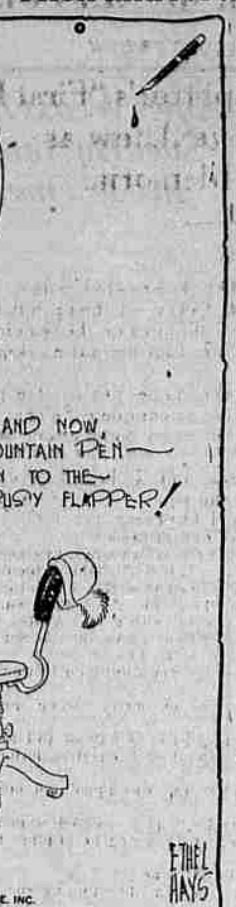

NEW STYLES FLASH GOLD AND SILVER.

Newer Trend in Evening Wrap Leads to Brighter Shimmering Cloth

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—These are golden days in fashion's realm. Much of the enchantment and glamor of the gowns described as worn by princesses in the fairy tale books has been captured in the new evening modes.

Nothing better illustrates the newest trends than the evening wraps just being made up for spring in shimmering gold and silver cloth with changeable oriental colorings playing over the golden expanse. It is hard to find a wrap among the new collections that is not of the fairy book type.

Beware Intricate Lines

Naturally when fabrics are so gorgeous, lines must not be intricate, but flowing and ample. Like the fly, they need no gilding. And the gowns beneath them must also be simple in line, preferably of colorful chiffon or georgette or of lame simply handled.

Metal cloths this year are soft, as all fabrics are, every suggestion of heaviness and stiffness woven out of them. They have been

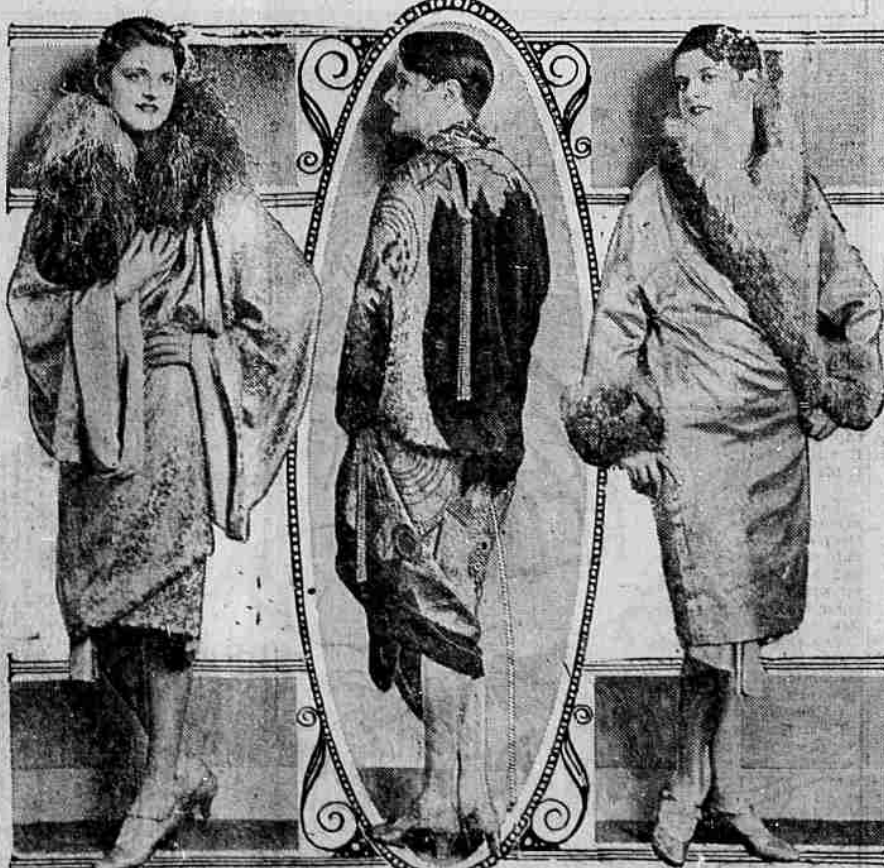
trained to lie flat and follow the lines of the figure. For this reason they are not for heavyweights.

Whereas metal cloths were once considered appropriate only for the matron, today the debutantes have seized upon them too. Flappers wrap these glittering wraps closely about their narrow, boyish bodies, and their sleeky cropped heads and longly expanse of chiton hosiery are never set off to better advantage.

Flappers Wear 'Em Too

Photographed today are three new spring wraps, rich in color, individual in treatment and in perfect accord with the modern spirit, but at the same time pleasantly suggesting the extravagance of a more unrestrained age.

Most simple, but extremely effective is the model of green and gold metal cloth that flashes emerald or sunlight according to the lighting, with a collar of lynx fur dyed a charming rose shade. Its straight lines answer universal demand for slenderness, and follow the popular cut, but the color combination is sophistication itself.

Watch Your Make-up Then, M. Bendel Warns and Use Yellow Tint

Dyed furs are no longer faddish, they are an established mode and are revolutionizing our ideas about the decorative quality of furs.

From the orient, by way of Paris, is the coat in tomato red silk crepe, heavily brocaded in silver and gold. Over the left shoulder and down the right side are long fascinating tassels of rhinestones and crystal. This coat has its own frock to be worn beneath, of tomato red chiffon with a draped blouse and a three-tiered skirt held to a fullness in front by a jeweled buckle.

But the coat is quite as appropriate for other evening gowns. I should particularly like it with a very simply cut frock of gold lame. Naturally the frock should be untrimmed because with such a wrap a frock that flaunted any pretensions of its own would start an unpleasant suggestion of feud.

The flattering collar of ostrich is used on the third wrap of metal cloth in which are woven silken

threads of bois de rose. The ruff is two-toned, the light shade, being the same rose to be found in the coat, the other a much darker and more striking shade of red. The cuffs of the sleeves are turned back so that a glimpse of the lining of rose-colored georgette crepe may be revealed.

Get That Sun-Kissed Air

I direct your attention to the importance of a careful make-up when gold is worn. Gold has a hard glint, and a face powder in which yellow predominates is much more harmonious than pink or white. In fact the olive-skin make-up is much preferred for evening as well as for day by the smart New Yorkers, and many of them, I understand, expose their complexions to a certain sun ray, available in certain beauty shops, that is supposed to give that slightly tanned and sun-kissed glow that is so popular today.

Hair that glistens and is smoothly coiffed is an absolute necessity to complement the golden gown, and naturally, a glowing personality helps out the general effect.
