A case knife, which was near the bed, to which he was confined, was used in an effort to cut his throat. He was rushed to a hospital where his condition is still in doubt. Mrs. Conger and a sister who had been up all night with the invalid, had just left the room when the deed was attempted. Mr. Conger has been ill in bed for more than a month.

sity to cancel an address to be made by Judge Lindsey to the student body. The qualification for membership in the Thinkers' association is a "clean mind and a sound body." Applications accompanied by certificates of sanity and physical health from physicians.

The object of an association is the encouragement of thought through free discussion of ideas and theories. At the organization the association endorsed a free discussion of Judge Lindsey's theories of marriage but would not go on record regarding those theories as an organization until some time after the Lindsey-Jenkins debate.

No Clues to Floggers

Police were unable to find any clue to the identity of the floggers. Patschelet was unable to give them any assistance beyond the meager information that the five men were in a touring car "bigger than a Ford."

At no time did he get a clear look at any one of them.
