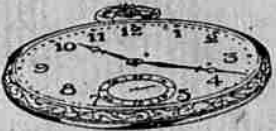

IMPROVEMENT SEEN IN CONTAGIOUS DISEASE SITUATION

Some improvement has been noted in the contagious disease situation throughout the county, according to Dr. Richard Thompson, county health officer. Eight quarantines have been lifted for smallpox, while only three new cases have been reported for several days, indicating that the spread has been stopped. There are 30 cases in quarantine, but it is believed that there will be few if any new cases developed. Over 500 persons have been vaccinated by the health unit alone, in addition to the work done by private physicians. The two high schools and Benson school have been visited and 230 pupils vaccinated, while the work is still to be done at the Rose, Fullerton and Central schools. A great many pupils have been vaccinated by their family doctors. Only those pupils who have consent from their parents are vaccinated. Many of the nearby rural schools, particularly in the affected districts have been visited and nearly 200 pupils treated in those schools, while more than 100 vaccinations have been given at the Saturday clinics conducted at the office by the health unit. Measles are reported to be prevalent in the Looking Glass and Glendale districts, while there is considerable whooping cough in Roseburg. Scarlet fever is dying out, it is believed, while there are only a few cases left of chicken pox.
